evacuees were pounced upon by approximately ton Filipinos in U. S. Navy uniform Tuesday night in Chicago, the pro-ject was informed by Elmar Shirrell, relocation supervisor. Two have been hospitalized in the Bridewell Hospital including Frank Hokamura, 25, former resident of Gila at 8-14-0 with a wound in the abdomen, and Jimmy Ishibashi. ex-Rohwer, with a groin wound.

The other two ovacuess were Masami Koga, ex-Minidoka, and Keiya Horibata, ex-Rohwer. All four are Hawaiian-born American citizens and former sailors in the United States Merchant Marino. Hokamura's parents are deceased, and he apparently has no known relatives in this country.

The attack came when they had stopped to chat at the corner of Division and Clark Streets. Intervention of two detectives, who were nearby, prevented more perious consequences.

According to the evac-uses the only movious comtacts which they have had with any sailors occurred the evening before in a tavern in the neighborhood when Ishibashi was called an insulting name by a Filipino in a sallor's un-He told the Filipino that he would not argue or fight with because he respected the sailor's uniform. t h o Filipino discovered Ishibashi was an American citizen, ho apologized, they shook hands and the argument was ended.

United States Authorities and the Chicago Polico Dopartment will invostigato the matter further. Shirrell stated that he would keep the project informed of the latest development.

Some misguided Congressmen have demanded that Director Dillon S. Myer be removed from office for his outspoken defense of the evacuees and the American way. But sounder men are applauding. We submit the following editorial which appeared in the July 3 issue of the Chicago Sun:

For five years, this irrespondible legislator, through his "committee on un-American activities," has been satisfying his averice for publicity by connected red scares and vilifying respectable public servents.
