VOLUNTEERS FOR SAVAGE STILL BEING ACCEPTED

Volunteers for the Military Intelligence Language School in Camp Savage are still being accepted, announced Captain Paul Rusch, director of Personnel at Camp Savage.

A new quota of qualified men is being taken in May. All men who desire to go to Camp Savage should get application blanks at the relocation office and write directly to Captain Rusch.

Said Captain Rusch, "Upon their actual induction through the normal procedure of the draft, and after acceptable applicants have notified us of their induction, army serial number, organization and station, we then request their transfer to Camp Savage."

NISEI

WINS AIR FORCE COMMISSION

Lieut. Noboru Tashiro of Lamar is probably the only Japanese American officer in the U.S. Army Air Forces, states the Pacific Citizen.

Lieut. Tashiro, a native of Colorado, volunteered for the army along with thousands of other men of Japanese ancestry on the mainland and in Hawaii when that opportunity was given in the winter of 1943.

Instead of being assigned to the Japanese American combat team, he asked his draft board for assignment in the Air Force. He was sent to Florida for aviation cadet training.

He was commissioned after completing a training course at New York University.

A meteorologist, he is assigned at present to an intermountain base, but hopes soon to get into combat action in the air.

SCREENING HEARINGS FOR RELOCATORS ABOLISHED

Effective immediately, residents, nisei and aliens, will not be required to be processed through a screening committee according to a memo

followed to prevent loss through physical examination rejections after applicants have been accepted by Camp Savage.

SHELBY PIC TO BE SHOWN AGAIN

The memo reads:

"As of this date, you may discontinue hearings by the Screening Committee.

"As a substitute, all persons desiring leave should be scheduled through the regular Leave Clearance Committees. This will cover all persons including aliens.

"Once the person has received leave approval by the committee, the only further check to be made, at the time a request for outside employment is filed, will be further questioning by the Leave Officer to determine whether there has been any change in the situation which would warrant disapproval of leave by me."

28 Nisei Refuse Training In Ala.

Twenty-eight nisei inductees at Fort McClellan, Alabama, have been placed in the camp stockade awaiting court-martials for refusing to accept training, according to an AP report.

The men were members of a special battalion formed on March 1 with personnel composed principally of the nisei. Actual training for these men started March 20.

All the other members of the battalion accepted training willingly, reported Brig. Gen. Wallace Philoon, commanding general of the training center.

"WE ARE ALL YANKS UNDER OUR SKINS"

Two editorials, written in two different parts of the country, propound the thesis that Yanks are Yanks, the color of their faces notwithstanding. The first is an editorial from the Milwaukee Journal; the second, from Republic Times in Illinois.

Before using some war-time adjective in front of the noun "Jap", read the story of Sgt. Gary Hisaoka of the American army in Italy. Read how he rescued his wounded white major from under the very muzzles of the German guns. Or remember the modest way in which Mike Miyake, another Japanese American from Hawaii, passed off commendation of his bravery in bringing wounded men out of Cassino. A couple of months ago, dispatches from Algiers told of the Japanese American surgeon who labored on and on, without relief, to care for our wounded in spite of his four broken ribs.

Wisconsin has reason to have more than ordinary interest in the outstanding record that is being made by these Japanese in American uniforms, for many of them were trained in this state only about a year ago.

Wisconsin will hope, as the men themselves hope, that the bravery and utter devotion to America of these Japanese Americans will convince the rest of us that a man should be judged on his character and his accomplishment and not on his ancestry, the slant of his eyes, of the color of his skin.

No better antidote could be compounded for the potent poisons of war bred suspicion and racial hatreds.

Ben Kuroki is a Japanese American who has twice won the Distinguished Flying Cross for his bombing work in Europe. His present ambition is to bombard Tokyo.

Kuroki is a proof that not all Japanese are like Tojo and C. O., and that

Private Tadashi Morimoto, personnel classification specialist at Shelby, explains it this way. "You are a good American, but you are like something new that has been discovered. You wouldn't feel sure about a new airplane that has not been tested in battle. You have to try it out. Well, we have to prove what we are."

