Committee Fights Nazi Tactics

The Pasadena Chapter of the Pacific Coast Committee on American Principles and Fair Play have issued a leaflet in an effort to combat unfavorable sentiments fomented by misguided citizens whose actions according to the leaflet is strongly reminiscent of the tactics of the Nazi Propaganda Agency. The leaflet further asserts that Nazi propaganda machinery has been activated to destroy national unity created more or less in all groups of the population by setting capital against labor, Catholics against Protestants, white against Negroes, Christian against Jews and white against Japanese.

A letter from Private R.E. Borchers of the U. S. Marine Corps to the National Executive Committee of the American Legion roundly condemns the California American Legion for promoting national purge. The Private demands to know if the National American Legion endorses the policy of the California Post of prosecuting loyal American citizens. The letter closes as follows: "We have fought the Japanese and are recuperating to fight again. We can endure the fight of battle but we are resolved not to be sold out at home."

INDEFINITE LEAVE AVERAGE HELD

Latest reports on the number of evacuees on indefinite leave show an increase of 943 between the period of September 30 and October 15. Of this number, 350 have relocated in the Chicago city area, 149 in Salt Lake area, 199 in the Denver region, Cleveland fourth with an increase of 157. In spite of the fact that winter is just around the corner, the evacuees have been relocating on the same average.

HUSO URGES LUNCH DISTRIB.

Negotiations are under way to have lunches furnished to all persons who relocate from this center. Reports from persons who have left previously point out that considerable hardship has been encountered in obtaining nourishment between Phoenix and Ashfork. Preliminary contact has been made with the Mess Operation unit by William Huso. Definite action on this matter has been promised by the Outside Employment office inasmuch as its responsibility does not end when the relocator leaves the confines of the center.

Indianapolis An Open Area

Unverified rumors that the Indianapolis area is closed for relocation is untrue, according to a teletype received from Herbert Keno, Relocation Officer in charge of the area.

Keno further states that many attractive offers are coming into this office and that acceptance of nice and aliens has made the Indianapolis area one of the best spots for relocation.

Y. SHIMIZU ADDED TO STAFF

Yasuo Shimizu, former manager of a large importing and exporting firm in Los Angeles was recently added to the Outside Employment office in Butte. He has traveled widely in the United States and is familiar with all sections of the country. Residents who are anxious to know of conditions existing in different cities are urged to come to the Outside Employment office and consult with Mr. Shimizu who is always available.

Met. Papers Create Interest

Daily newspapers from Chicago, Detroit, St. Louis and Minneapolis are now available at the Outside Employment offices in Butte and Canal. Persons, whether interested in relocation or not are urged to come to the offices and peruse the papers at their leisure. Especially important is this reading for those who are interested in relocation but have had fears of discrimination and persecution raised through the reading of Pacific coast newspapers. Impartial reports written in the various newspapers substantiate the contention of the WRA that the middle west and eastern areas are accepting evacuees as a normal course of events.

Cadet Nurses Training Available

Cadet nurses' training in Kansas City, Missouri is available for two girls who have graduated from high school in the upper third of the class, according to a teletype from the relocation officer in charge of Kansas City. Tuition and all fees are paid and living expenses, include room, board, laundry. Hospital and street uniform will be furnished plus an allowance of \$15 for the first nine months. The scale of pay is graduated until a maximum of \$30 per month is attained. In return for the education, a United States Cadet nurse must promise her services for the duration in either military or civilian nursing.

Those interested are urged to contact the Outside Employment offices at Butte or Canal as the opening is for immediate placement, and if there are no applicants in Gila River this offer will be submitted to other centers.
