13,788 OUT ON N. Wisc. Farm INDEFINITE LEAVE

A total of 13,773 evacuees have relocated on indefinite leave as of September 30, according to a bulletin issued by the relocation planning division in Washington, D.C. Of this number 4,257 are in the Chicago area followed by 3313 in Salt Lake City. Denver area with 2504 closes into third place with Cleveland a fair fourth with 2108.

ASHFORK STAY NEGOTIATED

Negotiations for relocators to stay overnight at The Hi-Line Auto Court has been completed, according to William Hugo, Employment Officer. Persons departing from the project on leaves for eastern cities are urged to notify Toshi Kawai at the time approval sheets are filed of their desire for reservations. The manager of the court will meet the train and escort persons with reservations to the court.

Rates are \$2.50 per person, \$3.00 for 2 and \$3.50 for three in one court.

A court consists of a double and single bed, heater, arm chair and a combination shower and rest room.

Farm opportunities in northern Wisconsin are available to those who are interested in permanently resettling in that area. Immediate income from farming is difficult according to Hansen, relocation officer in charge of the area, due to the fact that some of the available farms have been neglected and it will be necessary to use chemical to bring them up to reasonable degree of productivity. The growing season ranges from 120 to 130 days. The rain fall averages 32 in. per year. As a general rule, the farm products are oats, corn, and potatoes with vegetables finding an excellent market at the numerous summer resorts in the area.

Defense Jobs Cleared Locally

An alternate procedure for work in defense plants has been verified by the relocation officer of Cleveland, Fred Ross. It consists of submitting names of applicants to a company who desires to work in plants doing war work. The list is then submitted to the area command who has authority to speed up clearance procedure. One of the companies requesting such list is the Federal Foundry Supply Company of Cleveland who have been promised by the Fifth Service Command that such names will be investigated by them. The submission of such a list does not necessarily mean that applicants will be accepted for employment prior to the obtaining of joint board clearance according to Ross. SCHOOL FEE WAIVED

Evacuees who relocate in Wisconsin and attend vocational or adult education schools will be except from non-resident tuition if they have intentions of relocating in permanent Wisconsin cities according to a recent decision handed down by the Assistant Attorney General of Wisconsin. The decision was instigated by John H. Putz, relocation officer of Madison, Wis.
