

## CO-OP Board Elects Kono President

Hikotaro Kono of Canal was re-elected president of the Gila River Co-op at the Board of Directors meeting held Monday.

The other officers elected are vice-president Yuhel Oshima, secretary-Masato W. Kato (re-elected), and treasurer-Masumi Tajima (re-elected).

Ken Kitasaki, educational chairman, was unanimously appointed by the Board of Directors as the new assistant general manager, replacing Tatsuzo Mori who relocated. This leaves the post of educational chairman open.

Five men were elected to the Board of Directors to serve for one year, together with the five old members who have served six months already and whose terms expire this September. The five elected this time are:

Canal section 1-Toi zo Yahanda, section 2-Tsunoyoshi Fujimoto. Butte section 1 - Itsuhei Takano, section 2 - Kichigoro Rijsaki, section 3-Kanekichi Shibuya.

## PHYSICAL ORDERS COME FOR THIRTY MORE GILANS

The number of nisei called from all the centers totaled 1280 as of March 20, according to a teletype from Washington.

Of the total, 302 were accepted, 156 were rejected, one was inducted, nine volunteered and 31 were holdouts.

The 700 odd others are believed to be still in the processing stage.

Three Granada boys who failed to report for induction on March 15 were

arrested by the US Marshall on March 17 and removed from the center.

Meanwhile Rivers received more orders for men to take their pre-induction physical examinations in the second group. The date for the examination will be set as soon as a sufficient number of names arrive, said Henry Freeland, leave officer.

Dr. Roscoe M. Podicord, chief medical officer at the Tule Lake Center for the past 14 months, arrived here with his wife Tuesday to replace Dr. Jack C. Sleath who will go to Tule Lake this week to act as chief medical officer there.

Dr. Podicord said in an interview yesterday that in the short time that he has been here the residents of Gila, both the appointed staff and evacuees, have been very pleasant. However, he said, he does miss his friends at Tule Lake. They gave him a farewell

gift and asked him to write back to them telling about the Gila camp.

The Rivers hospital compares favorably with those of the other centers according to Dr. Podicord who has seen every center except Poston. Although Rivers faces a shortage of nurses aides, he is confident that the situation can be remedied, especially with Jerome's coming in June.

He said that the bright weather here and the white walled barracks and green lawns and trees make the appearance of this center very good.

## LUXURY TAX RISES APRIL 1

Effective April 1, the heretofore 10% luxury tax on cosmetics, toilet articles, jewelry etc. will rise to 20%, stated Bunji Ikencue, general manager of the Gila Co-op. The new rate is a national policy that affects the whole nation.

Ikencue also stated that canned Japanese goods will go on sale in all food canteens beginning Tuesday, March 28. Only a limited quantity of the canned Japanese goods is available, he said.

COMMON GROUND

DR KEHOE TELLS  
OF GILA CENTER

Why do they--the evacuee issai--study so gradually? This question Dr. Monika Kehoe, former Rivers adult education director, asks and answers in her article "Education and Resettlement," published in the spring issue of Common Ground.

There are many reasons for the women's thirst for English, she says, and most of them are personal. For example, Mrs. Yoshimoto...has a son in the army and she wants to learn English so she can read the letters he writes to her."

"Her daughter reads them and sums it all up by saying, 'He says he's OK ma, and sends love'. Mrs. Yoshimoto wants to know what else is on all those pages her 'teen age daughter is too busy to read to her."

The men go to school too. They have left the fertile valleys of California; their future lies eastward in the industrial cities; they face the tremendous task of vocational readjustment and they are attacking that job with a persistent intensity.

"Only one drive can explain such ambition--the intention to relocate and be self sufficient economically in a normal community. They want to be producing citizens like any other American."

"As the younger generation relocates, the older people gradually overcome their feeling of shyness and, with each other for protection, invade the school precincts in ever growing numbers. Among their older population there is likewise noticeable urge toward adopting American manners and dress and a great curiosity about American folk-ways and ideology. These issai tend to relocate more slowly because of greater language and vocational handicaps as well as a more deep-seated fear of "the outside" with its insecurities and antagonisms. YOUTH THINKS AHEAD

Nisei adolescents probably have matured faster mentally in the last few years because of evacuation than they could have done in any other two years of their lives. There may be some young people who are taking advantage of this easy life and are retreating into their narrow day-to-day living, refusing to look ahead. But we feel that the majority of the youths have recovered from the first shock of homes uprooted and are looking forward to the time when they will rebuild a family and a home which their parents started on the West Coast but are now unable to reconstruct because of old age and the language handicaps.

In the last issue of the Canal high school paper, the Hi Tide, a young student penned his thoughts on "why I should relocate." He writes that as times goes by his craving to leave the center and relocate seems to wane. Yet he realizes it is best for him to go.

