DRAFT First Physical List Completed

Today's list of 13 men completes the first list of the men ordered to take their pre-induction physical examination on March 5, announced Henry C. Freeland, leave officer. In addition to the 13 were four men who have already relocated.

This brings the total of men who are to receive their first physical examinations on Sunday to 126. All 126 men will receive orders to report to the hospital on Sunday morning where they will take a complete physical examination under the supervision of army doctors.

The preliminary blood, urino and X-ray tests of all the men will be completed by tomorrow said Freeland.

Names received from the Phoenix office hereafter will receive their examinations at a date to be announced later, concluded Freeland.

100TH INFANTRY NISEI CITED FOR CASSINO FIGHT

Japanese Americans of the 100th Infantry Battalion are among the American forces fighting the house to house battle of Cassino, reported John Lardner, front line correspondent.

Both Lardner and C.L. Sulzberger, writer for the New York Times, cite the dogged bravery and stamina of the nisei soldiers from Hawaii. Members of the 100th are fighting at Cassino, "scaring German prisoners into compliance merely by looking like Japanese," Lardner writes. He noted that the room to room fighting in Cassino often finds Germans holding the bathroom, Americans in the dining room, and both sides trying to knock holes in the walls first to drop grenades into the next room.

Sulzberger writes of the 100th Battalion:

"They are showing the rest of the people that they are just as good citizens as the next John Doughboy. As a matter of fact they are the best soldiers I have ever seen!"

EVADERS SUBJECT TO PENALTIES SAYS DIRECTOR

Requests for expatriation by military age nisei since January 20, 1944, will be regarded as efforts to evade military service and such nisei will be subject to penalties prescribed by law, a teletype from Director D. S. Myer yesterday stated.

Myer reissued this announcement following reports from several centers that Spanish Consul F. De Amat had made statements to the effect that the U. S. government has adopted the attitude that nisei who do not wish to serve in the U.S. army are under no obligation to do so. De Amat's statement is contrary to the regulations of Selective Service, the teletype stated. Efforts are being made to have the statement retracted or corrected by the Spanish Consul.

The segregants left in four trainloads beginning Feb. 22 and ending on the 26th. Five hundred arrived in Tule on Feb. 22, 450 the next day, 500 more on the 25th and the last group of 450 on the 26th.

EDITORIAL

TOWARD FEDERAL ACTION

These are critical times. Within months there have been major racial outbreaks of anti - Semitism in New York and Boston, outbreaks which indicate a simmering of race hate that occasionally breaks out and may some day go entirely out of control. The business of our war has been impeded by hate--hate against the Negro, the Jew, and the Japanese American. American democracy has been degraded and humiliated in the eyes of the world by these anti-democratic uprisings.

Groundwork must be laid, and on a national scale, for the combatting of such racial tensions as exist today. Patterns of actions must be planned, so that whenever or wherever such tensions rise, action may be taken immediately to prevent the rise of hysteria, a mob action or undemocratic legislative decrees.

A body of information must be set up, both for educational purposes and for examples of action.

For these purposes there can be only one solution-- a national committee or federal department on inter-racial affairs.

Seul Padover, assistant to the Secretary of the Interior, and John Collier of the Bureau of Indian Affairs have suggested an Institute of Ethnic Democracy to be under federal jurisdiction. And Carey McWilliams has suggested a Fair Racial Practices Act with sufficient authority to be effective. We believe both the department and the law are necessary.

The spontaneous rise in many American communities of inter-racial committees shows the need and desire of the citizens for more information on the entire problem of race relations. It shows moreover an instinctive desire for action. The American people want to prevent further race tensions. They do not want democracy under fire at home, while we fight for it on foreign battlefields.

These persons need aid in their work for racial justice. Local committees cannot gather material from all sources. They have no jurisdiction or influence beyond the city limits of their own town when tension arises in nearby places. They have no protection against the spread of such riots into their own cities.

Local committees need the help of a national body. They need backing and they need authority.

Only a national organization can cope with racial antipathies as they rise in separate localities all over the country. Racial democracy is one of the tests of our war aims. It is the business of our government to preserve this democracy at home. -- Pacific Citizen

REP. EBERHARTER WILL FILE MINORITY OPINION AGAIN

H.P. Eberharter, Democrat, Penn., who is known for his minority report defending the WRA as a member of the Dies Committee, is preparing to file another minority opinion, according to the A.P. report of Feb. 28.

