

## NURSE SHORTAGE

### Dr. Sleath Asks Residents' Aid

Declaring that the shortage of nurses' aides at the hospital is creating a situation that is getting more critical daily, Dr. Jack C. Sleath, chief medical officer, appealed directly to the residents yesterday to help allay the shortage.

He declared that unless the number of nurses' aides is increased immediately, the residents will have to take care of their sick at home.

"With the present number of nurses' aides the hospital will only be able (continued on page 2)

## ALL ELIGIBLE FOR LEAVE GRANT

"Men who have had their pre-induction physical examinations and desire to relocate themselves or families on indefinite leave will be given leave assistant grants on the same basis as grants are approved for other evacuees," teletyped Director Dillon Myer to Gila on March 7.

No special leave restrictions are placed upon men who are awaiting call to active military duties. It is only necessary that such men exercise extreme caution in keeping their draft boards notified of their whereabouts.

The first of the list of men to receive their pre-induction physical examinations in April have arrived, announced Henry C. Freeland, leave officer. Preliminary examinations will be given to the second group in the same manner as that of the first group.

## DRAFT AGE NISEI PETITION FOR EQUAL OPPORTUNITIES

A petition requesting equal privileges and opportunities for nisei in any branch of the Army and Navy was drawn up Tuesday by several nisei residents, who are eligible for induction in the Army.

Copies of the petition have been placed at the block 52 manager's office and the Canal administration building for signatures. All residents who are eligible for induction may sign the petition at the two locations tomorrow, Saturday, and Sunday.

The petition, addressed to the Rivers community councils, reads as follows:

We the undersigned, being American citizens of the Japanese ancestry eligible for induction in the Army, herewith make the following declaration and petitions, and request that these be considered and forwarded to appropriate authorities, in such a manner as you deem best.

1. We gladly accept the reinstatement of selective service for Japanese Americans because it gives us an opportunity to demonstrate our loyalty to our country.

2. We request that, when inducted into the armed services, we be granted the same privileges and opportunities as other Americans, including the right to serve in any branch of the Army or Navy, including the Air Forces, according to our abilities.

3. We request further that Japanese Americans be not segregated into Japanese American units. We recognize the services that have been rendered by the Japanese American combat units, in that they have demonstrated the loyalty and courage of the group; but now we request that we be mingled with other Americans in all

services so that our abilities may be utilized to the utmost.

4. We finally petition those in authority for assistance in the early restoration of all our Constitutional guarantees.

### CANAL BEGINS DRIVE NEXT WEEK

Canal's Red Cross Drive will begin sometime next week with the aid of block managers, stated Karl Iwanaga, executive secretary.

The Red Cross Board consists of Hiratsuka, Yanagihara, Saeki, and Iida. The estimated total budget for 1944 is \$600.00.

The financial statement for the past year was released by Iwanaga. Receipts from last year's drive totaled \$135.00 and disbursement amounted to \$668.51, leaving a balance of \$466.49. The disbursements are as follows:

Contribution to headquarter, \$380; local hospital service, \$114.49; first aid and medical supplies, \$58.50; service to soldiers, \$9.33; stationary, stamps, telegrams, \$30.78; motion picture, \$13.91; typewriter service, \$6; Tule Lake Red Cross as Canal transferee's portions, \$50; miscellaneous, \$5.50.

## BEST TRADITIONS

A feeling, definite and palpable, had been growing among the draft-age nisei in the center. It was obvious that this feeling would find expression sooner or later. This week it found itself. This week an articulate group rose spontaneously from among the young draft-age nisei men and put the feeling into words. They drew up a petition which was both a declaration of faith in America and a reminder that faith cannot long sustain itself where there is no growth. It is a petition which the group will take to the nisei, from whom it received its inspiration, for approval and signature and finally will submit it to the Community Councils for forwarding to appropriate authorities, which include the people of the United States.

