ALIENS ELIGIBLE FOR LEAVES UNDER NEW REGULATIONS

In broad and general terms Dillon Myer, WRA National Director, sketched to Temporary Rivers Community Councils, the "why" and "hows" of the relocation policy for the evacuees during his recent visit to the colony. Myer stressed the point that the WRA is putting emphasis on relocation.

The leave regulations now make aliens as well as citizens eligible for indefinite leaves. Its provisions are that anyone can make application if (1) he has a place to go and has means with which to take care of himself; (2) he has reasonable assurance that the community will accept him; (3) his records are clear with the F.B.I. and other agencies; (4) he keeps the WRA informed regarding his residence.

Maeyama, Sekino Harvest Queens

A combined throng of six hundred dance lovers jammed the coronation ballrooms of Butte and Canal to pay tribute to queens Hideko Maeyama and Chiyo Sekino Wednesday night in the Farm Management sponsored "social of the year." David A. Rogers, farm division head, bestowed the symbol of regality to Butte's Harvest Queen, while Personnel Director Kay Nobusada paid like homage to Canal's fairest.

Reigning over the entire Thanksgiving Day program, the Queens made their grand debut to the public in the parade riding on the Farm Management floats. Queen attendants included Misses Rute Araki, Masako and Toriyo Yamaguchi, and Toshiko Masumoto from Butte; Irene Takayama, Janet Miura, Claire Fujishige, and Peggy Tagami from Canal.

NUMERICALLY MALES SUPERIOR

According to a census report released by the housing department, the males still outnumber the females by a narrow margin. There were 2,785 males in Canal and 4,437 in Butte, while the number of females in Canal was 2,338 and 3,658 in Butte, as of November 15. However, this census report does not include those who did not register upon arrival.

GASOLINE PUMP

A new gasoline pump and tank, with a capacity of 12,000 gallons, will soon be installed near the motor pool office in block 18. This tank will replace the present one which has only a 550 gallon capacity.

DOCUMENTARY MOVIES TAKEN

Francis Stewart, official WRA photographer for all relocation centers, has been filming 16 mm. movies and stills for the historical documentation of center scenes and activities including the Harvest Festival during a two-day assignment here.

The 16 mm. movies will be released through the Office of War Information. The OWI last week announced the national release of a film short "Japanese Relocation," telling the story of the moving of 100,000 persons of Japanese ancestry from the west coast to inland centers in Arizona, Wyoming, Utah, Colorado, Arkansas, Idaho and eastern California.

HOLIDAY EXHIBITS CLOSE TONIGHT

Harvest festival displays at block 13 will end at 11 tonight after a 3-day showing. Subjects to be emphasized will be Boy Scout leadership, and will also include parliamentary law, principals of speaking before meetings, the organization of games, sings, and fellowship activities, and principles of community and civic leadership. If sufficient demand develops, credit on the college level may be had from Arizona State College at Tempe.

NEED LAWN SEEDS?

The Ground Department once again calls attention to the public that there is an adequate supply of lawn seeds and numerous varieties of flowers and plants for transplantation.

The residents should inquire at their block manager's place for the plants and seeds. A tractor and many equipments for beautification purposes are also available.

FURUTA RESIGNS COUNCIL CHAIR

As the newly appointed chairman of the Hospital Health Education, Dr. William Furuta proffered his resignation as chairman of the Canal Community Council. Dr. Furuta heads the Sanitation Corps and supervises the laboratory for the Gila colony.

Karl Iwanaga will succeed Furuta as temporary chairman of the Canal Council, while Gean Kubota is the new representative for block 6.

"During my brief time as a councilman, I enjoyed my work, and whatever progress the council made to date was all due to the splendid cooperation of the entire council members, administrative officials, block council and the block managers," Dr. Furuta stated to the press.

Model of Gila Shown at Exhibit

The relocation program was planned and is being planned with the basic belief that the vast majority of Japanese people will live in the United States after the war and that they are loyal to this country. Myer stated in no uncertain terms that any agitation which will tend to upset their desire or loyalty will be dealt with. He pointed out that unless the evacuees can become a part of American communities and show that they are not like the satirized cartoon versions of Japanese and that the slander aimed at them is not a true picture of what they are, their post war problem will be much greater than it need be. He expressed the hope that 50,000 evacuees would be relocated.

Myer disclosed that the F.B.I., Department of Justice and War Manpower Commission approve of the relocations policy, and that influential individuals, business interests, and humanitarian groups, are supporting the program. If the Selective Service is reopened to the nisei, a more tolerant public, already aware of 4,500 to 5,000 nisei soldiers, is probable, he added.

The titantic grid struggle between the Crimson Tide and the Walnut Grove Solons resulted in a scoreless tie.

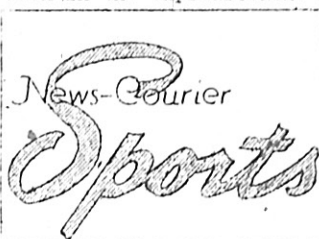
Gila Babes had their first bitter taste of defeat when they bowed to the girls' All-Star team.
