Rivers Awaits Rice Shipment

Because the Rivers rice supply is running low, rice is being seen on the tables only once daily instead of the customary twice to stretch the present supply until the shipment of 210,000 lbs. of rice arrives from the Quaternary Depot of San Antonio, Texas, according to H. E. Keadle, project steward.

Provided the transportation facilities meet no difficulties, the shipment is due to arrive within a week or ten days.

Councilmen To Elect Officers

Canal Councilmen will meet 7:30 tonight at the administration building to elect permanent officers, stated L. T. Hoffman.

In addition to the election, Canal's Council will consider the appointments of various committees needed by the Council. How often and where the Council will meet will be discussed.

Each block Councilmen will survey possibilities in his block to see whether there are persons qualified to become members of the Judicial Commission.

BUTTE RESIDENTS VOTE FOR COMMUNITY COUNCILMEN

Polls for the election of Butte Councilmen will be open until 7 tonight, stated Dr. Earl Yusa, chairman of the election commission.

Yusa urges all registered voters 18 years old or above to vote at the respective block managers' offices before the polls close this evening. Election results probably will be known by Thursday.

The winning candidates from the various blocks will form the first permanent community council in Butte. They will have the power to make laws,

assess the people, and make representations to the administration.

At the first regular meeting of the council, the chairman, vice-chairman, secretary, and treasurer will be elected by majority vote of Councilmen.

CAMP SHELBY

Tsujimoto Cited As Bond Plugger

"Pvt. George M. Tsujimoto, son of Mr. and Mrs. Fukuma Tsujimoto of 65-6-A, is training at Camp Shelby and at the same time is backing the attack with bonds," according to the Camp Shelby release.

Pvt. Tsujimoto is one of the few, if not the only soldier in Camp Shelby or elsewhere, whose photograph was so desired by the Treasury Department to use in connection with the nationwide War Bonds Drive that they telegraphed for it.

Tsujimoto still doesn't know why the Treasury Department wanted his picture, but he does know that the more war bonds Americans--in and out of uniform--buy, the sooner will be victory.

Pvt. Tsujimoto, former senior procurement officer at Gila River, has two brothers in the army, Sgt. Technician Joo at Shelby and Cpl. Thomas at Camp Robinson, Arkansas. His other brother, James, was rejected because of poor eyes and is residing with his parents in Butte.

Formerly of Tracy, California, the Tsujimotos were evacuated to Gila River from Turlock. By then two were already in the army, and George relocated to Washington, D. C. from where he volunteered.

FLOODWATERS SWEEP GILA

Last weekend's three rainstorms gave River's residents the novelty of being flooded, and left behind a scene not unlike a beach after a shipwreck.

Seaton experimentation station recorded the official rainfall figures for the past four days as: Friday-.11, Saturday-.85, Sunday-2.28, the heaviest in the last several years, and Monday-.08.

Destroyed landscape, washed-out irrigation ditches, and damaged high-

way which was newly under construction, were listed as the major losses by John C. Douha, ass't. project director of operations. Financial loss was small, but time and labor will be needed to restore the communities to their original condition.

Slight damages were suffered in the farm section by units with the more recent plantings, but the good done by the rain more than made up for damages

EMPLOYMENT STATISTICS

Lately the call for workers in practically all divisions has increased rapidly. The statistics compiled by the employment division explain why.

In the last two months, approximately 250 residents have been relocating monthly of which some 200 have been employed. Recently, this has been catching up with the employment quotas of some divisions, for instance, the hospital.

Then in the last few weeks, with segregation ahead of them soon, some of the segregants have terminated themselves for the move. Majority of the segregants, not so pressed by crating and other work associated with movement, have elected to stick to their jobs until a few days before the day of departure.

Those few days are here, and some 700 segregants are vacating their jobs; many of them vital for the operation of the project.

The employment records reveal that about 500 residents employed at one time or another are unemployed at present. Even if all these report to work, simple subtraction will show that there will be 200 workers or so short of quota.

But it is not as simple as all that. The departure of 2000 segregants will relieve some of the services now being rendered. However, it is much too optimistic to expect a 100% return of the 500 unemployed. A return of a rough estimate of 350 can be expected, but not much more.

There may be something like 300 workers short of quota. As the weeks go by with the departure of about 50 employed each week, the situation is bound to get worse. We can get by with the present shortage, but when it jumps to 500 and more, it will begin to hurt.

Undoubtedly solutions will have to be worked out. Already some have been suggested or carried out: suggested is the consolidation of blocks; and certain unessential jobs have been eliminated.

If essential operations will be manned, policies and plans must be worked out immediately. The newly elected community councils in Canal and the to-be-elected one in Butte have a tremendous amount of work cut out for them in this matter alone, for it is our belief that they can be of invaluable assistance to the administration in helping smooth the finer details of whatever steps may be necessary.

