## BEAM POLICY MUDDLE CLEARED

Single persons must share their units with others, but in special cases (physical or mental) if a person must live alone, he will be granted two beams. In the case of 2 or 3 members, the stated number of beams can be given only if available.

## PRE-INDUCTION PAPERS FOR 17 GILANS ARRIVE

Papers which call for the pre-induction physical examinations of seventeen Gilans have been transmitted to the Phoenix Selective Service Headquarters from the California Director of Selective Service, announced Henry C. Freeland, leave officer.

Of the seventeen, four are still in the center and thirteen have relocated.

The four residents are Hayao Yoshimura, 58-9-D; Minoru Ishida, 59-10-B; Hajime Doi, 52-3-A and Masahiko Jack Tanaka, 33-2-D. Those boys are requested by the Phoenix board not to relocate for the time being.

Relocated Rivers men whose papers have arrived at the headquarters will have their papers transmitted to the local boards in the areas to which they have relocated.

After a person receives his pre-induction physical exam, he is placed on the reserve list and is subject to be called at any time. Within 10-90 days after his physical, the person will be given a final physical examination.

Anyone is free to relocate until he has received his order for a pre-induction physical examination, stated Freeland.

## SAKURAI ENTHUSIASTIC OVER TRIP; PLANS TO RESETTLE

Tek Sakurai, Butte resident, who left for the Wooster (Ohio) Christian Conference last December, returned to Rivers Thursday night enthusiastic over his Eastern experiences, especially in New York City where he "would have stayed for good if I hadn't caught this cold."

Nursing a slight cold but all set on going back to New York to work, Sakurai told of his two month trip during which he never felt discriminated against personally. The story of Japan's atrocities

did not change the attitude of Easterners at all, Sakurai said.

Sakurai likes New York because it is clean, has many things to see, and work to do. Among the other states he saw are Ohio, Massachusetts, and New Jersey.

The weather is easy to get accustomed to, he said. An overcoat, gloves and a hat will do for almost anybody.

## More Wrinkles On Draft Ironed

In reply to a letter sent to the Phoenix Selective Service headquarters regarding conflicting reports on Selective Service matters came word that classification cards will be issued by the local boards. In most cases, these cards will come from California boards.

However, all pre-induction or induction orders will originate in the Phoenix board. If a registrant receives an order to report from a California board, he should immediately request a transfer for induction to the Arizona State headquarters.

## MUSTERING OUT PAY

Honorably discharged soldiers who apply for mustering out pay should bring their discharge papers for instructions about photostatic copies, stated W. C. "Tom" Sawyer, commander of the Ex-Servicemen's club.

Anyone with honorable discharge papers is eligible to apply through Sawyer or Dr. J.P. Young at the education office in the Butte ad building,

John G. Parsons at the Internal Security, or Rex Campbell, sanitary engineer, in Canal.

Among those eligible will be nisei who were honorably discharged after Pearl Harbor and reclassified to 4-C, as well as those medically discharged.

Sawyer estimated that it will take perhaps 30 to 60 days after application before the mustering out pay is received.

## Waning Says PM

Workers in Japan are beginning to show misgivings about the outcome and the purpose of the war with the United Nations, the PM, New York daily, reported.

Some Japanese prisoners captured by the Chinese army insist, the PM stated, that there is a spreading anti-war, anti-imperialist movement in their country. From discussions with the prisoners merged a picture of Japan at war, held tightly in the grip of an industrial-military partnership but with a people who are beginning to doubt, and even to fight back, although as yet on a small scale.

From them also came a picture of intolerable working conditions, a labor conscription that caused a wave of suicides, of mass insanity, of miners living in camps under armed guards, of a soaring cost of living that has pauperized the already poor workers--and of strikes, mass arrests and a growing anti-war feeling.

The strikes reached their climax when the Chinese war dragged out. They stopped with Pearl Harbor, because propaganda was effective, but began again on a small scale toward the end of 1942. They began because exploitation could go no farther and because with exhaustion came questioning. All recent Japanese prisoners agree that the hatred of war, the government and the industrialists have risen to great heights.

The PM points out that these revelations from war prisoners who have grown up from childhood in a military fascist Japan indicate that the propaganda of the Japanese militarists has not succeeded nearly as much as generally thought, that the obedience of Japanese soldiers is essentially acquiescence in what seems inevitable rather than fanatic enthusiasm, and that the Japanese people realize that the war promises

## NISEI DRAFT GRATIFYING

It is gratifying to read the War Department announcement that Selective Service is once more open to American citizens of Japanese descent. It was closed to them in February, 1942. Uncertainty was widespread at that time whether the loyalty of such citizens could be depended upon. Meanwhile Japanese American volunteers have been accepted in the armed services, and two outfits of them--the 442nd combat team and a battalion fighting in Italy--have demonstrated that the question of their loyalty is out of order.

There may, of course, be found among citizens of Japanese descent persons of doubtful loyalty, just as such persons have been uncovered among citizens of other racial categories, even of Mayflower heritage. Eccentrics are apt to bob up in all breeds. In two years of observation by the War Department, American citizens of Japanese blood are disclosed as being, in the mass, as dependably loyal as any other group.

That is the gratifying significance of the re-opening of selective service to the nisei--particularly gratifying because there have been many to say that the Japanese could never be truly Americanized, not even after generations of residence under the Stars and Stripes.

Sgt. Ben Kuroki's radio speech, which I heard and later had the pleasure of reading in the Chronicle, was the speech of a brave and sincere American who believes in democracy and is willing to fight for it.

How sharply his calm good sense, tinged sometimes with sadness, contrasts against the shrill, hysterical nonsense of the home front "professional patrioters" who want us to believe that every man with a yellow or brown skin and "slant eyes" is a barbarian.

The money order receipt or cancelled check for taxes paid at that time must, however, be presented.

## HAS TEETH

## FEPD ENFORCES FAIR LABOR PRACTICE IN EASTERN AREAS

One-third of 300 cases of discriminatory employment practices in New York state and the New England states docketed in the Fair Employment Practices office in New York City since July, 1943 have been satisfactorily adjusted, the Chicago Defender reported.

Edward Lawson, regional director of New York and acting regional director of New England, declared,

"In this area we can stop any employer from hiring on a discriminatory basis. If any employer or union should refuse to comply with Executive Order 9346 we can apply certain sanctions. The War Manpower Commission can suspend service; Selective Service can cancel replacement schedules; the National Labor Relations Board can take action against a union; the War Labor Board can correct wage inequalities; or the War Production Board that can stop critical materials."

"Just the fact there is an agency like the FEPD helps hold employers in line," said Lawson.

Most of the cases involve discrimination against negroes. One-third of the cases are ones of discrimination against the Jews. Some involve aliens, church groups and racial. Lawson even reported a case of discrimination against a Protestant.

## DR. BROWN To Lecture On Anthropology

Dr. Gordon Brown, River's social analyst and professor of anthropology on leave of absence from Temple University, will offer an eight lecture course entitled "Introduction to Social Anthropology" beginning Tuesday, Feb. 15, at 7:30 p.m.

Dr. Brown, who has lived with African and Samoan natives, said that his course will be a study of social organizations, based partly upon a survey of primitive societies.

He said the aim of his lecture course is an analysis of modern complex societies through comparative study of simpler societies. An outline of the course will be available at the community analysis and social welfare offices in Butte and Canal.
