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BILL

For Citizenship Renunciation

A bill which during wartime would permit United States citizens living in this country to renounce their citizenship by a formal written application was introduced in Congress by Rep. A. Leonard Allen of La. on Feb. 1.

The Attorney General has already spoken in favor of the bill and has indicated preference of this bill to any of the more sweeping legislations proposed for deportation and deprivation of citizenship.

At the present time no citizen can renounce U.S. citizenship unless he is living outside the United

WRA TRANSFERRED TO DEPT. OF INTERIOR; MYER TO STAY

The War Relocation Authority's existence as an independent agency ended yesterday, a year and eleven months after its creation, when it was transferred by presidential edict in its entirety to the department of Interior under Secretary Harold L. Ickes.

States or its territories.

Rep. Allen's bill, introduced on Feb. 1, has been referred to the Committee on Immigration and Naturalization. It adds a subsection to section 401 of the Nationality Act of 1940 with reference to the loss or renunciation

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A White House statement said that the transfer was made for "reasons of administrative simplification and to bring the work of the agency under a cabinet officer."

Interior department officials said that Dillon S. Myer would work under Ickes for the time being. A statement is expected from Myer shortly.

In announcing the transfer, the President stated that he considered the program of the War Relocation Authority sound in principle and the work already accomplished by the agency highly satisfactory.

After disturbances at Tule Lake in November of last year, the WRA and Myer have been under strong congressional fire. In the relocation centers evacuee opinion had consistently favored Myer's retention. Following a particularly heavy barrage of congressional criticism a few months ago, the Rivers' community councils sent Myer a full vote of confidence.

Secretary Ickes is best known in the centers as the cabinet officer who employed several nice evacuees from the Poston relocation center to work on his Maryland farm.

FISTERO, CULLUM, WEBBER FORM RELOCATION TEAM

The relocation team coming next week is not coming to recruit evacuees for any job but to give factual, up-to-the-minute information on conditions and opportunities in different areas, stated Oscar Buttedahl, contact man for the team.

They are also interested in the views of the residents in regards to various relocation problems to aid the WRA in formulating future policies, he said.

During the general meetings to be held by the team there will be a showing of the sound and color film, "The Way Ahead," a pictorial account of relocated evacuees at work, at play, at home, and in social life.

Several former residents of Rivers are in the movie, said Buttedahl.

The Relocation Planning Commission is making all arrangements for a schedule of general meetings and interviews. Members of the team will be avail-

able for personal interviews every afternoon.

Harold S. Fistero, relocation supervisor of the Cleveland area; Robert Cullum, WRA officer of the New York area, and Dr. P. A. Webber, WRA officer of the Salt Lake City area, comprise the team which is expected here Sunday. The meetings will start in Butte Monday continuing through Wednesday and end in Canal on Thursday and Friday.

Of particular interest to the issei will be Dr. P. A. Webber who will give his talk in Japanese. Dr. Webber speaks flawless

HOSPITAL SITUATION

In the last issue of the NEWS-COURIER, Dr. Sleath made known to the community a critical shortage of nurses' aides at the hospital. He announced also that Ward H had been closed because the nurse personnel was inadequate to care for all the open wards.

In conversations with Dr. Sleath and Miss Rappaport, chief nurse, yesterday, we were alarmed by the information given us. We believe that the community can feel no less so at the following figures and the trend they indicate:

The estimated required number of nurses' aides is 100. Last November, there were 86. Today, the number is 46. And almost every experienced aide has announced her plans for relocation in March or April. During the period from Jan. 10 to Feb. 19, there were 20 resignations and only 3 replacements. This shows a replacement ratio of 15% during that period. This ratio has been consistently below 50% in the last few months.

This does not show the whole picture. It takes training to assign aides to even simple tasks. The rapid turnover caused by relocation has depleted the trained personnel dangerously. And as most trained aides are expecting to resettle in March and April, hospital in a month's time will be terribly short of efficient help.

This means that at least 30, preferably 50, nurses' aides must be recruited immediately so that they will be trained to take over when many leave in the next few months.

Miss Rappaport revealed that the situation at the D and E Wards for tubercular patients is critical also. Orderlies are needed now.

No one can deny that the situation is critical. The solution to the shortage lies in getting more nurses' aides and more orderlies. (Nurses' aides and orderlies under emergency conditions are trained to work interchangeably.) If the community will demand, and surely it must, that adequate health safeguards be maintained, then the community must make up the shortage. With relocation taking its toll among the younger generation, much of that shortage will have to be made up from among the older residents.

This is a problem in which the community councils, the block managers, all community leaders, and the residents must interest themselves for their own sake. The community can not afford to have more wards closed.

