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MYER ISSUES STATEMENT ON TRANSFER

Dillon S. Myer, director of the WRA, in his first statement following WRA transfer to the Interior Department, declared, "We welcome the resources and facilities which will be available in the Department of the Interior to help us do our job and do it better."

His full statement follows:

The War Relocation Authority was created by the President almost two years ago to perform a necessary wartime task, aimed at preserving our American democratic principles and at the same time protecting the national

BUSY WEEK AHEAD FOR RELOCATION TEAM, RESIDENTS

The relocation team, expected to be here tomorrow, will begin the first of its five scheduled meetings, three in Butte and two, in Canal Monday evening at 7:30 p.m. at mess hall 56, the relocation planning commission announced yesterday.

Bringing with them the fruit of over a year of work in relocating evacuees in the midwest and eastern states, members of the team are prepared to give the latest information available on the subject of relocation.

Harold S. Fistore, relocation supervisor for the Cleveland area, Robert S. Cullum of the New York office, and Dr. P.A. Webor of the Salt Lake office are the members of the relocation team.

During the general meetings, residents will hear members of the team talk on various phases of relocation, see colored sound movies of relocated evacuees and participate in a general discussions

ICKES TO KEEP POLICIES DEVELOPED BY MYER INTACT

War Relocation Authority policies developed under Director D. S. Myer will remain unchanged, Secretary of Interior Harold L. Ickes announced in a statement issued Thursday.

Ickes, WRA's new boss via an executive order which transferred the independent agency to the Interior Department, stated that in carrying his responsibilities, he will not forget "the need of recognition of the rights of United States citizens, regardless of ancestry."

Ickes declared that relocation will continue and hopes "more effectively" under his department.

His statement follows:

The President has directed that the War Relocation Authority be transferred to the Department of the Interior. I am glad to welcome the director and staff of the War Relocation Authority into this department. The Authority was established nearly two years ago as a result of the army's evacuation of West Coast residents of Japanese ancestry. Since that time, the authority has worked closely with this department. Five relocation centers are situated on Interior Department land; one center was directly administrated by this department until January 1, 1944. As a consequence, I know something of the problems with which the War Relocation Authority has been confronted and have come to appreciate the effectiveness with which those problems have been dealt.

War Relocation Authority has been confronted with the difficult task of caring for a minority group of enemy ancestry in time of war. To handle this problem with proper regard for the national security and in accord with sound principles of American democracy, the Authority has developed a three-fold program:

1. Maintenance of all

RECREATION CO-OP PLANNED

Organization of a recreation co-operative to handle all money raising activities and to use profits to further all recreational programs will be discussed at a special public hearing 7:30 Wednesday night, Feb. 23, at the 69-6 courtroom.

Any Butte person or group wishing to express

his opinion concerning the establishment of such an organization is welcome to bring suggestions and recommendations, stated George Kanagaki, chairman of the Butte recreation commission. The hearing is directed by the recreation commission and authorized by the Butte community council.

NEWS-COURIEReditorial**ICKES' ASSURANCE, GOOD**

It was good to receive Secretary Ickes' statement that the policies of the WRA will remain unchanged. Those policies were developed largely under the directorship of Dillon S. Myer (who incidentally was officially picked by WRA's first director, Milton Eisenhower, as successor for his liberal views and principles) through nearly two years of head-aches and heart-aches in handling a problem for which he had little in the way of precedent to follow.

We, as evacuees, have complained bitterly, have, even, suggested that WRA was not interested in American principles. But through the long months we have come to see the essential honesty and justice of Myer and the key men he has had working for him. Sure, there have been compromises made. They have been unavoidable in face of criticism that the WRA has had to bear. But those compromises, when they were made, have been generally more favorable to us than otherwise, because Myer and the fair Americans who have assisted him have always had the conviction of justice on their side.

Secretary Ickes' statement has assured us that the same unrelenting fight against injustice will continue to be waged. It assures us, too, that Indian Service (also under Interior department) policies which are not applicable to our problem are recognized as separate and apart from the WRA policies.

