> As far as the competition with your Co-op is concerned, the problem may not be serious. However, concerning violation of the instructions, various commercial laws, public health regulations, and finally, the discriminative profiteering on the part of some individuals, the matter is very serious, --serious enough for immediate action.

The Community Councils, realizing the need for the control of private enterprises, are said to be seriously investigating the problem for a possible solution. Such being the case, the Co-op is passing the buck to the Council which is well-qualified to tackle it.

SUBJECT: SECOND REPORT ON THE TULE LAKE INCIDENT

At the present time the adminstrative buildings of Tule
Lake are separated from the Japanese residential district by
high fences. The admistrative officers cannot enter the
Japanese district without the protection of the Army.

The Japanese evacuees have never returned to work in the administrative buildings since the Army took control over the center. However, from November 9th, the evacuees have hauled away the ashes from the furnaces.

The loyal group of the evacuees were removed from the center on November 10th. The farm crops are being harvested by about 237 evacuees who were sent from other relocation centers.
