Census Determines Issuance;
Non-Registrants Urged To Report

Effective on August 1 for those employed 15 days during that month, monthly clothing allowances will be issued in cash rather than script, revealed an announcement from E. R. Fryer, regional WRA director, received by Acting Project Director R. B. Cozzens.

Issuance of clothing allowance will be determined by the individual census file; therefore, all those who have not had their interviews are requested to do so immediately. Ground work for clothing allowances are being delayed through the negligence of individuals who have refused to cooperate in registering for the census when asked to report, declared James Nakagawa, supervisor of records.

Allotments for the following months will be conducted on a similar scale with computations for amounts due to each employee. Those eligible are employees and their dependents, who are neither working or receiving unemployment compensation. Direct payments are made to those employed in addition to the family head.

In cases where surplus army clothing has been issued, no deductions will be made from cash allowances, stated Fryer.

ONLY APPROVED
HOUSING CHANGES
TO BE PERMITTED

The housing department has been troubled by the people moving or changing barracks without the authorization from the housing department within the center.

All movements must be sanctioned, approved and recorded first by the housing department. All such movements shall then be acknowledged by the block managers—both the manager of the former and new location.

Any movements, therefore, not approved as above stated, shall not be recognized, and person or persons occupying any unauthorized apartment shall be ousted from that apartment.

Editorial

Wage Adjustment Needed Now

It was announced that private industry will come to Rivers. The question of how the wages of workers in such industry, over and above the basic WRA work advances, are to be disposed of remains.

In the meantime, cotton work, now suspended, brought income to many laborers greatly in excess of WRA advances. Friday, 35 residents were hired by the Sundt Contracting Company at prevailing wages, upwards of 80 cents an hour, to wash hospital windows. There will probably be instances of this type of work in the future.

It is evident that an urgent need for the institution of some equitable system for the distribution of pay above WRA advances exists now. Yet there has been nothing concrete done about this as yet. Whether private industry is brought in or not, the need will exist. It is time to stop wrangling about the merits and the demerits of private industry, and sit down to the task of deciding whether or not this community will have a disparate wage scale and if not to set down the procedure.

Because we believe that this community should not have more cause for friction, we believe that we should not permit the status quo. We believe that the community Council should, as soon as possible, recommend the appointment of a board by the Project Director from Canal and Butte to work out a system of distribution, which system to be submitted upon completion to the people for approval.

ADDENDA

Latest reports state that colonists may again resume cotton harvesting in the very near future. This possibility makes even more imperative, the need for immediate action on the above proposition.

APPEAL TO REFRAIN FROM STOCKING SUPPLIES ASKED

An appeal that the residents refrain from stocking with canned goods, soaps, drugs, dry goods, and other commodities came from Gilbert Kuramitsu, general manager of Community Enterprises. Kuramitsu stated that the stores had an established credit rating now and were buying from firms from the Pacific to the Atlantic coast. It has been arranged to have pies and cookies in daily.

State taxes of 2% on everything that is sold, and 10% luxury tax on certain goods, are added to the purchase prices, Kuramitsu added.

Sixty per cent of classification wages will be paid evacuees as unemployment compensation after being unemployed for 15 days following registration or termination of job unless (1) suitable employment has been refused; (2) discharged for cause deemed fair after a hearing; (3) he is unqualified for employment because of physical disability; or (4) the welfare section specifies him unqualified for employment because of family situation.

FIELD 69 ACCREDITED AS FIRST PRODUCING PATCH

Field 69 with the total acreage of 236 acres is the largest single field of the Gila farms and is located on Unit X. This field earned the distinction of being the first unit to produce any vegetable when the first batch of red radish was harvested six weeks ago. To date 69 has produced the bulk of the products that have been harvested from the local farms.

Rivers Ships More Produce

The first batch of daikon left the Gila farms this morning with a carload of turnips and beets. The initial 50 sacks is just the beginning of the huge quantity of daikon to be shipped out.

The next car scheduled to leave at the end of the week will have the major portion filled with this Japanese radish. Min Omata, the "daikon king," reports that about 50 men are busy pulling up the product which is of very excellent quality and should make good "tsuke-mono."

