Nisei citizens will be able to vote this year, but they will have to do so by absentee ballot. Since a general rule in common law forbids a person to vote in a state where he has been moved involuntarily, those in centers outside of their own states will have to use absentee ballot.

Those who want to vote should take action right away, stated the Project Attorney. They should write to their election boards in care of the county clerk to obtain the necessary information and the absentee ballots.

The men will not start to receive army pay until they have been placed on active duty.

COMPARES GILA WITH HEART MT.

Community government in the Heart Mountain Center differs from the one here in that the Block Managers and the Council are under different divisions, each having its duties outlined to avoid duplication, according to Thomas Oki, chairman of the Heart Mountain Block Managers, who, with his wife and daughter, is visiting relatives.

Oki, Stanford graduate and Heart Mt. leader, is residing in Block 51 and expects to stay for a couple of weeks before returning to the Wyoming Center.

In Heart Mountain the Block Managers are under the operations division and have charge of the camp maintenance, Oki explained. The Council is under community management and takes care of all legislation. Both bodies

SEEING IS BELIEVING

It is human nature for a person to distrust anything and anybody that he doesn't know and which seems to be a little different from him.

As author Rex Stout writes, it gets so bad that some people go completely crazy with the idea that everybody who isn't just like them is not even human, and all he's good for is either to be a slave or get killed. Thus it is that some racists have gone crazy in their narrow minded attitude toward all evacuees because they don't know evacuees personally or because they are so short sighted they can't see a loyal heart behind a different face.

But as a direct contrast to the ignorant few who think of us as beasts with horns, those who have visited our centers or have met relocated evacuees see us as the decent human beings that we are. So it was depicted by the writer for the Daily Star in Tucson who visited Rivora during the segregation movements of last fall. She saw an ordinary community where men are born and men die, and where people carry on the tasks of running a city. So it is now with Florence Horn, writer for the Fortune magazine, who urges equal treatment for Japanese Americans in the April issue of Fortune. She states that by continuing to keep American citizens in "protective custody" the U.S. is holding to a policy as ominous as it is now. The American custom in past has been to lock up the citizen who commits violence, not the victim of his threats and blows. Miss Horn saw Rivora at work in January.

Within a week or two, President Alfred Atkinson and faculty members of the University of Arizona will visit Gila for a day as will a feature writer from St. Louis. We welcome any opportunity to have visitors, especially these capable observers, see us in our daily work and play. What we resent is the unfair accusations and the insinuations thrown at us by persons who have never really seen us as we really are and who never intend to--those who can't see beyond facial characteristics.

CLARIFICATION ISSUED ON POSSESSION OF ANIMALS

Because of some misunderstandings arising from previous announcements, the following statements are made to clarify the situation regarding pets:

1. By state law, dogs must be licensed by March 31; those found unlicensed after that date may be destroyed by the police. Those who have not already licensed their dogs are warned to do so immediately. Licenses may be procured at the police station in Butte and the police station in Canal.

2. Dogs and cats must be inoculated against rab-

ies by May 1. A later announcement will inform the public as to the arrangements to be made for this inoculation.

3. Wild birds or animals may not be kept as pets by any individual without a special license from the State Game Department. This does not include recognized domesticated birds such as canaries and lovebirds.

Residents are warned that the above provisions are, for the most part, required by the Arizona state law and must be enforced.

NEW YORK

Sakurai Sums Up Living Conditions

Living conditions in metropolitan New York City are summed up by Tek Sakurai, who left Gila several weeks ago and writes, "For the benefit of those young men who wish to come to New York but would be at a loss for rooms, there are a number of YMCA dormitories in New York City which are well-known by cab drivers. Rooms are obtainable there from 75¢ to \$1.50 per day, the average being \$1.00 a day. Some of them have cheaper weekly rates for permanent residents. Girls who have spoken to me about leaving Gila for New York wonder about housing. Housing is not difficult if one goes out and looks for it. Too many girls want to live too close to town. To ride the Subway each day to the Bronx, Queens, or Brooklyn means, in most cases, only a half hour ride as they are very fast.

"If one goes out to eat one can live fairly well on cafeteria cooking. In New York competition keeps food prices down. It is possible to get a complete supper at the Automat for 65¢ from soup to desert. Food at the Automat is well cooked and there are all sorts of deserts. In the city there are many who eat out all the time. Others state that it is often cheaper to eat out in New York. For those who wish Chinese or Japanese food, both are available.

"On the subway one can ride for miles and never see the surface of the ground. One can get lost or confused for only a nickel. In all areas of the city there are any number of small shops which may sell most anything. A hardware store will be next to a jeweler. Alarm clocks which are so scarce elsewhere can be found in New York.

the hospital desires to have it understood that it is permissible for immediate members of a family, such as father, mother, brother, sister, wife or husband to obtain permission to visit the patient confined in the hospital more often than the visiting hours already outlined by applying to the physician in charge of such patient. JUDICIAL SYSTEM

Heart Mountain's court works with one presiding judge and uses the jury system. Forty jurors have been selected, two from each block, and from this list about five are chosen for each trial. No one knows who will comprise the jury until the day of the trial, said Oki. The prosecution is handled by an evacute assistant Project Attorney with a public defender to defend the accused.

MAIL SYSTEM

The mail system has improved too, Oki pointed out. Paid evacute mailmen, one covering two blocks (equal to about four blocks here) make two deliveries each day. Formerly the residents had to go to the district post offices to inquire for mail.

As far as outside appearance goes, Gila's red roofs, white walls, and greenery are just about tops, Oki believes. However the barrack interiors of the Heart Mountain camp necessarily are a better built because of the extreme cold.
