Compromise of the Arizona Corporation Commission's former stand regarding the license of

The commission held a lengthy, hearing on its order cancelling the license 10 days ago, stipulated that the order would not become effective until 10 days after a decision is handed down in the case.

The decision has been delayed, however, following an appeal by Leroy H. Bennett, manager of the relocation center, that action be delayed until members of the cooperative, all Japanese residents at the center, could vote on a proposed émendment to its articles of incorporation limiting the cooperative to the center and its life to the life of the center.

# EMPLOYMENT REDUCTION OF EVACUEE STAFF EFFECTIVE JULY 1

Changes in project evacuee employment policies effective July 1, including a reduction in the number of evacuee employees, was announced by Project Director L. H. Bennett in a statement issued Thursday.

Nearly every division is affected by the reduction in employees. Hardest hit are Community Services, Moss Operation and Agricultural Divisions with losses of 100 workers each

#### 48 Millions Asked By WRA For 44

The WRA appropriation bill for 1944 was favorably reported by the House Appropriation's Committee last week without change in amount or language wired Dillon S. Myer from Washington.

The appropriation asked by the WRA for 1944 total \$48,170,000.

During the discussion on the floor of the House, the WRA was well defended. The bill was passed by the house without any change affecting the WRA, and was forwarded to the Senate last week.

Policy charges are timed with the beginning of a new fiscal year, state new budget allowances, and the placing into operation of a new staff chart which reduces the number of appointed personnel.

Except in work which requires of f - schedule hours, arrangements previously made for special hours of work are cancelled. All divisions will bo required to adhere to the 8-12 and 1-5 hours. This order affects the Division where early morning hours of work to eliminate the hot afternoon hours has been in effect. Explained Bennett, "the arrangement did not produce the results anticipated."

Reductions will be made on the basis of (1) necessity of the job; (2) aptitude of employed; (3) willinguess to work.

Further lesses in evecuee employees include the Public Works Division with a loss of 16, Employment, 14, Project Management, 10 and the Hospital, 8.

#### GRADUATION - 1943

Contrasted to graduation in the pre-evacuation days, the commencement exercises held Thursday night by the graduating seniors of Canal high school may not have been enviable to the principals involved. Restricted to the narrow confines of a guarded community, graduations which promise a bright happy Tuture may have seemed ironical, if not a bit farcical to many.

But go back to the pre-war graduation of nisei from secondary schools back home. The nisei were gripped by the excitement and the sentimentality which usually attend the functions. Yet a conviction never escaped them that most were headed for a life which promised nothing better than the drudgery of life in communities and social sphere of issei and nisei. Be und by occument and social prejudice barriers, they were aware that the "opportunities" so glowingly pictured by commencement speakers were not really for them.

The opportunities that exist for most Americans, are not equally applicable to Americans with Japanese faces. Thus, the nise always have had to produce more to attain the same vocational success.

But the other night when the future was discussed again, there was more than mere phraseology in the hope extended. The nisei have been separated from the projudiced coastal states, however painful that incision may have been. They are adrift in a neutral community from which they may go to areas that are not enveloped in the miasmic illusion of yellow perilism.

The seniors have before them schooling (many on scholarships granted in quantity never accessible before) or jobs in the Mid-West or the East, where it has been proven that issel and nisel are accepted on more equitable basis and in jobs that Pacific Coast has regarded as the property of Caucasians.

Whatever it is that they will do, the graduating seniors (and for that matter all residents here) have before them more possibilities of success in the future than the nise have ever known in the past in the coastal states--provided they have the courage to tear

# EVACUEES MARCH OF TIME BROADCASTS

On the "March of Time" program over a nation-wide radio hook-u p. Thursday night reaching into millions of American homes, Director Dillon S. Myer appealed to the public to handle the evacuee problem in the American way and not as Hitler or Tojo would.

Myer's appearance on the program gave added proof to residents that the nation at large was conscious that the loyal should not be confined to restricted communities.

The director disclosed that 14,000 evacuees have resettled to date, and that 9,000 more nisei, over a third of whom are volunteers, are in the United States Army.

Myer denied charges made by the Dies Committee in Los Angeles and stated that not one case of sabotage and disloyal activities by the evecuees has been reported or known.


