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NISEI DRAFT OPENS

CHICAGO MEET

Cause Given For Cancellation

One of the reasons that the proposed Chicago relocation conference of evacuees was called off is that too many centers refused to send delegates at their own expense.

Many centers did not realize that it was being called by evacuees themselves, that it was originated by the residents of Heart Mountain.

A letter from Washington, explaining more in detail the causes for the cancellation, should be coming soon, stated Hugo Wolter, community management head.

WRA STEPS UP LEAVE CLEARANCE

A backlog of 2000 leave clearance hearing dockets are ready to be returned to the nine centers from Washington, and 500 cases are being handled weekly by 15 Washington staff members, according to a telephone call to Hugo Wolter by John Provinse, WRA community management head.

Provinse declared that the above statement can be given as a definite assurance to the people of Rivers. Wolter said he expected about 250 leave clearance cases should be coming to Rivers within the next two days.

At least 3000 more cases from the nine centers are at Washington to be reviewed by the leave clearance committee in Washington. At 500 a week, at least six weeks will be required before the leave clearance review is completed.

RECLASSIFICATION WILL START

Plans have been completed for the reinstitution of Selective Service for nisei, the War Department announced Thursday, Jan. 20.

Under the War Department plans, Japanese Americans considered acceptable for military service will be reclassified by their Selective Service Boards on the same basis as other citizens, and called for induction if physically qualified and not deferred.

It is not known when reclassification of nisei by local boards will start or how soon draft will actually begin to be operative.

NAKAGAWARA

NISEI GIRL NOW AIR WAC

Mrs. Cherry Nakagawara, believed to be the first nisei WAC to be accepted for air corp duty, started her basic training at Camp Oglothorpe, Georgia, reported the Pacific Citizen.

A former Oakland resident, she is the wife of T/4 Y.C. Nakagawara who is stationed at Camp Bowie, Texas.

The Pacific Citizen editorialized:

"Good reading was the news that WAC induction as has been promised is unsegregated...In addition, nisei women are eligible to serve in all units of the WAC...(including) the air corps, a unit so far closed to men of Japanese ancestry."

Last February the 442nd Combat Team composed of Japanese American volunteers was formed. In a letter to the Secretary of War commenting on the formation of this unit, the President said:

"To loyal citizen of the United States should be denied the right to

Dillon S. Myer, WRA director, declared that the War Department announcement was recognition of the valuable service rendered by nisei soldiers. His statement follows:

"The announcement by the War Department that nisei are to be inducted into the army through the Selective Service system marks another significant step forward for American citizens of Japanese descent. It means that Japanese (continued on page 2)

exercise the responsibilities of his citizenship regardless of his ancestry. The principle on which this country was founded and by which it has always been governed is that Americanism is a matter of the mind and heart; Americanism is not, and never was, a matter of race or ancestry."

The excellent showing which the Combat Team has made in training and the outstanding record achieved by the 100th Battalion (a former Hawaiian national guard unit) now fighting in Italy were major factors in the present plan.

Detailed information regarding the change in policy is being air-mailed from Washington.

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EDITORIAL

DRAFT - A LONG STEP

It was surely time that the role of nisei soldiers and civilian war workers won concrete recognition. From the sweltering jungles and the frozen tundra of the Pacific theater of war to the rain-drenched muddy terrain on the Italian battlefield, the nisei soldiers have distinguished themselves and given a stirring account of their loyalty. At Camp Shelby, Mississippi, several thousand nisei, almost all volunteers, are preparing themselves for combat duty with the double mission of serving their country and vindicating the integrity of their ethnic minority. Seven or eight thousand other nisei soldiers are scattered throughout the nation at various army posts. On the home front, the loyal nisei and issei in Hawaii and on the mainland are serving honorably in the production battle. It is only proper that this effort has been recognized at last by the War Department with the re-institution of Selective Service for the nisei.

Although the doubts regarding the loyalty of nisei which eventually culminated in an evacuation was essentially undemocratic, the evacuees are aware that the past two years have been years of trial. In those two years, the jury of the American public has been converted from indifference to interest. The War Department announcement is one of the strongest evidences to date that the loyal nisei have passed the test.

Over and above the tribute paid and the confidence reposed in the loyal nisei by the War Department, the new policy gives the evacuees, the WRA and interested Americans one of the most potent weapons they have had to combat the "lies, half-truths and exaggerations" regarding the evacuees propagated by the demagogues. The unbiased in America cannot help but be assured that if the army can be confident of nisei loyalty then they can be no less so. And the responsibility that the nisei will assume as service men can engender no less a responsibility on part of the American public in accepting the nisei and returning them their full civil rights and privileges.

The War Department announcement was a long step toward the desired end of full restitution of nisei rights and privileges as American citizens. Without this, even though the nisei may have passed the test, America will fail to pass through the test of democracy, and ten million Americans will have warred in vain.

Americans soldiers now in the army have performed their duties with high skill and courage, and that the valuable services rendered by such soldiers have been recognized.

"The obligation to bear arms in defense of the nation is one of the essential elements of American citizenship. As increasing numbers of nisei are called upon to assume that obligation, it feels

confident that soldiers of Japanese ancestry in the army will acquit themselves with distinction and that there will be widening public recognition of the status which all loyal and law-abiding residents of Japanese descent can and should enjoy in our national life."

