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SELECTIVE SERVICE

FREELAND CLEARS DRAFT RECLASSIFICATION MIX-UP

Rumors and confusion in the center caused by premature and unauthorized reclassification and orders issued by the local draft boards in California were put to rest yesterday by Henry C. Freeland, leave officer, when he announced that official communications regarding selective service status of draft age nisei males in the center will be issued through the Phoenix office.

Freeland said that last week many residents had received their 1-A reclassifications, and in some cases had received

orders to report for physical examinations. In other cases residents had received alien selective service questionnaires. Freeland declared that the boards' through a mix-up were not aware of the correct procedures established by the army for the draft of nisei, and had jumped the gun.

He asked residents not to answer questionnaires under any circumstances but to report to the leave office so that the local boards may be informed of the correct procedures. Residents who had been ordered to report for their physical examinations are also requested to contact the leave office. In brief in every case where communication from the local boards indicate some action by the recipient, the recipient should report to the leave office, he said.

Civil Service Exams Soon

Civil service examinations for junior clerks, junior stenographers, and junior typists will be held in Butte as soon as sufficient applications have been received, announced the personnel management section.

It is anticipated that there will be sufficient applicants on file before the end of the month to justify the holding of the examinations.

Starting salaries for the positions range from \$1440 to \$1620 to \$1800 per year, depending on experience, plus overtime.

Residents interested in filing for these examinations may secure civil service applications from the personnel management section in the annex.

Numerous women with civil service ratings have been placed in Detroit, Chicago and Cleveland by the relocation offices.

PROJECT FINANCE UNDER DISCUSSION

Finance and financing of community projects which, if undertaken will be sponsored by the residents, came in for considerable discussion at the Butte Community Council meeting held yesterday.

The recreation commission recommended that a meeting of various community activity organizations be called to plan for coordination in raising money for recreation purposes. The commission suggested that the organization of a recreation cooperative may be feasible. The Council approved the recommendation.

Tamotsu Ikemoto and Sadao Yamaguchi were appointed to study ways and means to establish a community fund to be used for special community needs.

The Block Managers' recommendation to use the residual of the camouflage fund to give scholarships to deserving students was referred to the education and relocation commissions to study and report its findings.

NISEI SERGEANT FIGHTS RACIAL DISCRIMINATION

Before the Colorado House of Representatives, a nisei army sergeant from Camp Carson pleaded with members of the legislature to refrain from enactment of laws that would prohibit Japanese aliens from owning property, according to the Arizona Republic.

He appeared, unheralded, at a meeting called by the constitutional amendments committee of the House to discuss several proposed amendments to the Colorado constitution which would prohibit Japanese aliens from buying or owning property.

"I am an American by birth, and it means a great deal to me," he said.

"There are thousands of people who are suffering and dying, not because they are black or white,

Japanese or something else ...but because they are believers in democracy.

"We are going overseas. We are going to be hungry ...to be scared. Many of us are going to be crippled.

"We are not asking for special privileges. We are only asking for a chance to show that we do believe in democracy."

At the end of the hearing, the committee announced that it expected to refer some form of a proposed constitutional amendment to the House for consideration.

Such a proposal, if adopted by a two-thirds vote of the legislature, would be submitted to the voters for approval at the election in November, it was said.

RULING BOOMERANGS

"At War With Deeds Men Do"

"We are at war not with races, not with colors-- but with the deeds men do," declared John W. Vandorcock, Blue Network and NBC news commentator, in discussing the reaction of the American people to the recent announcements of Japanese atrocities in two coast-to-coast broadcasts from New York City over the Blue Network on Friday and Sunday, Jan. 28 and 30, 1944.

Vandorcock said that the Japanese are not alone in the commission of atrocities. Taking issue with an indignant senator who describes the atrocities on Luzon as "the worst thing that ever happened," he asks, "Has he forgotten then, what the Germans did to the Jews in Warsaw? Has he forgotten the butchery at Lidice? Or did he believe those stories? For they were true. More people have been tortured and butchered by the Germans in Europe, simply because the Germans have had greater opportunities, in all probability, than by the Japs in Asia."

But because the Japanese, are of another race there is a danger that the hatred of the Japanese may take on a sharper edge. This twisted curse, he said, "leads those who are guilty of it into the company of Adolph Hitler..."

He declared that any who make the suggestion that America should vent its rage upon the quarter of a million men, women and children of Japanese ancestry in this country and Hawaii "rank themselves even lower in the scale of decent human values than the Japanese officers who were responsible for the horrors of Luzon. As every civilized human being knows, but sometimes finds it hard to remember, there can be no contest in brutality."

He continued, "All thoughtless Americans who suggest that we should revenge ourselves upon Japanese civilians; the poor whites who snarl on the street corners near the

Sometimes an obviously adverse circumstance produces reactions and reverberations which completely reverse the original adversity and in effect produces a favorable condition which any number of favorable circumstances may not have been able to do.

