Paper Features Wolter's Talk

The account of Hugo Wolter's speech to the Tucson American Legion last week was featured on the front page of the Legion's official publication, The Southwest Veteran.

Wolter traced the history of evacuation and relocation centers, and explained the problem of resettlement. He told his audience that the WRA has been ordered to find places in the civil economy for those who wish to be released. Here, he believed, was where the people in general could help. "It is your problem," he said. "We will not release any dangerous people. We must have your individual help in our work, and your understanding."

TSUYUKI

FIRST NISEI PARATROOPER

Pfc. Thomas (Bud) Tsuyuki holds the distinction of being one of the first nisei to earn the right to wear the silver "Wings" of a qualified paratrooper, reports the Columbus (Ga.) Enquirer.

Recently he successfully completed his jump training in the Parachute School. Prior to his entering the parachute school, he was at the Army Language School in Mine-sota.

Despite his Japanese ancestry Private Tsuyuki received at the jump school the same respect shown any other American soldier in uniform. He states that he was never once made conscious of his extraction.

Jumping out of a plane the first time up is the most unnatural thing he has experienced.

Project Director Leroy L. Bennett and Ben F. Runyan returned Friday from a two week trip to Poston and Manzanar impressed by the industries developed at the two centers. "However, I still like Rivers the best," remarked Bennett upon his return.

They also visited San Francisco and Los Angeles but were unable to hire staff personnel because the War Manpower Commission had frozen all employment temporarily.

The schools at the Poston Center are outstanding, Bennett said. The industries there include carving, flower making, and painting, the products of which are sold through the com-

Coop May Alter Supervision

There is a possibility that Superintendents of community enterprises in the relocation centers may be replaced by four field men who would cover all 10 centers by periodic check ups, stated Masao W. Kato, Rivers' representative to the Granada Co-op Conference, who returned here Sunday night.

Hikotaro Konno, the other representative, is delayed in Denver on business and is expected here tomorrow.

Gerald Richardson, national head of the WRA community enterprises, in making the proposal, gave the following two reasons: (1) the co-ops are able to stand by themselves, divorced from WRA supervision; (2) several of the superintendents have been drafted by the Army.

There were no objections from the delegates to this proposal, but it must have the approval of Director Dillon Myer before it becomes effective.

Washington will also send a ruling soon governing private enterprise within relocation centers, stated Kato. All other details on the discussion held at Granada will be taken up at the next Gila Co-op Board meeting probably tomorrow, Kato said.

Ex-Canalites At Universities

George Iwatsubo and Harry Murakishi, former Canalites are two successfully relocated men.

munity enterprises.

In Manzanar the residents have done very well in landscaping around the barracks and in improving the living quarters. Industries, which were started by Bennett in 1942 while he was directing industries at the S.F. regional office, have made tremendous progress, he said. The clothing factory turns out about 7,000 garments in one week. The furniture factory makes desks and chairs for camp use, as good as those to be bought in any store. The tofu factory is getting started under the Co-op, and shoyu, bean sprout, miso, and pickling plants are very good, Bennett said.

There is no community council in Manzanar, he said. The government is managed by the block managers, who are doing a very capable job.

LARGEST CITY

The pamphlet points out that although New York is the largest city in the United States, it actually is made up of many neighborhood areas, each of which "is like a small city, with its own main street, stores and movie houses, schools and churches."

INTERESTING FACTS

Some of the interesting facts presented are: 83 languages are spoken in New York; in 1940 there were 2,087 residents of Japanese ancestry—1,456 Issei and 631 Nisei—scattered throughout the city; July, the hottest month, has a mean temperature of 74 degrees; a total of 1,200,000 pupils are enrolled in 850 free day schools and evening schools; the city has 115,000 retail stores, 11,500 eating places, and 543 hotels.