Eberharter made the announcement following Dies Committee recommendations affecting the WRA as a result of inquiries conducted by a Dies committee sub-committee headed by Rep. Costello of California.

The removal of D.S.

Myer, WRA director, and Ray C. Best, Tule Lake director, was one of the recommendations made.

In explaining his dissenting position, Eberharter declared, "It seems to me the other two members (Costello, Mundt) of the sub-committee approached the subject with bias, and destructively critical findings could be expected without giving proper consideration to the complexities of the problems which confronted the War Relocation Authority.

RESEARCH FINDS ARIZONA VALLEY FEVER CARRIER

Specialists in bacteriology and public health in Chicago, Ill., have found proof that wild fur-bearing life in Arizona is a responsible source of coccidioides immitis, the fungus which causes "valley fever," according to a letter from Dr. W. Furuta, former Gila resident.

In the same letter Dr. Furuta said, "From my brief experience in my new environment I should like to urge you that you should relocate as soon as your individual circumstances permit. Needless to say, life on the outside is no bed of roses, not a by a long shot. There are added responsibilities, burdens, worries and other factors of which I cannot describe in this short message, but analyzing the whole problem from a sound objective angle, relocation is the only answer."

Court Finds Youth Guilty

One defendant charged with resisting arrest, was found guilty by the Butte Judicial Commission yesterday afternoon.

He was sentenced to serve 30 days all of which was suspended pending good behavior and on the condition that he be placed on probation for 60 days, during which he must report to the Internal Security once a week to show good behavior. In the event of commission of any offense in this community he will serve 30 days in the county jail, the sentence states.

Because of lack of time yesterday, several cases were continued until tomorrow afternoon. One resident will be arraigned on a charge of assault with a deadly weapon. Three youths will be tried for disturbing the peace and one for resisting arrest.

Bishop Reifsnider was the former President of St. Paul University in Japan.

of evacuation to date, author William Flynn wrote that more than 50% of the evacuees have already decided that they will remain east of the Sierras permanently. This figure was based on a survey conducted by the Chronicle.

Only 10% of the evacuees are determined to return to their West Coast homes, the survey revealed. The other 40% are undecided. Flynn wrote, "Even if the military exclusion orders were rescinded tomorrow, there would not be a mass movement of evacuees westward."

Most of the evacuees are "convinced that they will find a reasonable degree of social security and economic opportunity" east of the Sierras, the article said. It continued, "In some cases, they know both will be greater than ever accorded them in the Pacific Coast states. They have already found them so."

Flynn said of the evacuees that they "seek only a chance to live as peaceful citizens of a democratic nation."

Temporary housing in hotels or boarding houses may be arranged for evacuees coming into the New York City area by wiring the WRA office for reservations in advance, announced Wilson Hart, relocation adviser.

Families coming together should give as much advance notice as possible in securing temporary housing.

If possible, evacuees should not make plans to arrive on week-ends as rooms are very difficult to secure at those times, added Hart.

Chicago WRA office has made arrangements with six small Chicago hotels to accommodate incoming resettlers, stated Wilson Hart, relocation adviser. These include the YMCA Hotel which is located within the "Loop" and is available for families as well as single men.

Weekly rates in those hotels range from \$4.50 to \$7.50 for single persons and from \$7.00 to \$14.00 for doubles. In addition, the WRA office has compiled a list of over two hundred rooming houses offering one, two, and three-room kitchenettes to evacuees. There are a number of housekeeping rooms where two people can be accommodated for from \$6.00 to \$12.00 per week. There are two boarding houses operated by Japanese featuring Japanese cooking which cater to single men. The rates of each are \$11.00 per week for room and board. Most Chicago resettlers are living in kitchen apartments where they prepare their own meals. They report that their expenses run about \$5.00 per week.

なつて居る。今後転住先でそうした不幸に会つた人は、其の地方転住事務所を通して出願すれば、一世二世を問はず直ちにその必要額が下附される筈である。若し不幸にして一家の主人が亡くなり、女子供で困る様な場合は、いつても政府の費用で元のセンターへ歸すことも出来る。

既に多くの中には斯うした不幸な例は二三に止まらない。

無論斯う不幸は誰しも避けたい事ではあるが避け難い社会の実相である。

上記の如き不安の爲に再転住を躊躇してゐる人々があるとすれば、今後そうした心配から解放されて、各自のプランを真剣に押し進められたい。同胞社会の再建は斯くして、徐々に進められる。