When the NBC ruled that Sgt. Kuroki could not appear on the Ginny Simms program, it, but added further incentive to Kuroki's fight against intolerance in the West Coast. (Last week before the Commonwealth Club in San Francisco he declared, "... I believe that loyal Americans of Japanese ancestry are entitled to the democratic rights which Jefferson propounded, Washington fought for and Lincoln died for.") It accused the San Francisco Chronicle to a critical editorial and stories which tell of the injustices that Kuroki and other Americans of Japanese ancestry suffered.

The American sense of justice to the soldier is keen. Sgt. Kuroki is an American hero, and every real American believes that he is entitled to speak his piece and entitled to all the privileges that are common to Americans.

We protest the denial of freedom of the air to any American or for that matter any law-abiding resident. We believe all men short of secessionists and libellers are entitled to say their say. But we shall not scorn the turn of fate which boomeranged an apparent adversity to good.

PROPER CREDENTIALS NEEDED TO ENTER PROHIBITED ZONE

Any person of Japanese ancestry who enters the prohibited areas of the Western Defense Command without a proper permit will be either prosecuted or forcibly removed, Lieutenant General Dolos C. Emmons, Commanding General, Western Defense Command, announced today following the forcible removal of Masanobu Hata in Southern California.

Hata, 27 year-old Japanese American recently released from a War Relocation Project, entered the evacuated areas on Jan. 24, 1944, without a permit, went to his former residence at Lomita, suburban community of Los Angeles obtained his automobile which had been stored for him by a friend, and was apprehended by the Federal Bureau of Investi-

gation near Blythe, Calif., en route to his destination at St. Louis.

"Today's action of the military in evicting Masanobu Hata is strictly in accord with the terms of the Public Proclamations heretofore issued, governing the exclusion of persons of Japanese ancestry from specified areas," said the Commanding General.

"It will serve as notice to any and all of the remainder of the 110,000 persons of Japanese ancestry evacuated from the Pacific Coast that they must not return without the special permits authorized by the original Proclamations." Similar action or rigid prosecution will follow any attempts of other evacuees to enter the area."

Japanese relocation camp near Tule Lake and talk of wholesale lynching--simply work to perpetuate that evil. They play straight in the hands of the Japs. They help make it certain that the war will last for many years and cost countless lives. They injure the living American prisoners still in Jap hands as

surely as if they had struck them across the face with the edge of a Samurai sword. We are no more at war with a whole race, or a color of skin, in the Pacific, than we are at war with the whole white race, in Europe. We are at war not with races, not with colors--but with the deeds men do."

NEW SYSTEM RESTRICTS MILK TO LIMITED GROUP

Strict milk rationing began yesterday, as per Washington instruction, announced H.E. Keadle, chief project steward.

Milk will be given only to children 12 years and

under, pregnant women, nursing mothers, and any others for whom the doctors may prescribe.

About 600 gallons have been purchased daily from the outside, but now will be cut down to 435 gallons. At present, milk is being obtained from the project farm on the average of 200 gallons daily. As the project production increases, less and less will be bought from the outside, ceasing altogether as the need of Rivers is reached. Any project-produced surplus from the set quota will be for camp consumption.

ARRAIGNMENT OF ONE TODAY

A resident charged with assault will be arraigned before the Butte Judicial Commission 1:30 tomorrow afternoon at the 69-6 courtroom, stated Izzy Otani, community clerk.

At 2 o'clock the same afternoon, a resident who pleaded not guilty last week to operating a gambling house will be tried by the Commission.

The Judicial Commissioners are Ernest Iwasaki, Shotaro Hikida, and Fred Shimizu.

Nisei Receives Silver Star

The awarding of one of the army's highest decorations, the Silver Star, to a Japanese American soldier was announced recently by the War Department.

The soldier, Staff Sergeant Kazuo Kozaki, known to many in Salt Lake City, was awarded the Order of the Purple Heart, as well as the Silver Star, for gallantry in action. Sgt. Kozaki received the decorations in October of 1943.

Sgt. Kozaki is the first Japanese American to win the Silver Star according to the Pacific citizen.

BULLETIN GIVES REPORT ON FAMILY RESETTLEMENTS

"Family resettlement is possible and desirable, but it requires more patience and preparation than individual relocation of young people," surmised the Resettlement Bulletin, the official organ of the Committee on Resettlement of Japanese Americans after a study of case histories of family resettlement in Cleveland, Ohio.

A small garret room in Cleveland, said the Bulletin, was the starting point of four relocated families in that city. Those four families were careful in selecting the right type of work and made sure of satisfactory living conditions. This happened in Cleveland

where housing is an acute problem.

The bulletin states, "Family relocation is desirable because unless the whole family lives normally," living in a normal community "does not fulfill its significance."

The following jobs are available in the Kansas City area. The WRA in Kansas City will arrange temporary housing in advance for anyone relocating in the metropolitan area. Permanent living costs average \$25 to \$60 per month for a family house, \$8 to \$10 a week for room and board at a boarding house and \$5 to \$8 a week for a room.

