

NEW HOSPITAL OPENING SET; DEDICATION CEREMONY SUN.

With the theme "KNOW YOUR HOSPITAL," the formal opening of the Butte units of the Rivers Community Hospital will be held on Sunday, November 22, from 1:45 to 4:30.

Because of the limited room available, only those holding invitations will be admitted to the dedication ceremonies to be held in the dining hall under the chairmanship of Dr. William J. Furuta, chief sanitation officer and chairman of the Canal Community Council.

Employers Seeks Order Exemption

Efforts are being made by the Smith-Thornburg, Ward, and Hathcock ranches to be exempted in the order from the Western Defense Command which halted evacuee harvesting of long staple cotton in Military Area 1.

Floyd Smith of the Smith-Thornburg ranch stated in a telephone conversation with J.C. Henderson, Supervisor of Housing and Employment, that Dillon Myer, WRA National Director, is expected today in Phoenix to confer with the governor and the cotton growers.

Robert B. Cozzens, acting project director, will deliver the dedicatory address, and a representative of the Community Council will accept on behalf of the community. Among other features of the dedication ceremonies will be brief talks by Dr. Jack C. Sleath, chief medical officer; Dr. Kunitada Kiyasu; L.T. Hoffman, chief of the community services division, and musical numbers including a vocal duet by Sally and Julia Seiji of Canal. Light refreshments will be served.

BLACKOUT SIGNAL FOR RIVERS TOLD

Siren blasts from fire trucks will notify Gilans in the event of a blackout, disclosed the project director. A series of short blast lasting approximately three minutes will announce the blackout. The sirens will give one long blast for about sixty seconds for the all-clear signal. Colonists are urged to be on the alert, in the case of a power failure.

Private Industry Rulings Revised

A recently issued WRA Administrative Instruction places upon the director of the project the responsibility of providing work for all residents capable and willing to work, according to Acting Project Director, R. B. Cozzens.

"Since ordinary work within the project will not, as the project progresses, provide that type of employment, it will be necessary for WRA to bring in to relocation areas outside private industries, which industries will pay prevailing wages," Cozzens said.

Cozzens, therefore, believes the question discussed and placed before the communities to be one of how should the wages of those working in private industries over an above the normal WRA cash advance be divided among the community?

"I would greatly appreciate it if all residents of the community would give this question earnest consideration at this time so that a report could be furnished through the Council and Block Managers to the director and administrative staff," Cozzens added.

PRIORITY BALKS VALUE SHIPMENT

Due to priority difficulties, contractors have been unable to replenish the supply of safety valves for boilers in Butte, thus causing shut-down of all showers and all but four laundry heating units.

It is not known when a shipment will arrive for installation.

Constitution To Be Previewed

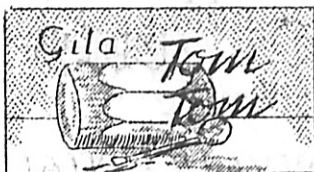

Liberals Fight For The Nisei

A fear, that the evacuees--nisei and all--will be shipped to Japan after the war, is growing. The late scare--and it was only a scare--of Congressional action toward deportation of evacuees was no allaying influence; nor is the rising resentment against all people of Japanese descent in home communities. Public utterances by supposedly responsible leaders in the more sensational periodicals further confuses the nisei and issei.

The fear is not all. It is engendering a philosophy of defeatism--particularly among the nisei--an attitude of mind that is death to progress of any nature.

Many nisei, citizens of this country, matured by its culture, seem to be turning tail when the going is becoming tougher--losing fight in their duty to America and all liberal people to bring an unassailable equality to Americans and the people of the world of all colors and race.

This America--this movie-going, gum chewing, soda-slugging, freedom-loving land, whose fault was that it was carefree and content with the status quo in a changing world; this land that the nisei are accustomed to, whose culture breathes in their spirit, which has despite its limitations won their loyalty; this land they call their own--the nisei cannot deny it now.

THIS is no time to lose perspective. There is, despite a rising reactionary spirit in America of shallow people, a growing conviction in liberal circles that the evacuees have been denied justice and that America must adjust its aims to a higher goal.

The nisei must back these people to the hilt, these people who are striving for a world where majority and minority groups may live together without friction and with cooperation.

Plug Chain on a Zoot Suit

We could understand the leftover rice drying in the sun, the reported thefts of food, and the private hoards of canned goods, as symptoms of uncertainty beset minds in a rumor diseased populace.

We could understand the complaints and petty bickering of the people in the distraught days of last summer, when dust and despair and desert heat settled deep on Rivers.

But words like these are puzzling, as we read in a report, "The wood supports of a school, go slow sign, were stolen within twenty four hours after the sign was put up." "150 chairs have been stolen from the school rooms." "Every chain and plug has been taken from each laundry tray in the wash room." "It is reported that these are being worn as watch chains." We are not proud to associate a people once noted for honesty with the moral level that is characteristic of zoot suits.

We note in another project newspaper that the staff were forced to skip one issue due to a shortage of paper.

Probably no one would notice if we failed to circulate some Wed. or Sat. but we have had our close shaves in that direction too. So, it is in order that before we leave our duration home for a short trip to the other side of the fence, that we take time to tell some stories.

We have wondered too, particularly, after those issues when the content is dry as the dust on the office desk, just how the word news crept into the publication title. We do know now, on reconsideration, that it was inserted in deference to the Tulare News, Ed. Brownie Furutani, and his hard working staff of youngsters, who in the main, comprise the present News-Courier staff.

Brownie is raising chickens in Texas now. He should do well after his experiences in fathering the brood of chicks he had in Tulare. They work hard, these youngsters, and when you see the bright lights burning in rec. 57 at midnight, you will know that it is another edition of the paper going to press. Eight hour days and the news staff are strangers to each other. We have read in other news sheets too, of supply shortages. We can tell you that if it had not been for the equipment that Tulare brought down with them, that this center would not have had a paper as soon as it did. So, if your name is not correctly spelled, or the item about your club was cut to nothing, have patience. The news element in the News-Courier is working hard.

BIRTHS, NEW ARRIVALS BOOST RIVERS POPULATION TO 13,242

With the addition of births, and new arrivals in the colony, the population of Rivers communities has reached a total of 13,242, reported the housing department in its press release. Figuratively speaking, there are 4,942--Tulare; 3,572--Tullock; 3,018--free zone; 1,285--Santa Anita; 360 from Stockton, Fresno, Tanforan and other centers; 35 births, and 30 releases from internment camps.