Raffle tickets for the Harvest Festival are selling fast since their appearance Monday afternoon at Canal. MESS 52 TO FIELD IMPROVED SQUAD AGAINST THUNDERBOLTS IN TOSS-UP TILT

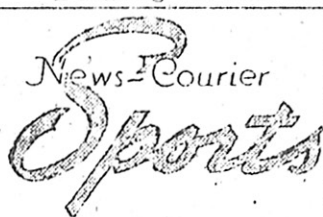
As the National Grid League roars down the home stretch, the Bulldogs meet the Unknownns in their final game of the season at 4 p.m. on field 2.

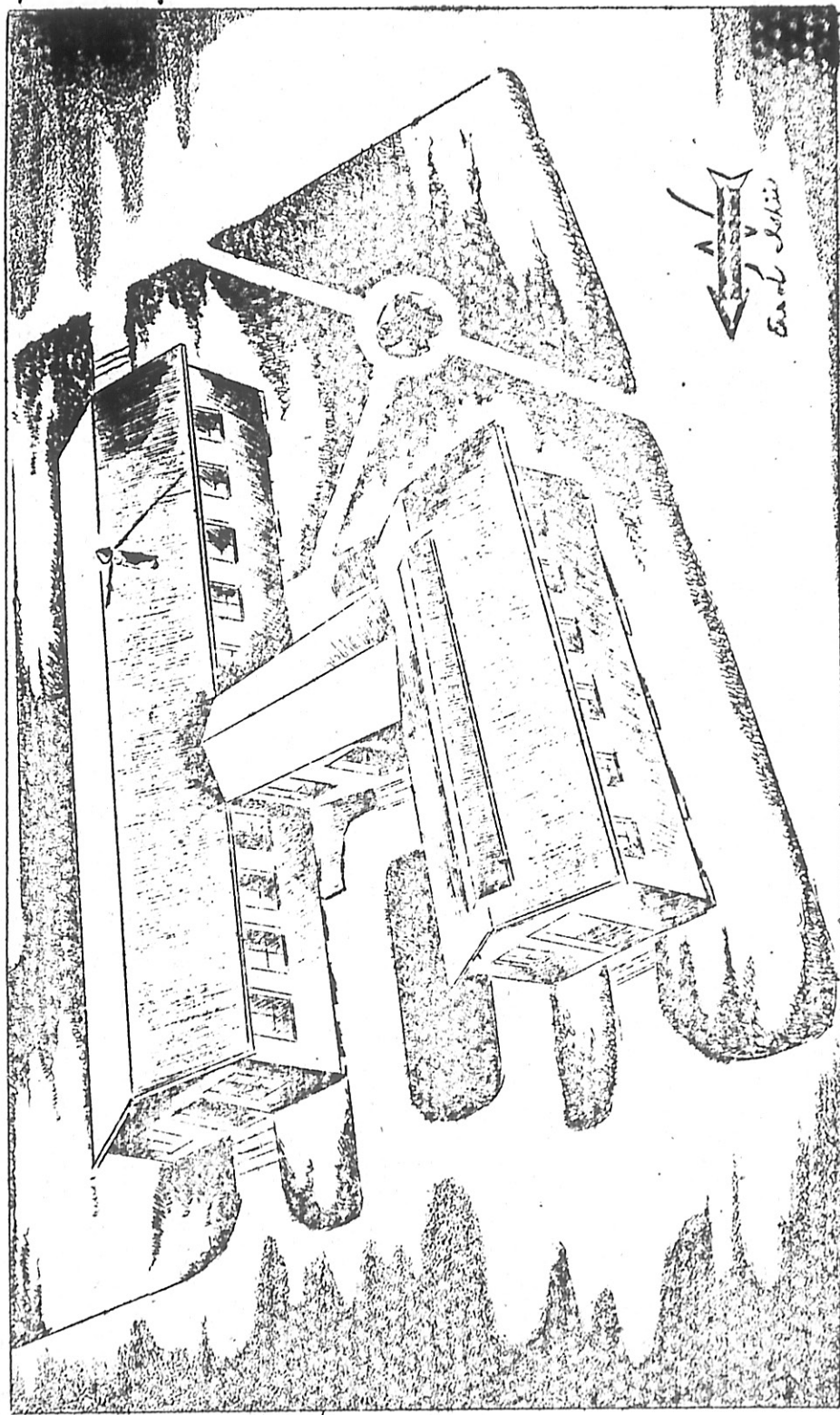
