Dr. Gordon Brown, Riv-ers social analyst and professor of anthropology on leave of absence from Temple University, will offer an eight lecture course entitled "Introduction to Social Anthropology" beginning Tuesday, Feb. 15, at 7:30 p.m.

Dr. Brown, who lived with African and Samoan natives, said that his course will be a study of social organizations, bused partly upon a survey of primitive societies.