NET TRUST FUND WILL BE DISTRIBUTED TO WORKERS

Mats Ando, Canal trustee of the Community Trust Fund, emphatically stated that all money now in the fund, less expenses and tax refunds, will be distributed eventually to the workers in accordance with plans outlined at the time of the declaration of trust.

Due to the fact that there have been expressions of opinion, here and there throughout the community, that the Trust Fund account will be put to other uses, there is the necessity of making this restatement, said Ando. The Trust Fund was set up so that all workers would receive their proportionate share in accordance with the time of work put in. It is the intention of the trustees to execute the declaration until the last penny has been expended accordingly.

Ando asked those who have filed claims for shortages and others who yet have an interest in the Trust Fund to bear with the trustees a little longer because they are

now in the process of locating and mailing checks to those who have relocated in various parts of the United States.

security. The program which we have developed to meet the needs of 110,000 American residents, two-thirds of them citizens by right of birth, has had the endorsement of the congress as well as the executive branch of the government. Our primary objective is to see that it is carried out in the most effective manner. We welcome the resources and facilities which will be available in the Department of the Interior to help us do our job and do it better.

I know that Secretary Ickes and I can depend upon the continued loyalty of the war relocation staff and a continuation of the good relations between residents of the centers and the staff which we have enjoyed in the past.

evacuee who require support in properly administered relocation centers.

2. Segregation of evacuees whose sympathies do not lie with the United States into a special segregation center, and

3. Relocation of loyal evacuees as rapidly as possible in normal, productive American life. This program will be continued and I hope will be made even more effective in the Department of Interior.

In carrying out my responsibilities under the order, I intend to keep in mind the need of recognition of the rights of United States citizens regardless of ancestry, the internal security of the United States during wartime and the international implications which are involved, and particularly the effect of this program on the treatment of war prisoners and civilians in Japanese hands.

The Department of the Interior will, I am sure, be able to make an effective contribution to the relocation program. I should be reluctant, however, to assume the responsibilities involved in bringing the War Relocation Authority into the Department of the Interior if I did not know the ability and devotion of the staff of the War Relocation Authority and were not assured that Dillon Myer and the organization he was built up and directed were coming under my direction as a unit.

WRA FARM CONFERENCE TO BE HELD IN RIVERS

A four-day conference, called by the WRA agricultural office in Washington, will be held in Rivers from Wednesday, Feb. 23, to Saturday, Feb. 26, announced David A. Rogers, chief of Agriculture.

Ernest Reed and Sabin will represent the Washington office at the conference. Eighteen others, the chiefs of agriculture and the farm supts. from the nine other centers, will also be present.

Among the special problems to be discussed are canning and other processing, storage, shipments between centers, special enterprises, farm constructions, and training of

workers.

The conference delegates will tour the various farm projects, and agricultural progress and the outlook for 1944 will be discussed. A description of the agricultural program in each center will be given by the respective representatives.

DRAFT BOARDS DEER STUDENTS

High school students may ask for deferment if they are called for induction while still attending school, explained Sgt. R.L. Porter of the Phoenix Selective Service headquarters in a letter to Henry G. Freeland leave officer.

If an individual is in the last half of the academic year of high school, he may request his local board in writing, to postpone his induction until the end of such academic year, said Sgt. Porter. This is true whether he is in the 9th, 10th, 11th, or 12th year if he is 18 or 19 years old.

The student will not be placed in a deferred class, but his induction will be postponed and his classification will remain 1-A.

College deferments are limited to certain scientific and professional courses, such as engineering, medicine and various science courses, added Sgt. Porter. Such deferments are given at the discretion of the local boards or appeal board if an appeal is taken.

NATION NEEDS OFFICE WORKERS

The United States Civil Service Commission announced today that war work in Washington demands 6600 more stenographers and typists than are available for certification.

"Fundamentally that is the picture throughout large portions of the United States" declared Lyiston S. Black, Personnel Officer. Since there is such a prevailing demand for office workers, Black suggested that all evacuees take advantage of every opportunity to become proficient in stenography and typing.

"Gila Project now provides the opportunity to earn while you learn," he stated. A limited number of individuals may take training courses in typing and clerical work. Those who care to take advantage of this offer should make application at the Personnel Management Office in the annex bldg.


