

TO VOTE ON CHARTER: CANAL PREPARES ELECTION

The proposed Butte Community constitution will be presented to residents in mass block meetings for adoption or rejection lionday night.

All residents 18 years of age and above who are not to be segregated are eligible to vote. A majority of total votes cast will be required to adopt the consitution.

NEW CLEARANCE Procedure Told

Authority to grant indefinito leave clearances to practically all U. S. male citizens who have returned from Japan to the United States since 1935 has been transferred from the Project Director to Washington, according to the latest directions received from Washington.

The persons affected by the new orders are all U. S. male citizens who have returned from Javan to the United States since January 1, 1935, if (1) they have lived in Japan for ton years or more after the age of six, or if (2) they have received all or most of their formal education in Japan, or if (3) they have had formal education in Japan after the ago of fifteen.

most important The functions of the Council' will be (1) "to enact laws, ordinances, and regula-tions for the government of the Community and to provide penalties for violations thereof:" (2) "to solicit and receive funds and property for Community purposes and to hold and administer such funds."

Contraband Articles For lule Listed

The contraband list applicable totthe Tule Lake Centor is being revised by the Western Defense Command. The list that follows is now under consideration and will probably be adopted.

1. Firearms, weapons and devices ordinarily capable of such use, or implements of war or component parts thereof, ammunition bombs, explosives, or component parts thereof, shortwave radios receiving sets having a frequency of 1,750 kilocycles or greater or of 540 klocycles or less, radio transmitting sets, signal devices, codes or ciphers, cameras.

2. Papers, documents or books in which there may be invisible writings, photographs, sketches, pictures, arawings, maps. or graphical representation of any military or naval post, camp or station.

We accepted the co-ap as an organization which will reduce the cost of consumer goods sold within the center to a minimum. We viewed it as a dollars and cents matter. But through the co-op educational program many of us are learning that the principles which move the organization are greatly more basic than that. which appears in the lodger.

For instance, The Communiteer, a news letter published by the Fural Cooperative Community Conference is "devoted to the furthering of the cooperative community as the basis, in brief, is the eventual aim of all co-op groups worthy of the name. The Communiteer is published in Teaberryport, New City, New York.


An editorial, which appears in The Communiteer urgs the acceptance of evacuees in Cooperative. It

"The prospects for the participation of our fellow citizens of Japanese background in the building and the growth of cooperative communities are now limited only by the opportunities communities will make available to thon ...

"It is heartening to the WRA, and concerned organizations and individuals everywhere who are now eager to do what can be done to right this human tragedy. The offectiveness of the work must be measured by the number of opportunities for useful, creative work that are opened to the evacuees, and by the kindness and understanding with which they are received in their new lo-

"Here is a call to community! We are committed to sharing and fellowship, to neighborliness and humani-We approve of rehabilitation, which permits mutv tual reciprocal aid. Our brothers are in want and need of help. Communities are in need of growth and greater power, and needs theirs."

Center leaders of the Co-op Educational program urge members to resettle in co-op communities. They tell us that the co-op has amazing vitality during de-pression years, and that it provides a more secure safeguard against the depression which will follow the war.

CANADIAN ISSEL NISEI

Tho term "democracy," for which men have fought and died, remains as ever an ideal. Many states, past and present, have been tagged as democracies. Yet, if truth were to be expressed, each of thom must necessarily be qualified by the name of the state such as Greek, Swiss, America, etc.

To the north of us is Canada, admittedly a demouracy. It undoubtedly requires the qualifying "Canadian." As a nation, it falls far shy of America in application of the principles of democracy. British Columbia, a province, for example, denies the franchise to persons Oriental ancestry. After the outbreak of war, like America, Canada has sent persons of Japanese ancestry away from west coast into government operated camps. Now they are being released like the misei and issei as they are in the United States. However, in British Columbia, property owned by the evacuees have been sold by the alien custodian without regard for the owners! wishes.

The New Canadian, a newspaper published for people of Japanese ancestry in Canada shows further difference in treatment. It says that, the stand of the Canadian government "has lacked entirely the forthright implications of the American government, facing a similar situation. In the United States, for instance, the White House itself has intervened with formal statements approving enlistment of nisei in the armed forces and their transfer into useful employment in normal communities. And thereby American born Japanese have been encouraged in their loyalty and their effort to find the "road back," while the American fascists have been roundly scored." BIRTIS
