R.L. Portor, administrative assistant at the state headquarters of Selective Sorvice in Phoenix, announced Henry Freeland, leave officer.

The procedure for reclassification and induction as outlined by Freeland are as follows:

(3) Sgt. Porter will then send the list of names to the center.

(4) Men whose names appear on the list will be .contacted by the leave office and asked to give the numbers and addresses of their local boards in California.

(5) The information received will be transmitted daily to the Phocnix Solective Sorvice headquarters.

(6) Names and information will then be sent to the respective local boards for reclassification.

(7) Namos selected by the local boards will be sent to Phoenix whore the call for induction will be issued.

EDITORIAL:

STORE UPON STORE

Despite a record for which it need not blush considering the handicaps under which it works, the community councils have yet to win universal regard in the center as a useful and worthy people's organ. It yet is to win the recognition of the American public as a manifestation of the democracy of the center and evacues. It still has to pile stone upon stone on the structure of community and national respect. One of the larger stones with which this structure can be constructed is the investigation undertaken by the Internal Security Commission of the Butte Community Council.

Investigations are a tool of democracy-one of the protective devices that have been created to safeguard the people who make that democracy possible. If this right is abused, the democratic system which created it is endangered; if correctly used, it can be a powerful weapon in maintaining it. It protects the community from abuses, for investigations are called when reasonable doubt exists that a trust, responsibility, or power is being abused. It protects the innocent individual or group from public censure.

And the fact of an investigation here is unintentionally serving a purpose which will rebound to the good of the community. As persons of Japanese ancestry, the evacues have been investigated in one form or another for two years. These inquiries have almost invariably taken the form of a persecution rather that that of importial hearings (e.g. Dies Committee). The result is that investigations and investigating com-

that of importial hearings (e.g. Dies Committee). The result is that investigations and investigating committees have come to hold an unsavory connotation, despite the fact that there are others, and in the majority which have made therough studies of the problem in question and have submitted honest reports and recommendations based on facts gathered fairly and importially. But now Rivers has its own committee. This has brought to the residents a clearer light on the functions and purposes of such committees. It is a reminder that investigations serve an essentially de-


With this background the council is well-prepared on the lesson of how not to conduct an investigation. If it has learned its lesson and conducts its inquiry with intelligence, courage, honosty, and an eye toward eventual community good, the council can make a substantial addition to the structure of respect men-

Recent charges by Lt. Gen. Do Witt against the loyalty of the Japanese-Americans residing in the Santa Maria Valley were blosted by Harry Miyake, center leader, who was a former leader in the valley.

Said Miyako, "Almost every utility, air field and bridge came in after the district was improved for ferming and established by the Japanese. Oil fields came in just recently and the ferm project was there when those se-called oil fields were discovered."

As to DeWitt's state-" ... only a few ment: miles south, in the Santa Ynez valley, lay an area equally as productive agriculturally as the Santa Maria Valley and with lands equally available for purchase and lease, but without any strategic installations There were no whatover. Japanese in Santa Ynez comes Miyako's Valley," answer: "This proves that Do Witt doesn't know what is talking about when he comes to agricultural land. The type of furming that could be done is dry farming. It is dry, hot, and without railroad and ice facilities. Furthermoro, there were Japanese forms in Santa Ynoz Valley many years ago, but they found that it was not practical or profitable.

"Various Japanese-Lasad land has been enneelled or terminated to have these strategic utilities. In good many cases, the Japanese leasing their land have not ever got their damage back." ended Miyeke.

Wages, Clothing Subject To Tax

Wagas and clothing allowances paid to evacuoes by the WRA, Co-op, or by any other employer must be regarded as income to evacuees for income tax purposes, the Eureau of Internal Revenue has rulei.

The list of payments that are not regarded as income for income tax purposes is as follows:

1. Subsistence furnished evacuees, including food, housing, me di cal care, and education.

2. Public assistance grants.

3. Unemployment COM pensation.

4. Clothing allowances paid to evacuoes involuntarily unemployed.

5. Travel grants for evacueos granted leave.