"Now, after over seventeen months in this barrack city, I have little, if any desire to relocate," as writes. "I often think of all the hardships that a people in the outside world must face. It makes me feel sick. Yes, I must admit that I have learned to become lazy, unresourceful, and to do little that is worthwhile. I have added it all up and I find that I am actually afraid to face the 'other' world, the world of which I was a part for fourteen years of my life. Why did I not see all this when my longing to relocate was so great? I did see all the hardships we would face, but then I wasn't afraid and I know we could overcome all obstacles. Now, although I have little desire to relocate, I realize it will be fully best to do so, for only through relocation can I conquer that fear that has so unsuspectingly grown within me."

It is a shame that many young and undeveloped minds which ordinarily would be engaged in thinking of picnics and parties, have had to think so seriously and so suddenly about work and earning a livelihood. But these are not ordinary times. It is just one of the manifestations of wartime that makes youth think seriously about life, and nisei here are doing their share.

We are fighting for the sacred rights of man; we don't want them tored with behind our backs."

# RELOCATION IN SOUTH DISCUSSED BY C. B. PRICE

"I am encouraged at the present time to believe that the possibilities for relocation in the South will open in greater numbers as time goes on," wrote C.R. Price, relocation officer in Little Rock, Arkansas.

Said Price, "Community acceptance seems to be more favorable as the people of the South learn more and more about the relocation program. Recently, I have discovered truck farming bolts in Mississippi, Georgia and Oklahoma."

"I have in mind at present," he continued, "an area of land in Oklahoma where I have just visited which I believe will be ideal for some farming families. One owner had 4,000 acres available in the Arkansas River valley. The climate is favorable, the soil is excellent, the marketing facilities are good and it is wide open for cultivation. The owner is offering a very splendid proposition. He has four tractors at the present time and claims he can get all the farming implements he needs."

"He will furnish everything except labor and the living expenses of the workers and pay them on a fifty per cent share basis." For particulars contact the relocation office in either Butte or Canal.

## NEW MAIL RATE BEGINS SUNDAY

Changes in postal rates become effective this Sunday, March 26, announced Paul Farmer, superintendent of the Rivers post office.

The major changes will be as follows:

Local mail which now goes for 2¢ will be abolished and all mail will be 3¢, air mail goes up from 6¢ to 8¢, C.O.D. fees will double, packages will cost approximately a penny more, and money orders and registered mail rates rise progressively.

Pony post cards and open mail will not be changed by the new order.

## 1,000 Evacuees In Detroit Area

Over 1,000 have been relocated in the Detroit area with the majority working in professional or technical capacities, reported the Detroit Free Press in a front page story.

Detroit proper ranks fifth among cities in number of relocated Japanese.

The majority of the relocators are doctors, dentists or engineers. Some with technical training are employed in Detroit war plants.

Concluded the story: The greatest handicap to the relocation work is the area's housing shortage.

**AIDS RELOCATION PROGRAM**

Dr. Frank Herron Smith, member of the Protestant Commission for Japanese Service in America, left for California 5 o'clock Tuesday evening after spending three days in

Rivers lecturing to issei, nisei, and school groups in Butte and Canal.

Dr. Smith declared he was very much impressed to see that so many of the older nisei have relocated outside. He said that the Protestant Commission has always helped and is always ready to help students who want to attend schools. He pointed out that the Commission has accomplished much in aiding deserving students continuing schooling and in providing Christmas cheer gifts for children in the centers.

Dr. Smith is continually making the rounds of Japanese communities, relocation centers, detention camps, and nisei soldier camps. This is his third visit to Gila.

Relocation possibilities are good in the Midwest states, Dr. Smith declared. He also pointed out that Kansas and Arkansas are unfriendly and that Colorado and Utah are nearly filled.

Dr. Smith has spent more than 20 years in the Orient as missionary and teacher, having taught at schools in Nagasaki. He has a Japan-born son who graduated from Camp Savage, served in the Aleutians campaign, and is now fighting in the South Pacific.

Nisei already employed in Carbon County are getting along well and being raised to higher paying jobs as work warrants. District is organized but the United Mine Workers and Japanese have no difficulty entering Union. Mining is of such vital importance that in 1943 several thousand men were discharged from the Army in order to return to the mines.

Salary \$100.00 per month plus four room house with electricity and water and 200 pounds of meat, milk, and garden space. It was not anticipated that the internal security would not in prosecution when the commission was first set up. It is wrong to assume that the internal security prosecutes anyone; they apprehend, Wolter said. The case in court becomes the people vs. the defendant, unless an individual has brought the charge.

Dr. Herbert Hata of the Rivers hospital donated several medical books and manuals to the Butte community library.

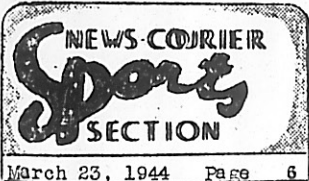
They cover various subjects including surgery, gynecology, histology, physiology, bacteriology, physical therapy, pathology and anatomy.