BODINE PLANS VISIT AGAIN

Thomas Bodine, field director of the National Japanese American Student Relocation Council, is scheduled to arrive in Rivers Saturday, Feb. 26, to interview students interested in relocation, it was announced here yesterday.

Bodine expects to stay a week or longer if possible before leaving for Poston.

He plans to talk to seniors during class hours and give personal interviews to anyone interested in both Butte and Canal.

of United States citizenship by providing that U. S. citizenship is lost by a person, "making in the United States a formal written renunciation of nationality in such form as may be prescribed by and before such officer as may be designated by the Attorney General whenever the U.S. shall be in a state of war and the Attorney General shall approve such renunciation as not contrary to the interests of national defense."

RESOLUTION

New York—A public denunciation of "the brutal and depraved acts of the Japanese fascists against every human decency" was issued by the Arts Council of Japanese Americans For Democracy through its chairman, Yasuo Kuniyoshi. The Arts Council, composed of anti-fascist Japanese American artists active in all fields of creative endeavor, states that it is "keenly aware that the atrocities committed against our soldiers by the Japanese imperialists, like every other fascist crime, must be avenged. Every leader of the fascist-imperialist clique must be held accountable, for it is they who have perpetrated these crimes, not only against Americans but also against the people of Japan."

The statement further continues with a denunciation of the "Peace Now" movement, terming it a group which would "sabotage democracy's fight by attempting to succor the enemy, to save fascism by working for a negotiated peace. Any step short of unconditional surrender," the Arts Council states, "is contrary to our principle as anti-fascists."

Members of the Arts Council, organized last month and headed by leading anti-fascist Japanese American artists, are pledged to make articulate their belief in democracy, both in principle and action, and to add their strength to the democratic forces. The first purpose of the organization, as listed in its Constitution, reads: "To contribute our full support to the United States and the United Nations, and to take an active part in winning this anti-fascist war."

Noted Japan-born painter Yasuo Kuniyoshi is chairman of the Arts Council. Isamu Noguchi, sculptor and one-time resident of the Poston center, and Eddie Shimano, writer for the Common Ground, are among other officers. A member of the board of directors is Sono Osato, dancer now appearing in "One Touch of Venus."

CAS-FIRE DEPT.

APPLICATIONS NECESSARY FOR SOCIAL GATHERINGS

All organizations and groups who plan to hold any type of program where people gather must get applications from the CAS which must be okayed by the fire department, announced Joe Shigozano, director of community activities.

This procedure, instituted by the fire department, is necessary, said Shigozano, as a safeguard against possible fire hazards. Before an okay can be given, the fire department must inspect the hall, check all exits, and decorations and see that

all necessary precautionary measures are taken. The applications serve another purpose in that it aids the CAS in keeping up its record of all camp activities.

The cooperation of everyone will be greatly appreciated, stated Shigozano.

Reclassification from 4-C was done with full approval of the U.S. Army Intelligence Department, Clark said, and those who declare their loyalty and willingness to serve in the armed forces in the questionnaires submitted to them will be inducted through the relocation centers.

Some men who have been planning for months to leave this spring and have made definite arrangements to go have decided to call

the whole thing off and wait for Uncle Sam. Others who have not thought about leaving for a long time have suddenly packed their bags and left in a hurry in order to get a breath of free air and bolster the family bank account before donning the khaki.

One man, the father of two children, received his 1-A card the day before he was scheduled to leave for Chicago. He debated with himself all night whether or not he should leave, and finally decided to depart as scheduled.

There is no truth in the report that men who have received their 1-A classifications are not allowed to leave the project, said Hart.

DICK MIYAGAWA PUNCHES WAY TO TOP HONORS

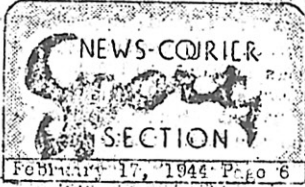
4-WAY TIE IN 'B' LOOP

されない。米國人の或る者は面と向つて私に排斥の言葉を投げかけ、衆人環視の裡に侮辱した。曾て私達兄弟が陸軍砲術學校に在學中、或る白人學生はわれわれ兄弟を忌々嫌つて露骨に差別待遇をしたが、一身を米國に捧げ、度々弾雨を潜り生死の境に入つて来た。今日と雖も尚戰則の待遇と何等の變化もない。唯々小教長たるが故に永く了解して貰へぬのである」と何たる悲痛の叫びであるか。

誠にロバート司祭長の言の如く、小教長族の排斥はフアシヨの愚劣極まる手段である。我等は致團結してこの人道の敵を撃滅せねばならぬ。
