### Application For Initial Clothes Issue Started

Preliminary groundwork through respective block managers is now being conducted for September clothing issuance, supervised by Toshitaro Ishikawa.

Since individual family cases differ to a marked degree, block managers are filling out applications for workers and their dependents. Those who have not filled blanks are requested to contact their block managers since definition of dependents is not similar in all families.

Subject to change, the first issuance will be in script, providing \$3.50 per month for persons 16 years of age or over; \$3 for 8 to 16; and \$2 for children 8 or under. Said script must, be dispensed at the community dry goods department in block 42.


### Butte Citizens To Cast Ballots

### EDITORIAL Warden Chief Discusses Liquor

LIQUOR -- The problems of liquor also is one of great importance, although the arrests for this type of violation have not equalled the number of arrests made for gambling violation. It must be kept in mind at times that this project is on an Indian Reservation and that it is contrary to Federal law to introduce liquor into such an aroa. This means that a man is guilty of a federal violation morely for transporting liquor into this community regardless of whether or not he imbibes himself. Liquor has been smuggled into the community by a number of ways. Negro porters employed in the various evacuee trains have sold liquor to eracuees, always at an exorbitant rate, usually at about five times the regular price. Certain visitors who visit evacuees, probably suffering from a pervert sense of loyalty often bring liquor in, in the form of presents, lany construction workers have sold liquor to evacuoes at various times again at exorbitant prices, Garbage men and swill collectors also have sruggled liquor into this community at various times in the past. The penalty for this violation is extremely severe, and it is believed that anybody found guilty of such a violation will be dealt with most harshly by the federal courts.

The liquor problem, like gambling, is one that can bost be solved by a happy public relations program. A firm public attitude of law enforcement and observance will do more to keep liquor out of this community than

all of the wardens employed in both camps.

# FIRST VEGETABLE CARLOAD SHIPPED OUT YESTERDAY

The first carload shipment of vegetables from the Gila farms left Casa Grande for Porton yesterday, according to K. Hamada, senior marketing specialist. This car was filled with 10½ tons of turnips, 4½ tons of beets, and a small trial shipment of squash. These vegetables were produced on John Oshige's field 69.

According to Hamada, another carload will probably be sent out this month but the bulk of the shipping will be in December when large quantities of cabbage, daikon, spinach, carrots and lettuce will leave Casa Grande for the other relocation projects.

However, future shipments will depend largely upon proper containers available. Due to shortage of shooks, the last shipment was made up of sacked vegetables.

# Local Nurseries Start Seedplots

The Rivers Nursories will soon raise tomato plants sufficient for 500 acres next spring. There will be enough plants for 20 acres in the near future, however.

The nursery has growing colory plants to be transplanted in December. Frank Namimatsu, veteran celery grower from San Jose and Brentwood districts, expects to experiment with the celery on field 65.

Five pounds of early eggplant seeds and three pounds of bell pepper seeds were sown recently. In addition, the nursery crew is raising a large variety of flower sets and tree plants for Gila residents.

The nursery requests that any person having "habucha" or "kusacha" sceds to donate them so that tea will be had next year at the mess halls.

### Farm Produces 58 Tons in October

Fifty-eight tons of vegetables, with the current market value of \$3,550.00, have been produced on the farms here during the month of October. As none of these products have been shipped out, the entire output has been consumed by the local residents.

B. Cozzens, i n speech directed to Rivers residents through the medium of meetings held last night Butte and Canal Council Representative and Block Managers, offered a WRA appeal to every eligible Rivers voter to cooperate with the Washington office on the mutually satisfactory settlement of these two questions:

Do the people in the Rivers communities want private industries established here paying prevailing wage scales?

If so, how will problem of wage differences be resolved?

Cozzens, as assistant director has regional charge of the economic development of WRA and under his division takes in the industrial development of six relocation areas.

he states, be-

a · lieves that it is possible t o negotiate terms o f business which it is in accord with and which pay and Thursday with prevailing wages with cortain industries which wish to establish work here.

He warned, however. since the WRA will insist on prevailing wages, that the difference between the evacuee wage scale and pay rates in private industry is a matter of no smail consideration. He cited the example of the cotton workers, whose higher rate of pay caused friction in the contor.
