NOSEO SERGEANT DAL DISCRIMINATION

Before the Colorado House of Roprosontatives, a nisel army sorgount from Camp Carson pleaded with mombors of the legislature to refrain from encetment of of laws that would prohi-bit Japonese alions from owning property, according to the Arizona Ropublic.

Ho appeared unharalded, at a meeting called by the constitutional amendments committee of the House to discuss several proposed amendments to the Colorado constitution which would prohibit Japanese aliens from buying or owning property.

"I am an Amorican by birth; and 1 t means a A. great doal to me, "ho said. "Thore bro thousands of people who are suffering and dying ... not because

they are black or white,

Japanese or something else ... but because they are believers in democracy.

"" arc going overseas. We are going to be hungry ... to be scared. Muny of us are going to be crippled.

"We are not asking for special privileges. We a ro only asking for a chance to show that we do believe in democracy."

At the end of the hearing, the committee annonneed that it expected to refer some form of a proposed constitutions 1 amondment to the House for consideration.

Such a proposal, if adopted by a two-thirds vote 'of the legislature, would be submitted to the voters for approval a t the olection in Nevember it was said.

AMERICA "At War With Deeds Men Do"

"Te are at war not with races, not with colors -but with the deeds men de,"
declared John W. Vandercock, Blue Network and NB C
news commentator, in discussing the reaction of
the American people to the
recent announcements of
Japanese atrocities in two
const-to-coast breadcasts
from New York City over
the Blue Network on Friday
and Sunday, Jan. 28 and 30,
1944.

Vindercock said that the Japanese are not clone in the commission of atrocities. Taking issue with an indignant senator who describes the atrocities on Luzon as "the worst thing: that over happoned," ho osks, "Has he forgotton then, what the Gormans did to the Jous in Warsaw? Has he forgetten the butchery at Lidico? Or did ho boliove those stories? For they woro true. Moro people -have been tortured and butchored by the Gormens in Europe, simply because the Germans have had greater opportunities, in all probability, than the Japs in Asia."

But boccuse the Japanese, are of another race there is a danger that the hatred of the Japanese may take on a sharper edge. This twisted course, he said, "locds these who are guilty of it into the company of Adolph Hitler..."

He declared that any who make the suggestion that America should vent its rage upon the quarter of a million men, women and children of Japanese ancostry in this country and Hawaii " rank selves oven lower in the scale of decent human "Valucs than the Japanese officers who were responsible for the horrors of Luzon. As overy civilized human boing knows, but somotimes finds it hard to remember, there can be no contest in brutality."

Ho continued, "All thoughtless Americans who suggest that we should revenge ourselves upon Japanese civilians; the poorwhites who snarl on the street corners near the

Sometimes an obviously adverse circumstance produces reactions and reverberations which completely reverses the original adversity and in effect produces a favorable condition which any number of favorable circumstances may not have been able to de.

When the NBC ruled that Sgt. Kurcki could not appear on the Ginny Sirms program, it, but added further incentive to Kurcki's fight against in telerance in the West Coast. (Last week before the Commonwealth Club in San Francisco he declared, "... I believe that loyal Americans of Japanese ancestry are entitled to the democratic rights which Jefferson propounded, Washington fought for and Lincoln died for.") It arcused the Sn Francisco Chronicle to a critical editorial and stories which tell of the injustices that Kurcki and other Americans of Japanese ancestry suffered.

The American sense of justice to the soldior is keen. Sgt. Kurcki is an American here, and every real American believes that he is entitled to speak his piece and entitled to all the privileges that are common to Americans.

We protest the denial of freedom of the air to any American or for that matter any law-abiding resident. We believe all men short of seditionists and libellers are entitled to say their say. But we shall not seem the turn of fate which bemeranged an apparent adversity to good.

Any person of Japaneso encostry who enters the prohibited areas of the Western Defense Command without a proper permit will be either prosecuted or foreibly removed, Lieutenant General Deles C. Emmens, Commanding General, Western Defense Command, announced today following the foreible removal of Mesanebu Hete in Southern Californic.

Hata, 27 year-old Japanese American recently released from a War Relocation Project, entered the evacuated areas on Jan. 24, 1944, without a permit, went to his former residence at Lemita, suburban community of Los Angoles obtained his automobile which had been stored for him by a friend, and was apprehended by the Foderal Bureau of Investi-

gation near Elytho, Calif., on routo to his destinetion at St. Louis.

"Today's action of the military in evicting Masanobu Hata is strictly in accord with the terms of the Public Proclemations herotofore issued, governing the exclusion of persons of Japanese encestry from specified areas," so id the Commanding General

"It will sorve as notice to any and all of the remainder of the 110,000 persons of Japenese ancestry evacuated from the Pacific Coast that they must not return without the special permits authorized by the original Proclamations." Similar action or rigid prosecution will follow any attempts of other evacuees to enter the area."

Nisci farmers who have relocated may make applications for loans through firm, 5 - day, 40 hour the Rural Rehabilitation Loan; announced Harry S. Muir, regional director of the Farm Security Administration in Milwaukce, Wisconsin.

> There are no legal objections to making loans 'to American citizens of Japanese ancostry provided they are not interned in contors established and maintained by the WRA, ho said.

Ono of the oligibility requirements of all applicents is that the family must have some background in the type of farming to ·bo practiced to assure a reasonable possibility of repaying the lean.

Within tho past six months, committees consisting of three farmers have these fields. boon established in each county for the purpose of approving the eligibility of all applicants for FSA loans

Thus far, no applications for loans have been received from nisei in the Wisconsin area. If any are received, the nisei will be accorded the same considerations that other applicants receive.