Young lassies living in this modern day and age are prone to long for the days when dashing knights in shining armor lived for adventure and damsels in distress. "Chivalry," they sigh, "is no more!"

We beg to differ with them. Chivalry is not dead. Shining armors and elegant manners are not necessarily chivalry.

We know, for we saw chivalry as exemplified by a modern Sir Walter Raleigh.

Friday, we saw a girl hesitate as she eyed the stretch of flooded area between her and home. We saw a boy with a sparkling smile, without shoes or socks, come up to the girl, wave aside her shy protests, and carry her across the swirling waters.

We repeat, chivalry is far from dead, shining armor and elegant manners notwithstanding. J.A.

Block smoke rising from a long unused chimney yesterday morning silently announced that winter approaches and time flies.

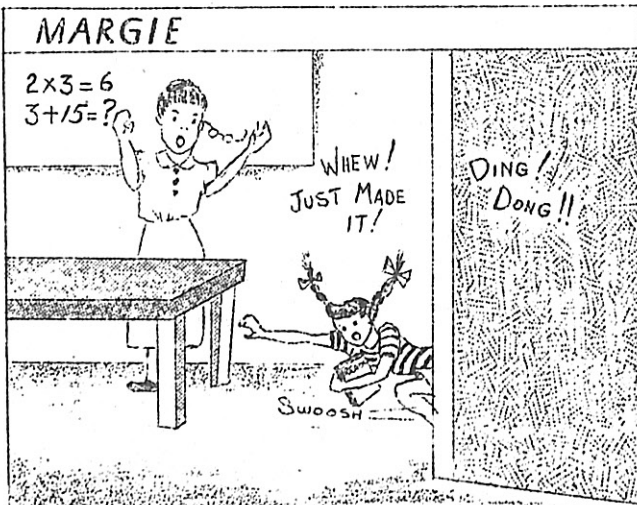

EMMONS BACKS DEWITT'S STAND ON WEST COAST

Persons of Japanese ancestry will not be permitted to return to evacuated areas without express approval of the War Department while threat of enemy action remains, Lt. Gen. Delos C. Emons announced

recently.

Gen. Emons stated his position on the controversial evacuee problem in the following words:

"The military situation which prompted the evacuation has materially improved. However, the possibility of enemy action in this area remains real.

Co-op Calls For Sales Receipts

Cash register receipts for the period between July 1 and September 30 for purchases at the Gila Co-op stores must be turned in by October 6, stated Masato Kato, secretary.

Residents should submit receipts to their block Co-op delegates.

Receipts must be sealed in an envelope with name, address, patrons' estimated amount, and the numbers of sales receipts.

"The Japanese Fleet and Air Force remain in existence and they still constitute a serious threat. While this threat persists, no persons of Japanese ancestry will be permitted to return to evacuated areas without the express approval of the War Department. Such approval will not be given at the expense of the national security."

Gen. Emons is the former military governor and Commanding General of the Hawaiian Islands. He has publicly stated that persons of Japanese ancestry have given a vital contribution to the rebuilding and defense of Hawaii after Pearl Harbor.

The lowest part of the Butte camp was the hardest hit, receiving the heaviest flow of the swollen rainwater.

Canal's pumphouse was put out of commission by the flood, and left the residents waterless from the early hours of the Sunday morning to about 10 a.m.

Roads became impassable, causing temporary delivery truck isolation but the roads will be passable by today, says Deucha.

The first rainstorm broke about 5 p.m. Friday, within 15 minutes, torrents of uncontrolled water were flowing through-cut the camp. The gong of the support mess bell found residents jumping a way from stream to stream to answer the call, while in some blocks, residents in assorted footwear waded in ankle to knee deep water. Weather man was kind on Saturday, with-holding the rain and strong wind until after the showing of the weekly movie. Late Sunday afternoon, Friday's scene was again repeated, preceded by a hailstorm as a variation.

MEDICAL FIELD OPEN TO GIRLS

WACs who have completed training courses in Physical Therapy approved by the Surgeon General and desire appointments as medical department Physical Therapy Aides with relative rank of 2nd Lieutenant may apply for a commission in the Corps.

Such moves can be made only after the approval of the Housing Department, it was stressed.

Evacuee influx to Chicago is on the wane, declares Shiburo Kido in his Timely Topics column of the Pacific Citizen.

For a while, it appeared as if this Middle Western city would become the mecca of nisei migration, says Kido, but inadequate housing conditions brought about many disappointments. The trend for resettlement seems to have shifted toward Detroit, Milwaukee, St. Louis and other parts.

Conditions in the states of Utah, Idaho, and Colorado are good today, says the JAFL leader. Utah seems to be the most friendly and the impartial newspapers and radio commentators of Salt Lake City deserve a great deal of credit.

In Colorado, the Denver Post unfortunately, has used the evacuees for sensationalism, Kido declares. There are many small communities in Colorado and Idaho where those of Japanese extraction cannot eat at restaurants or receive services at barber shops.
