Residents are once again rominded by the ration department that sinco now special shoo ration stamp is valid for only one month from the stamped date, persons should call for their shoe stamps not later than a week they receive their notices that the stamps are here.

Anyone applying for extension of time, must show proof that he tried to use the stamp within the time limit.

No application for a shoe stamp will be accepted for persons under 18 years of age unless signed ·by either parent or guar-dian. When stamps for minors arrive at the ration department, the parents or guardians must call for the stamps. Under no condition will they be given to minors.

One of the most democractic institutions in the conter is the Consumer's Cooperative which is in the sixth month of its existence.

Its records reveal that the nise have had relatively little to do with it, except in positions where nise's particular capabilities have been desirable. The board of directors, and the Congress of Delegates is almost entirely issel in composition. In the blocks, it has been the issel who have contributed the most.

We would like to point out to the "Jap-haters" that despite their vehoment declarations to the contrary, issei have assimilated much of the American way of life.

But what of the misoi? They have reneged on their education and the way of life to which they were brought up by not sharing some of the responsibilities, even though that share is exercised only on the block level. The misei it is who will become responsible bread-winners in the family upon relocation. They will be in a matter of a few years the parent generation. If they are to enact their role successfully as adults when that time comes, they must take their trial flights here.

The issei can assist the nisei in learning greater solf-confidence and developing greater interest in matters other than the more frivolous concerns. If the issei have any regard for the tough times that misei inevitably will face, they will encourage the reluctant younger generation to assume greater responsibility in the co-op and in community affairs in general.

## EVACUEE McWilliams To Write Report

Carey McWilliams, author and outspoken upholder of the principles of freedom. f.o minority groups, will write a lenghtly report on the evacuee problem soon for the American Council of the Institute of Pacific Relations.

McWilliams is the author of "Factory in the Fields" and many articles and books which have aided in federal and public recognition of the problems which face minority groups. In his coming report

he will include a chapter of about 5,000 words in which he wants the evacuees to speak for themselves. To collect this material he is asking for statements from evacuees.

He elucidates: "So far as I am concerned, there is no limit to the character of these statements. Mercly by way of suggesting -the type of statement that I would like to obtain, I mention the fol-Descriptions of lowing: life in the relocation centers, personal experiences (either in or out of the centers,) and what you, as an, evacuoo, think of the ontire program, what you , think the position of t h e Japanese Americans will be in post-war America, criticism of the evacuation program (if you want to make criticisms,) significant statements about your life prior to the evacuation, or anything of similar character. In other words, my book will probably be consulted as ·reference material; will be availabe t o schools, colleges, and li-braries; and, i in this chapter, I want to extend to you an opportunity to say, to those interested in the problem, whatever you think they should particularly know or realize about the matter. Necessarily, the statements have to be rather short, from 500 to 1,000 words. If I get enough interesting material, I am willing to devote two or possibly three chapters to this

type of material.
