## Cotton Harvest Drawing Near Seasonal Close

Harvesting of long-staple cotton by evacuee workers may come to an end as of midnight tomorrow, in that portion of Pinal and Maricopa County in Military Area No. 1 by the order of the Western Defense Command through Restrictive Order No. 25, which rescinds Restrictive Orders 17 and 22.

Orders 17 and 22 lifted the ban on the entrance of persons of Japanese ancestry into Military Zone 1 in Pinal and Maricopa Counties.

## A Letter to The Residents From The Project Director

The Acting Project Director and all staff members of the WPA are doing everything within their powers to secure items needed for the health and comfort of both communities.

The Federal Government and the WPA together with the help of the many residents of the community have been doing everything possible to build necessary school furniture.

Your Acting Project Director realizes that few of you consider it a crime to help yourself to lumber or anything which appears to be not in use on the project. Recently, after much difficulty and clearance with the War Production Board, we were able to purchase some lumber which is now stored in the Public Works Yard near the Administration Building in the Little Community for the purpose of building additions to the community which all of us will agree are urgently needed.

Already, some of this lumber has disappeared together with other needed items. I, therefore, request that all of you give to the administrative staff your help in protecting the property which is yours and that of the Federal Government. If items are continually removed that are already constructed such as shower heads, valves, electric fuses from the ironing room and the lumber from the Government stock pile, it will become necessary to cancel all orders that are now on hand which have been requested by the administration and which we realize are for your ultimate use.

To date, approximately 150 chairs have disappeared during the night from the school buildings. These chairs were built so that the children and young people of this community can receive an education.

We are giving the community an opportunity to return these chairs to the school or to their respective block managers by not later than November 14.

Therefore, will everyone assist in seeing that these chairs are returned; otherwise, the education of the young people of this community will be greatly injured. Your Acting Director hopes that it will not be necessary for the administration to take other action.

I trust that each person within the communities will see that this continual pilfering and waste of Government material ceases. I trust that everyone will assist us in this and assist yourself in rapidly securing the items which are needed in the communities.

### BARBED WIRE



## Medico States Camouflage Net Employees' Health Protected

Though still in its embryonic stage, the camouflage netting project is now underway with the selection of foremen for garnishing. At present, 24 are in training for the position, 5 women, and 19 men, who are working on sample patterns to be used in regular production.

As to the danger of illnesses caused by the lint in the air, Dr. Jack C. Sleath, superintendent of hospitals, states that there is none whatsoever from the medical standpoint. Besides being adequately ventilated, the burlap to be used will be dampened and all workers are to wear masks so that exposure to lint will be negligible, thereby protecting all workers to full capacity.

### NISEI SOLDIER VISITS MOTHER

With an insignia of the U.S. Army on his shining brass button, Pvt. Mataki Yeto from Camp Crowder, Mo., entered Gila colony last week as the first nisei soldier from a U.S. camp. He is visiting his mother, Mrs. Koto Yeto, at 51-7-A.

Nine carloads of evacuee property stored in Federal Reserve warehouses have arrived, Frank Norris, head of Maintenance Division, stated. More are still expected.

Of the nine carloads, 3 are from Sacramento, 5 from Santa Anita, and 1 from Fresno. Lack of warehouse space is delaying the transfer of the properties. Fifty-five vacant apartments are filled with the arriving freight. J.C. Henderson, supervisor of Housing and Employment, said that 359 apartments are now being used for emergency purposes, 164 of them for school.

Some of the youthful buglers may be sons of the middle-aged marchers in the thin line of belles faced men who wear the bright blue caps of the American Legion or the insignia of the Veterans of Foreign Wars. It will be a little parade, a pitiful parody by big town standards.

Some of these men fought overseas for America, their country by choice, not by birth. They fought for years after the Armistice, in the halls of Congress for the right to become citizens of America. Today is our restricted war time here. Let us all in reverence and gratitude towards the veterans, the sight of the flag they follow, should inspire many a nisei, wavering in the blasts of embittered criticism, to new faith and a renewed fight for their rights by birth.

## War Not Yet Won

United Nations successes in the last few days, while encouraging to a world hungry for freedom and peace, should be viewed with caution—for two reasons:

First of all, as we have seen from Nazi and Japanese successes, the winning of battles does not mean the winning of the war. And our position is still most insecure. We could still lose the Solomons. We could still lose the Caucasus or Stalingrad or both. We could well be taken by surprise by a Nazi thrust into the Middle East through Turkey or by a paratroop invasion from Crete into Egypt. And we don't yet know what manner of surprise has been prepared by the Nazis in Dakar facing Brazil.

The second reason lies in the elections of last week which showed substantial Republican gains. It will be remembered that a shift of political strength during Wilson's administration led to such bickering and petty politics that the United States forgot its place in the world and began the isolation which was to mean the death of the League and world government. This is not to say that the Republicans alone were or will be responsible for such shortsightedness. But the need for true statesmanship in both parties is so great that perhaps none can measure up to it. The situation will bear watching.

## Warden Windup Crime Notes

**PROSTITUTION**—The wardens' organization is vitally interested in the problem of prostitution for two important reasons, that is, public health and public morals. Thus far, very few cases of this illicit practice have been reported, an outbreak of this practice will be reflected in a high frequency of venereal diseases, which will immediately become a problem of the health department as well as of the police department. Commercial prostitution in this community should not be tolerated by any self-respecting member, and the public can cooperate with the wardens' office by reporting any such known cases to either the health department or the wardens' organization.

**NARCOTICS**—This community has been truly fortunate in that this type of social problem has been virtually non-existent. Narcotic addicts invariably commit crimes in order to obtain their products or money with which to buy quantities of narcotics. There has been truly splendid cooperation between the general public and the wardens' organization in keeping this practice completely suppressed in this community. The public is encouraged to report any cases of narcotic addiction immediately to the director of Internal Security or to the director of public health.

## Law Breakers

Three cases have already been reported of theft of property from bathrooms, according to W. F. Williamson, director of Internal Security.

Residents are warned against taking anything of value to the public bathhouses. "The thief goes into the bathroom when the victim is taking a shower and removes the victim's watch from his trouser," Williamson explained.

## BONFIRES TABOO

As to building of bonfires in early morning hours, Williamson is asking the cooperation of the residents with the fire department by eliminating them.

"This practice is strictly against fire regulations and is considered highly objectionable," Williamson added.

## MISSING CHAIRS

Acting Superintendent of Education Tom Sawyer, reports that approximately 150 school chairs are missing at the present time, causing many school children to sit on the floor.

"We are asking that those people holding these chairs return them immediately to the nearest school building," Sawyer said.

### Unit IX Possesses Largest Gila Vegetation Acreage

Unit IX with fields 65 and 66 developed has the distinction of having the largest vegetable acreage planted or to be planted in the near future. To date 160 acres have been planted and before the month is over there will be an additional 140 acres planted.

### Quality Daikon Being Harvested From Gila Farm

The long and anxiously awaited daikon is now being harvested, according to Min Omata, the "daikon king" and foreman of Unit IX field 66 where 55 acres of the crop was planted.

Fifty-six days after the seed was sown, the first batch of 110 crates were taken off the field yesterday. Forty acres of this Japanese radish will be pulled up during the remainder of the month.

Despite the fact that the harvesting of this crop was started in record time, the daikon averages 17 inches in length and 2 inches in diameter and the quality is excellent. According to the present estimates of the unit farmers on the field, 250 tons of this product is expected.