The NEWS-COURIER is proud to print the petition. Its outlook shows tolerant understanding of the foibles of mankind. It shows realization that wrongs cannot be righted overnight. But at the same time there is a belief here that wrongs can be set right in time and that when injustices exist they must be called to the attention of the public.

Here is an attitude plus a petition expressing that attitude. Both represent the best traditions of this country.

## INCONSISTENCY HERE

The availability of adequate medical care when it is needed should ever be a concern of man. On health depends so much of the success and happiness men glean from life. Thus it was not surprising that people in the center have made strong representation to the WRA for assurance that they will always have enough doctors here to care for the sick. It is, however, difficult to understand the apparent lack of interest in the critical shortage of nurses' aides which has developed in the center. Despite repeated appeals, the rapidly depleted nurses' aides corps is not receiving replacements in quantities sufficient to make up the loss. Here is a menace to community health every bit as real as loss of doctors.

## BE PREPARED

There always comes a time in every family when simple home nursing training will be invaluable. In these days when medical care for civilians is becoming pretty difficult to get all over the country, surely it would not be amiss to learn home nursing techniques. At any rate for those who wish to be prepared for any emergency, a nisei registered nurse is here from the American Red Cross and will start a six-week course in home nursing tomorrow.

to take care of the critically ill and operative cases," he said. He continued, "Many cases which it would be desirable to retain in the hospital will have to be cared for at home." He disclosed that over the past week-end 14 patients have been discharged for care at home.

The critical shortage of nurses' aides was created through relocation. The few nurses' aides now employed are doing their utmost to keep the hospital running, but cannot be expected to carry the load indefinitely, Dr. Sleath declared.

"Unless the hospital is able to secure additional nurses' aides from the community, further sections of the hospital must necessarily be closed and admittance to the hospital must necessarily be limited to the critically ill patients and dire emergencies," he warned. Ward H of the hospital was closed a month ago because of lack of hospital help.

# POSTAL RATES TO CHANGE SOON

Changes in postal rates including raising of postage on air mail, packages, and local mail, and increasing C.O.D. and money order fee will become effective Sunday, March 26, announced Paul Farmer, superintendent of the Rivers post office.

The changes, ordered by the third assistant Postmaster General and passed by Congress on Feb. 25 of this year, become effective on the 26th so that mail dropped at the post office on that Sunday must comply with the new rates.

Local mail, which now goes for 2¢ will be abolished; all such mail will be 3¢. Air mail goes up to 6¢, packages will cost approximately a penny more, and C.O.D. fees will be doubled.

Her schedule has six classes at different times during the week as follows:

- (1)-Monday, Wednesday, Friday-issei-9 to 11 a.m. at rec. 56.
- (2)-Tuesday, Thursday-nisei-9 to 11 at 42-2-A.
- (3)-Mon., Wed., Fri., -issei-1:30 to 3:30 p.m. at 42-2-A.
- (4)-Tues., Thurs., -issei -1:30 to 3:30 at rec. 56.
- (5)-Mon., Wed., Fri., -nisei-7 to 9 p.m. at red. 56.
- (6)-Tues., Thurs., -nisei -7 to 9 p.m. at 42-2-A.

Classes will be limited to 20 students so that each will get personal attention.

The Tuesday - Thursday classes will start on March 14 and will run for six weeks. The Monday-Wednesday, Friday classes will run for four weeks.

Demonstrations of the work of nisei engineers and infantry, under command of a nisei Army officer, are shown. Various elements of the basic training of a soldier, such as the manual of arms, guard mount, gas mask drill, machine gun practice, running the obstacle course, hand grenade throwing, use and application of camouflage and other activities are depicted.

One of the most moving portions of the picture is a parade and review, with an entire regiment, including the nisei soldiers, marching smartly to the sounds of martial music, past the reviewing officer and the colors, saluting as they pass.

The nisei also demonstrate how quickly they can throw a pontoon bridge across a stream, their adeptness at motorized equipment and how they can "take it" on a forced march under a broiling Mississippi sun.