Ex-ambassador Joseph Grew has said:

"I want to see them (nisei) treated as we rightly treat all other American citizens."

Induction To
Take Time
Says Provinse

"The announcement of re-institution of Selective Service as applied to Japanese Americans should not be the occasion for their return to relocation centers, if they have already relocated," teletyped John Provinse, acting WRA director from Washington. The rest of his statement follows:

"The induction of the eligible men will be gradual and will take place over a considerable period of time. After a man passes his physical examination, making him eligible for induction, there will be a period of 10 to 90 days in which he can arrange his affairs and visit relatives and friends if he so desires. In most cases, this period will be at least three weeks. It is at such a time that a man about to be inducted might properly consider returning to the center for a visit, but to do so now would be exceedingly inadvisable.

WRA relocation supervisors and officers are instructed to adhere to the present policy governing return to the centers and are advised the desire to return to await a call from the Selective Service Board is not to be considered sufficient basis for approving readmission to a center. Project Directors are advised to accept persons only as paying visitors returning to centers without proper approval of the relocation supervisor or officer."

RELOCATION TEAM
TO VISIT GILA

A request has been sent to Washington for a relocation team to visit Rivera, announced William Huso, relocation chief.

The team will come to Rivera sometime in February, he said.

Visits by the relocation team are being made to project sites which it is invited either by the community council or project director.

TRAINING ON TAP FOR RECREATION LEADERS

Persons interested in training for recreational positions on the project and after relocation are urged to attend the first of a series of "Fun-By-Doing" meetings to be held 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, Jan. 25 at 59-C, announced Hugo Wolter, community management head.

The meeting is open to all present leaders in children's and young people's activities and to those who want to know more about them regardless of past experience.

Preliminary discussions have shown that community activities are lagging for various reasons, Wolter said. Recreational activities of Butte will be placed directly under the recreation commission of

the community council. The problem will be referred to the council, and it is expected that the council will refer the matter to the recreation and playground commission for exhaustive study and preparation of recommendation to the executive board.

Sling Shot Use Barred

In order to prevent serious injury, parents should discourage their children from using sling shots, the Butte Block Managers decided at Tuesday's regular meeting.

Toshio Kinoshita, central block manager, stated that a case of injury by sling shots has already been called to the attention of the block managers. To prevent recurrence of such accidents, the block managers urged parents to stop the use of sling shots.

STORING OF OIL MAY CAUSE FIRE

Storage of fuel oil in and around the apartments of residents should be stopped to eliminate a serious fire hazard, declared Fire Chief E.D. Mauser.

Recurrent shortages are not to be expected in the future, and it is hoped that residents will cooperate to eliminate the unnecessary storage of fuel oil, Mauser said.

A recent inspection tour of the center has revealed an excessive storage of fuel oil on the premises and in the apartments of residents as a result of the temporary fuel shortage the past few weeks. All safety and WRA regulations prohibit the storage of oil in and around living quarters. Chief Mauser declared the fire department will appreciate the cooperation of residents.

Huso Spikes Leave Rumor

Rumors originating in Poston that persons who apply for leave clearance and do not leave right away would be placed on the stop list, are without any foundation whatsoever, announced William Huso, relocation head.

Filing an application does not mean that a person has to go out, explained Huso.

A person may apply for leave clearance whether he is leaving now or half a year later, and still have his application effective when he leaves, said Huso.

Project Cotton Goes To Mill

First shipment of the project-raised cotton to the cotton gin in Chandler was made Wednesday, according to Raleigh Senderson, assistant farm supt.

About two tons have been sent. Previously, all the cotton raised on the Rivers farm had been sent to the cotton gin in Sacaton, but it had closed down.

The harvesting of the crop, 40 acres in all, has been two-thirds finished. It is expected to be completed sometime during the next week. The yield is expected to be about 17 to 18 bales of ginned cotton, 500 pounds per bale.

The cotton and the cottonseed oil from it will be sold to an outside market. The pressed cottonseed will be made into cakes, to be fed to the project livestock.

USO Fifteen Soldiers Attend Social

More than 70 persons, including about 15 visiting servicemen, attended the Butte USO party Thursday night at mess hall 41, stated Midori Satomi, USO chairman.

Bessie Nagahori was general chairman of arrangements. The group enjoyed dancing, games, and refreshments.

Appeal Board In Tule Soon

An Appeals Board will soon be established in Tule Lake to hear residents who wish to be considered for transfer to other WRA centers, says the WRA Information Digest issued Jan. 1, 1944.

The new board will be composed of prominent civilians, otherwise not associated with WRA, and will include West Coast attorneys, businessmen, and civic leaders.

The need for an Appeals Board is apparent, says The Information Digest, in view of the large and difficult task of segregating disloyal evacuees and the possibility that some injustice may have been done to a few loyal persons.

FLAG PRESENTED TO JUDICIAL COMM.

The Canal courtroom will be dignified by a large American flag presented to the Judicial Commission by the Canal Internal Security. The Commission and Canal Community Council expressed gratification. Said Mats Ando, chairman of the Council, "It's exactly the touch necessary."