That is the boys' job. What is ours at home? Morimoto says, "My message to the folks at home is this: write to the boys in camp. Remember their birthdays and the special events in their lives." Letters from home! News of loved ones. Recollections of happier, homier days. The little chit chats that make up our daily lives.

Letters from home mean more to them than anything else. Time and again, in surveys conducted among servicemen, the men have said, "Tell those at home to write, write, and write some more."

A letter is a small thing that we can all do cheerfully and graciously. Send a letter today and keep sending them.

GARMENT INDUSTRY AND NEW YORK

The dress manufacturing industry in New York is now at the height of its activities, according to Mary Hayes, relocation officer in New York.

This is an excellent time for dressmakers, finishers, alteration hands, fitters, drapers, and hand sewers to secure positions in the numerous custom dress shops in New York City, said Miss Hayes.

Beginners earn from \$20 to \$23 per week and experienced workers from \$26 to \$35.

The garment industry comprises 36% of New York City's business.

There is also an active demand for clerical workers, beauticians, green house workers, commercial artists, domestics, laboratory and dental technicians, hotel and restaurant workers, dry cleaners, laundry men and hospital workers in the New York area.

ROCKFORD**FARMING IN ILLINOIS**

Farm opportunities for Japanese Americans are available in the vicinity of Rockford, Illinois, which is 87 miles northwest of Chicago, announced Wilson Hart, relocation adviser. Exceptional community acceptance has been established by the nisei farmers who have lived in this area for the last year.

YEAR ROUND WORK

Field work starts about April 1 and continues through November. From December to March the time is spent in taking care of livestock and repairing buildings and machinery. Jobs offered are year around employment.

Farmers in this area are aware that nisei are not experienced with livestock but expect them to operate tractors and other farm machinery.

Wages paid average from \$100 to \$135 for married men. Farmers have agreed to start men at \$100 per month and advance them as soon as they demonstrate their ability. The single men averages from \$75.00 to \$100 per month plus room, board, and laundry. Top wages are paid to the men that can produce.

FERTILE LAND

Land is fertile and rainfall is adequate and is well distributed over the growing season, Milton C. Geuther, Rockford Relocation Officer, states, "It is our suggestion to interested farm families that the men come to Rock-

Residence is located two and a half miles from Reno, Nevada on ten acres of land. Man would mow lawns, irrigate and work garden, care and feed a small flock of chickens, turkeys and one cow for family use. His wife would clean up the house, serve the evening meals do the dishes and the family laundry for two people. No cooking. Modern equipment is used including power lawn mower and a new washing machine. Couple would live in a small three room apartment newly remodeled. Salary would be \$150.00 a month plus free housing, eggs, chickens, and garden vegetables produced on the place. Also has canning equipment and quick freeze unit which can be used by employee. Employers have lived in the Hawaiian Islands and have Japanese friends.

NISEI TAKES PART IN PANEL

Miss Chiye Horiuchi of Minidoka and Seattle last week represented the Japanese Americans in a panel discussion in Peoria, Illinois on problems of racial groups. Miss Horiuchi is a stenographer at the local YWCA. She resettled from here in spring of 1943.

The discussion was termed a World Wide observance and was sponsored by business and professional girls of the YWCA. Similar observance were held in Fort Wayne and Elkhart, Indiana.

Miss Horiuchi said that although relocation camps were set up as a military necessity, many persons keenly felt their new status because German and Italian nationals were allowed to remain in their homes.

Other speakers brought out the fact that racial differences are skin deep only and that organically psychologically, and intellectually all are alike.

DO NOT TAKE ANY LUMBER

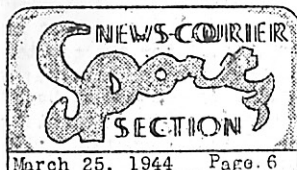
Residents should not take lumber from the golf course located the southwest end of the Butte community, announced Shotaro Hikida, CAS coordinator.
