Granted First Medical License

The first license to a Japanese American evacuee to practice medicine in Colorado was granted by the State Board of Modical Examiners to Dr. Howard Suenaga of Donver, formerly of Guadalupe, California, and Rivers.

Dr. Suenaga, 3 4, graduate of Jefferson Modical College, Philadolphia, has volunteered for military service and is weiting a call to the armed forces.

He was born in Hawaii, were his parents, who with his wife are residing with him in Denver.

When the evacuation of the West Coast was ordered, he was placed in charge of the hospital at the Tulare Assombly Contor, und or (continued on page 3)

During the first week thoro wore of October, 3,954 working on the projost excluding the job, segregation assignments, and the community enterprises. There are 167 unfilled jobs but it is expected that 500 more jobs will open through relocation by December 31.

There are only 407 unemployed persons on the project with most of them in the 46 years or over group. Even if all of thom were to be placed on jobs, the quota of 4,473 sot for this project could not be adhered to.

Our only solution is to replace young people who relocate by older men and women, said Huso.

EXCHANGE: TeiaMaruWaits For Gripsholm

Toic Meru, carrying American repatriates from Japan, has reached the exchange port of Hormagao and is waiting for the Swedish ship, Gripsholm, to steam into the Portuguese port, according to a radio announcement yesterday.

About one and one half months have passed since the Gripsholm sailed from the U.S. with about 1,500 Japanese repatriates, emong whom were 70 former Gilans.

EDITORIAL..

Resettlement, no matter in what city or town or farm, is the greatest adventure yet to becken on nisel during the brief years since he has reached his majority. He cannot successfuly go forth to find the future unless he has strong faith in his fellow men and faith in himself.

It will take courage to make this rehabilitation a worthwhile adventure. There will be many disappointments. Often he will be discouraged with his inability to climb the oconomic and social heights as rapidly as some resettlement advocates would have him believe possible.

But no matter where he goes or what kind of employment, housing and social life he finds, he must remember that the success or failure of resettlement de-

pends almost wholly on him as an individual.

There is no room for falling down. Any nise who loaves the perimeter of barbed wire and sets out to find America, goes out as an ambassador for many thousand other nise and their alien parents. As well on him depend the welfare and future well-being of the third generation Americans, their sons and theirs fellowing.

With such responsibility, a clearcut procedure must be followed. First of all, the nisei must be honest, as a workman and as a member of a community in America. He must sacrifice many of the seemingly important

things for the seemingly trifling.

He cannot be self-contered and expect his adventure to bring him any gains. He cannot constantly think of home as it used to be before the war and compare that life to that which he will find in resettling.

The matter of public relations is important, not only for himself but for the benefit of all other nisei whom he-whether he likes it or not-represents. The common courtesies and kindnesses in which he was schooled as a child are even more important to him now.


He must go cut of his way to be friendly and sceinble. A smile, friendly ned or kind word may win over a questioning neighbor or fellow employee. He must

assume the initiative to brook barriers.

Nisci must never lose the long range view of this resettlement. It is a chance to find America, an America which has no limiting enti-racial blocks so thick in California. It is a chance to contribute fully to our nation, in war and in the posce to come.

There are many who have faith in us. What we find depends entirely on us, and the future will be our making.

Kansas City Residents Aid

Several nights ago George Akiyama, a middleaged Issei relocatee from Tule Lake, was walking along a downtown Konsas City street -- window shopping and thoroughly enjoying the sights and sounds which one year center life had reduced to memories -- when he was suddenly accested by a drunk who snatched his wallet and fled. Mr. Akiyama immodiately gave chase, aided by several bystanders who were witnesses to the act. They apprehended the thief and called the police. Upon arrivals of the officers, tho broke loose and attacked Akiyama, calling, "Japl" and generally trying to blome his action on Akiyama's ancestry.

The reaction of the crowd was to favor Mr. Akiyama and hoot down the assailant. It urged the police to "arrost that drunk".--"give him what he deserves"---"slug him for hitting this gentlemen"---

The thief was arrested and called for trial bofore Judge Poul A. Buzard, in the Circuit Court. Prior to pronouncing sentence, Judge Buzard severely reprimanded the defendant. He said: "Mr. Akiyama is a law-abiding resident of the United States. Whother cr not he is a citizen is something not of his own choice and has no bearing in this matter. The fact is that he himself is not guilty of any crime against this country, and therefore will be accorded the protection of the

PAYROLL, CLOTHING PAYMENT DELAY EXPLAINED BY WOLTER

Delay in the payment of payrolls and clothing allowances was explained yesterday by Hugo Wolter, Community Management head.

It is very possible, that there will be further dolay in the August and September allowances, Wolter declared. This is due to several factors.

First, the nocessity of assigning various peoplo who have been working on the regular payroll to a separate segregation payroll. The Washington of-fice has requested that this be done in order to make an accurate check on the actual cost of sogregation.

Second, segregation and havo mado a relocation tremendous reduction in the Fiscal office personnel for which replacements have not been available. In one section alone, eight people have left and
