ly in the Pacific Citizen:
The major constitutional issues of evacuations have not been decided by the Supreme: Court in its recent decision which upheld the right of the military to apply the curfew against racial group if the circumstances warrant it.

What the court did not decide, but expressly left open for later consider-

ation is:

1. Whether or not the military orders of evacuation, excluding some 70,000 American citizens of Japanese ancestry from the ontire Pacific Coast are constitutional.

2. Whether or not military orders of detention, either in detention or relocation centers are legal.


3. Whether or not the military orders continuing to exclude American citizens of Japanese ancestry from return to the Pacific Coast at the present time, violate constitutional rights.

The people of the United States boliove that the mon in the armed services have a greater right to a voice because of their correspondingly greater sacri-fice for the nation. This argument is not objectively valid, but even the newspapers defer to this general feel-Thus, it was that conservative papers devoted to the cause of American business men and their profits made capital of Captain Rickenbacker's anti-labor union speeches.

Despite mention of Captain Rickenbacker, we actually see a more hopeful trend in this deference of the press to the fighting men. 