CLERICAL. Stockroom Clerk - For a large publishing and book company, 60¢ an hour. Three nisei girls now employed.

Office Girl- To assist in order department: Pricing, checking, making out bills of lading for large grease and oil firm, 5 - day, 40 hour week, shorthand not essential, permanent, \$25 a week.

INDUSTRIAL. Electrical Repairmen-Work on radio and household appliances on commission basis, \$25 weekly guarantee, should average \$50 a week.

Refrigeration-For refrigeration and electric motor repairs, \$35 a week. Older nisei as general help in shop, \$25 a week. Housing available for both. Also, two refrigeration apprentices, \$25 a week and up plus overtime, housing provided, conveniently located near shop, night school, etc. Non-union.

Photography-Men and women for dark room and finishing work for photo shop. 65¢ an hour, 40 hour week.

SERVICES. Hotel work-Exclusive resort hotel needs elevator operators (\$50 a month); waiters (\$40 a month and tips); bell hops (\$10 a month and tips); kitchen helpers (\$50 a month); all with room and board. Some of these positions not \$150 to \$175 a month.

SEASONAL, SHORT TERM LEAVES TO BE LIMITED TO FARM WORK

Seasonal or short term leave for evacuees in relocation centers will be limited to agricultural employment this year, stated Jesso H. Lewis, acting field ass't, director of the WRA.

Last year, such leave was also granted for industrial purposes.

Said Lewis, "The War Food Administration or the Country Extension Service or some other government agency will certify the **FSA**

Nisei Eligible For Farm Loan

Nisei farmers who have relocated may make applications for loans through the Rural Rehabilitation Loan, announced Harry S. Muir, regional director of the Farm Security Administration in Milwaukee, Wisconsin.

There are no legal objections to making loans to American citizens of Japanese ancestry provided they are not interned in centers established and maintained by the WRA, he said.

One of the eligibility requirements of all applicants is that the family must have some background in the type of farming to be practiced to assure a reasonable possibility of repaying the loan.

Within the past six months, committees consisting of three farmers have been established in each county for the purpose of approving the eligibility of all applicants for FSA loans.

Thus far, no applications for loans have been received from nisei in the Wisconsin area. If any are received, the nisei will be accorded the same considerations that other applicants receive.

"Under the old plan," added Lewis, "a farmer might make an employment offer and expect results and in the end be disappointed. Under the new plan, he will make his application to the agency handling all migrant labor, and if the labor is not obtainable from one source, it may be from another, and the one application will enable the acting agency to contact all sources of supply simultaneously."

School Starts Merit System

To bolster school spirit and to give credit to those who work in extra-curricular activities, a merit system has been established in Butte high school, announced Ward H. Boll, ASE advisor, and chairman of the Merits' System Board.

Students will receive merits for participating in extra-curricular activities, such as class and ASE officers, organizations, boys' sports and others.

This merit system does not apply to the girls' league or girls' athletic association. Other plans are underway for recognition of accomplishments in these fields.

Persons with the largest number of merits at the year's end will receive awards.

The merit system was put into effect at the beginning of the present semester.

POOR RESPONSE SHOWN TO COTTON PICKING

The cotton-picking venture by volunteers from the evacuee and appointed personnel on the latter part of last week was a dismal failure, according to Carl Quast, farm-supt.

Butte's response on Friday afternoon was poorer than that from Canal the

day before. Only about 40 people turned out, each picker averaging 15 pounds apiece. Thursday afternoon, about 70 Canal volunteers had picked 1,000 pounds, making the grand total of both communities 1,600 pounds, or a little over one bale.

There are about eight to ten bales yet to be picked. Farm workers from all ten units will finish picking this remaining crop, said Quast.

The picking was requested by Project Director Leroy Bennett in an attempt to solve the problem of the project's unpicked cotton.

NISEI WORKERS WANTED IN WYO.

The Commanding Officer of Fort Francis E. Warren, Cheyenne, Wyoming, sent an order to the Denver WRA for 100 nisei auto mechanics and upholsterers. This is an opportunity for men who cannot furnish their own tools to earn up to \$1.08 an hour straight time, with time and a half over 40 hours and overtime up to 70 hours a week available.

The army will provide housing in modern, fully equipped trailer units which can accommodate couples and small families at a rental of \$6 a week. Cooking facilities are included. Living quarters are located 1½ miles from the center of town with convenient local bus service available for a 5¢ fare.

Cheyenne is a famous rodeo town of 25,000 and the capital of Wyoming, located in the Rocky Mountains, 100 miles north of Denver, by auto, Greyhound, or Union Pacific Railroad.

Lochner had often been coupled with Kilsoo Haan and other vicious anti-nisei propagandists.

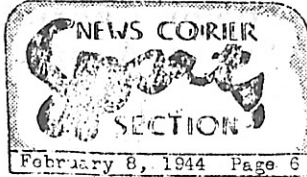
