## Wolter Explains Leave Status

Because there is some misunderstanding of the article of last Saturday concerning the screening of relocators, the following clarification is issued by Hugo W. Wolter.

Residents who have had leave clearance hearings and who have had leave status approved on form 259 (Washington clearance); 259 A (EDC clearance), or 259 B (Defense plant clearance), need not appear before the screening committee before relocation, he said. Any checking that needs to be done will be done by leave office.

## RULES PASSED ON DOGS, CATS

Regulations prohibiting possession of un inoculated dogs or cats after May 1 of this year, and requiring the annual licensing of all dogs before March 31 of each year has been added to the Code of Offenses of Rivers as a health measure for the community and as a safeguard for children.

The joint Executive Committees of the councils of Butte and Canal and representatives of the Block Managers requested that the regulations be adopted, and after consultation with the administration, drew up these regulations:

(1) Any person who, on or after May 1, 1944, owns

## WIDER EDUCATION STRESSED AT WASHINGTON CONFERENCE

A broader and revitalized educational program was the theme of the moment at the Washington Conference of WRA school superintendents last week, reports W. C. Sawyer, Rivers' School Superintendent, who returned Tuesday

evening from the week-long conference.

Great emphasis was laid on the role which schools should play in relocation education with increased attention to adult education and vocational training, stated "Tom" Sawyer. Consent was gained to add a mechanics instructor in each community at Gila, and allowance was made for tools and equipment for two shops.

The conference called the ten WRA school superintendents to review the work of the past year and to redirect the emphasis for another year. The sessions were directed by Assistant National Director John Provinso, and by Dr. Lester K. Ade, WRA National Director of Education.

"To date," said Provinso, "schools have focussed their attention on the elementary and secondary schools. These are now well organized; we must now direct our attention to the rest of the family." Dr. Julia Von Buskirk, who until now has been developing readers and other training aids for the Army, was recently added to the Washington staff in Education.

## GOTO BROTHERS WIN DAMAGES

Rivers' Goto brothers were awarded damages of \$1250 by Superior Judge Frank Collier this week against the Southern California Broadcasting Co. reported the LA Times.

The brothers, Toshihisa, Masaji and Arthur testified that the Company had erected a tower on their strawberry farm. They had asked for \$7,000 damages.

## Family Leave Program Starts

Where negotiations are about to be completed for the relocation of three or more families, WRA will grant travel assistance to and from a locality to a responsible representative if he is approved by the relocation officer, project director and the planning commission, announced William Huso, relocation head.

Travel assistance will not be granted for a preliminary exploratory trip or to see more than one proposition in a given locality. To receive grants, there must be a genuine intent to relocate.

The WRA does not encourage relocation of groups larger than six families except in cases where the relocation officer advises the project director that a larger group will be well received in the community, said Huso.

## BLOCK MANAGERS TO TAKE CENSUS

Under orders from the Secretary of the Interior, a complete census of Rivers is being taken by the block managers tonight.

Because funds are allocated to WRA centers on the basis of population, it is extremely necessary that an accurate count be kept, said Hugo Wolter, acting project director.

ISERI EXPLAINS  
WHY SHE JOINED

Declaring that she had "volunteered for the Women's Army Corps because I am proud of America and proud that I am an American citizen," Miss Kathleen Iseri, former Gila River resident employed as a secretary in the New York WRA relocation office, left for basic training at Fort Oglethorpe, Ga., following her induction last week into the WAC.

When she enlisted, Miss Iseri expressed preference for overseas duty. She departed for the WAC training camp exactly one year from the day she left Gila River to take a secretarial position in Washington D.C.

Miss Iseri's mother, Mrs. Tomiye Iseri, and two younger brothers, George and Shig, still reside at Rivers at 58-10-B. Her sister Marilyn is now completing her academic courses at Bayside, Long Island, High School, preparatory to entering Genesee Hospital in Rochester, N.Y., for training in the U.S. Nurse Cadet Corps. Another brother, Ken, is employed in Washington, D.C., by the intelligence division of the Federal Communications Commission.

Said Kathleen, "True, I had to leave my home on the West Coast at the onset of the war and live in a relocation center. But would Hitler or Tojo have given me the opportunity to leave such a camp--to help establish new homes for the other Americans of Japanese ancestry, who, like myself, were evacuated from the West Coast? Would these Fascists have given me an opportunity to enjoy the privileges which are the rights of every citizen? I hardly think so. I have been deeply instilled with the American sense of good sportsmanship and fair play."

Kathleen was in charge of the solicitation for contributions to the American Red Cross at the New York WRA office during the fund-raising campaign this month and went "over the top" with her quota.

## EDITORIAL

## A BIT OF JUSTICE

Welcome is the news that Pasadena Superior Court Judge Frank C. Collier Tuesday awarded damages to the Goto brothers of Rivers against the Southern California Broadcasting Company for crop losses suffered as a result of a tower construction by the radio network.

To the parties concerned the actual value recovered is small, especially compared to what they have asked, but to evacuees as a whole, the bit of faith in American justice recovered may be of inestimable value.

To a group such as ours--Californians who have had to leave their home state, citizens who have been denied certain civil rights--the news of justice noted out by Judge Collier in California, both by awarding damages and by defending the brothers' right to be present on the prohibited West Coast, is heartening indeed.

The fact that the brothers saw fit to push suit against the Broadcasting Company, proceedings which would take them right into California, the hotbed of Anti-Japanese feeling, attests to their faith in the justice of the courts. And the fact that the California Judge awarded the damages is indication that the American sense of fair play is not completely dead as some newspapers and self-appointed spokesmen for California would have us believe.

We are awaiting the day when news of just court decisions such as this comes to us as a matter of course and needs no more space in the day's news than a passing notice. We, who are sacrificing lives and contributing sweat for the nation's cause along with other Americans, have a right to expect decent treatment. We have a right to expect just treatment not only in the courts of America but also on the streets of America including those of California.

or has in his possession, custody or control, any dog or cat which has not been inoculated for rabies by the designated authorities of the Gila River Relocation Center, and any such person who is not able to prove such inoculation by a certificate issued by the authorities shall be deemed guilty of a violation of section 22 (21 for Canal) namely, maintaining a public nuisance and shall be subject to the penalties in such case made and provided, and in addition thereto, the authorities of the Gila River Relocation Center are authorized to destroy all dogs and cats which are found not to be inoculated by or before April 30, 1944.

(2)-Any person who owns a dog which has not been licensed in accordance with laws of the State of Arizona, by or before the

31st day of March of each year, shall be deemed guilty of a violation of Section 22 (21 for Canal) of the Code of Offenses of Butte (Canal) Community, namely, maintaining a public nuisance and shall be liable for the penalty in such case made and provided, and in addition thereto, any such dog shall be destroyed in accordance with the laws of the State of Arizona.

In cases where the relocation plans of persons who are ill or infirm have been approved by the relocation division, application may be made for mini-buses, suitable Pullman accommodations, announced William Fuso, relocation head.

Generally speaking, Pullman accommodations will be available for persons in the following categories if approved by the project medical officer:

- (1)-Persons 65 years old, or older;
- (2)-Pregnancy in the second and third trimesters;
- (3)-Mothers with babies up to 18 months old;
- (4)-Special medical cases.
