Disturbances

Disturbances at Tule Lake, incited by agitators who made capital of an accident which was fatal to one and injured a number of others three weeks came to ar ond yesterday whon the army was ordered in to quiet it.

Dillon S. Myor, Director of the WRA, said yesterday in an intorview in Scattle that the ringleaders of the mess demonstration were making a bid to be sent back to Japan first. He said that the leaders have told residents that they will have no post-war opportunities in this country and that "the emporor will have a black mark against them (continued on page 4)

WAR TRAINING TO START HERE

A War Industries Training program finally was approved for Gila last week, following a conference of Dr. Joseph Samler, WRA director of vocat'l training and W. C. Sawyer, supt. of education, with the state officials.

The W.I.T. will provide tho instructor and assist with oquipment. Russel Talbott, one of the State Supervisor of the W.I.T. program was here yesterday to inaugurate the program. Auto mechanic classes will follow whon need for them in electrical refrigeration service, electrical service, and others will follow when need for them arisos.

The class will meet three nights a week, three hours a night, and will be open only to those who are working in a position calling for mechanical ability. Those who complete the course will be given a W.I.T. cortificate, similar to those issued by outside training centers.

DRIVE TOPS GOAL LATE YESTERDAY

The \$2,000 goal set for the War Fund and Community Chest Drive had boon exgooded by about \$250 early yesterday evening when tabulation at the central education office indicated \$2,246.72 already turned More was expected later last night and today.

The Drive is open until 6 tonight, and anyone who hasn't been contacted may take his contribution to block managers or to the central education office.

Thursday morning, \$755 was taken to Coolidge as Rivers' contribution to the National War Fund. The rest will go into the Community chest fund to be used for youth organizations here.

CO-OP REPORTS 3-MONTH PROFIT

Gila River Co-op Enterprises made a not income \$29,729.17 for the period between July 1 and Soptember 30, according to the statement of income and expense.

Total sales, profits from service division, and other in come totalled \$206,787.91. Total cost of sales and operating expenses amounted a \$177,058.74, leaving \$29,729.17 as not profit for the three month period.

The long awaited camouflage net fund totaling \$74,166.67 is in the hands of Project Director Leroy H. Bennett and will be turned over to the net fund trustees as soon as he returns this week end, according to word received by Project Attorney James H. Torry, Thursday.

The Project Director telephoned from California that he had obtained a certified check for the full amount after meeting with representatives of the United States Engineers and John M. Stahl, president of the Southern California Glass Company.

The trustees of the not fund, William G. Graham, Mats Ando, and Earl M. Yusa, are setting up the machinery for distribution. It will be necessary to prepare and obtain releases for each payment, said Project Attorney Terry.

Directors Seek Yuletide Refund

Gila River Co-op Board of Directors yesterday sent a teletype to Washington seeking an agreement by which about \$20,000 refund for the revolving fund cortificates may be redcemed in cash to residents here before Christmas, stated Masato W.Kato, socretary of the Co-op.

The Board of Directors' teletype proposes that the Co-op pay approximately \$10,000 toward the WRA loan and redeem in eash to Gila residents a b o u t \$20,000 Worth of rovolving fund certificates.

The teletype states that the Board believes it can safely make a \$30,000 payment since the Co-op's current assets are \$80,000, and adds that it would like to make the payment before Christmas.

SERIOUS=SERIOUS

During the winter months, nine other centers will be dependent upon Rivers for supplies of fresh winter vegetables. The farm management announced this week that during December, January, and February, Rivers will be shipping its heaviest allotment of produce to the other centers for the fiscal year.

Moanwhile, the employment division has been scouting through every conceivable means for more workers for every division. It also reports that a loss of more than 100 workers can be expected monthly. The farm, furthermore, reports that additional workers will be needed during harvest season.

A workable solution must be found to lick the problem. The community council, the employment division, and the farm management are looking into it. But at the same time, residents must come to see that the situation is sorious, and that some pretty serious measures must be adapted to relieve it.

To the Residents of the Rivers Relocation Center:



DOUBLE Trouble

The disturbances at Tule Lake brought to fore a g a i n the disturbing thought that the evacuees are between two fires.

The . ringleaders at Tulo Lake have no love for the evacues who have declared themselves loyal to this nation. When they incited the riots, they were aware that the effect would be detrimental to the relocation program. They have doclared that they refuse to produce food for evacuees in the nine relocation centers. Some of them have been identified as agitators who constantstirred up trouble of Lv one nature or another in the relocation centers before they were rounded up . by agonts of the FBI for transfer to the Loupp segregation center. Now they have created a situation at Tule Lake which will necossitate tougher management, perhaps, eventual army supervision.

All of this will play right into the hands of California racists who will make no discrimination and condorm all ovacues. And which trings us to the second fire. The racists have consistently ignored the records of loyal misei as soldiers, of loyal evacues who are working in American factories and fields to be a part of the nation's huge war offort.

Both fires have been deliberate attempts to hurt the evacuees. Of the two, potentially and actually, this second fire is more dangercus to evacuees, and certainly more dangercus—with their line of propaganda calculated to create racial unrest—to the cause of a united United Nations.

Evacuose can play their own game bost-and right two fires at the same time --by resettlement. They can then make enough uncavering friends east of the West Coost, who will discredit all the vile mouthings and proposals from the Coast.

STUDENT RELOCATION Louncil To Be Discontinued

Plans for the eventual liquidation of the National Japanese American Student Relocation Council were announced at a meeting in New York on Septomber 29, according to a release received here.

The organization will continue on a reduced hasis for the present, with final discontinuance set for March, 1944.

The Council was originally created to aid in relocating those misei students whose college education had been interrupted by evacuation. With their enrollment in colleges new on the same level as that before evacuation, Council officials believe that the primary aims of the group have been accomplished.

From Gila, 108 students have relocated on educational leave, while additional students, estimat-(continued on Page 4)

Poston Changes Administration

The administration of the Colorado River Relocation Center at Poston, Arizona, will be transferred next January 1, from the Department of the Interior to the War Relocation Authority according to a joint statement by Secretary of Interior Harold L. Ickes and War Relocation Authority Director Dillon S. Myer.

The Poston Center was the first of 10 built by the War Department to house persons of Japanese ancestry evacuated from the military area on the Pacific Coast,

Decision was made to establish the center, which was to be operated by the Indian Service before the WRA was created.

Under the WRA; the Poston center will continue to develop som'e 2,000 acres of farmland.
