Three plans (or any modification of them) were
submitted to the workers by
E. L. Sandcliff, chief of
WRA Industrial Division,

The project has been converted into a private enterprise paying prevailing wages. The workers on it will pay \$20 a month and \$16 a month subsistence fee for themselves and each dependent respectively.

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
#### Bonfires Prohibited in Colony


