Gila Dedicates Memorial Sunday

Unveiling ceremonies and dedication of the Rivers War Memorial Monument, erected in honor of men in the service will be held this Sunday morning, April 16, at the hill next to the Butte water tank.

The main speaker will be Major George W. Green, recruiting officer of the Air Corps for this area.

The monument, inscribed with 458 names of Nisei soldiers whose parents or relatives are in Rivers, was erected by the Rivers, Servicemen's Parents and Relatives Association. The cornerstone was laid last year on Armistice Day.

The dedication program for Sunday begins at 9 a.m. as follows:

- 2-Flag raising
- 3-Introductory remarks-W. C. "Tom" Sawyer, chairman of the Rivers Ex-Servicemen's club, and Kenji Arima, who advised in the monument building.

- 4-Unveiling of Honor Roll-Shioto Sasaki, Chairman of Canal's Ex-Servicemen's, and Uhei Oshima, secretary of Butte's organization.

EIGHT ARIZONA SCHOOLS CONVENE HERE SATURDAY

Young women from eight high schools in Arizona will convene at Butte high this Saturday when the Arizona State Girls' League Federation holds its first unscheduled meeting on the Butte campus. The purpose of the convention is to promote good will

among sister chapters of the Federation.

Michiko Mishidura, local president, and her council will act as hostesses for the day to student visitors from high schools in Phoenix, North Phoenix, Mesa, Gilbert, Scottsdale, Tempe, Tolleson, and approximately 125 girls from Canal high school. The theme for the occasion will be "Looking Ahead," stated Jane Eckenstein, adviser of the Butte Girls' League.

Among the guests for the day will be Ruth Polly of the Phoenix Y.W.C.A., Bertha Taylor, former teacher here, and Ethel Rosenberry, state Y.W.C.A. head. Invitations have been sent to the deans of women of colleges and universities of Arizona.

MILLS ASSIGNED TO HEAD POSTON

Effective March 18, Duncan Mills was designated Project Director at the Colorado River Relocation Center. Mills has been Acting Project Director at Colorado River since January 26. Prior to this he was Administrative Officer in the San Francisco Regional Office and Personnel Officer in the Washington Office of WRA.

Wade Head, former project director of Poston, is now working as superintendent of the Indian Agency at Sells, Arizona.

Nisei Chaplain Commissioned

The first mainland Nisei to be commissioned a chaplain in the U. S. Army is First Lieutenant George Aki, who reported for duty to the Japanese American Combat team last week.

Chaplain Aki, a Congregationalist minister, received his commission while in the Jerome Relocation Center. He reported to the Army Chaplains' School in Cambridge, Mass., in February for training. He was attending the Pacific School of Religion in Berkeley at the time of evacuation.

At 29, he is the youngest of four chaplains assigned to the Combat Team.

editorial:

WHY THEY FIGHT

The more a person sacrifices to attain a certain end, the more he is likely to appreciate what he accomplishes. Those who must fight, risking and giving lives, certainly will be more concerned about how the ideals for which they may die are being upheld at home.

Perhaps that explains why soldiers as a whole are very conscious of why blood is being shed and for what ideals they are giving lives, and are willing to battle the axis on the battlefronts and at the same time fight discrimination at home. Not only is that feeling carried by American soldiers like Kuroki who have been subjected to racial discriminations but also by other American soldiers who are aware of the inconsistencies in American democracy.

The following is a letter from an A.A.F. Captain now flying a Liberator in the Central Pacific, typical of letters from men in the trenches to men at home asking the home front to uphold democracy here while they fight for it overseas:

"I want to tell you what a group of us officers and enlisted men have been talking about tonight.

"Though we have done a good job of killing the enemy, I find no sign of an organized hate in any of our men. Our men come closer to hating those at home who break faith with us at the fronts--the shirkers, the profiteers, those who bicker in Washington over our rights. If the powers that be in America deny us in the service the right to an easy, practical way of voting, they will live to regret it. And to the last man our group is not in accord with what some people in the states are trying to do with some American citizens, namely the Japanese citizens. We say, if they step out of the line of faithfulness to our country, punish them severely. But don't touch one of them just because he has Japanese blood. They are American citizens. We are fighting for all American citizens, and when we die for them we don't stop to ask what kind of blood they have. We are fighting for the sacred rights of man; we don't want them toyed with behind our backs."

Keeping Tab On New York

The following letter written by Y. Tek Sakurai, ex-Gilan keeps tab on some men who have relocated to New York from Rivers:

"It's been a heavy program of sight-seeing that I did this last week-end. Since last Saturday, I've been the Rev. John Yamazaki's guide in New York.

"Among other places, I was able to go to the top of the RCA Building and saw Manhattan from it. In going through the log of RCA Tower, I noticed a Gilan who had been up there--George Iwasaki had written his name on it.

"Yesterday as I took the Rev. Yamazaki to the Japanese Christian Institute, I was surprised to find Mr. Hirose, late of the housing section, and also George Fujii of the procurement section. They had just arrived in New York.

"I though spring was well on its way, but to my surprise, it was snowing heavily when I arose this morning. Quite a surprise, this city New York.

"Recently, I had heard that there was a Japanese who had a shop in Rockefeller Center. Monday I was able to find the shop. A man by the name of Mayoda and his wife are running the shop with four helpers.

"It sells inexpensive items of bric-a-brac and costume jewelry. Mrs. Mayoda states that they are fortunate in having an exceedingly large stock in a time when such things are scarce.

"She has a son at Hobart College, a small college in Geneva, New York, and a daughter at Smith College. They are members of one of the wealthiest Episcopal Churches in New York, St. Thomas, on Fifth Avenue."

LETTER

CHICAGO NISEI DOING WELL

A great number of nisei are in Chicago, and most of them seem to be doing well in their jobs, writes Yoshio Honda, former Gila who is working at a garage in Chicago.

He says that many of the nisei around his district come from the Pacific Northwest states of Washington, Idaho, Montana, and Oregon.

"I have talked to different ones and they all seem to be getting along fine. One fellow I met interested me. He came to Chicago last April and took a job in a garage as a general maintenance

man. Today he is the only one beside the owner who has the keys to the garage and he takes care of the money when they close shop."

"I hope that more will gain confidence as he has and show the public that we are not as they sometime read in the newspaper," Honda writes.

In the Chicago papers he has run across many advertisements asking for Japanese Americans to work in factories and other different jobs. "According to that, I believe the majority of nisei are doing a good job."

BRETHREN-BAPTIST

HOSTEL TO OPEN IN NEW YORK CITY ON MAY 10

Applications for the new hostel to be opened in New York in May 10, are being accepted, announced the relocation office.

Operated by the Brethren Service Committee in cooperation with the American Baptist Home Missions Society, the hostel will

be located at 168 Clinton Street in Bro o klyn. Ralph and Mary Smeltzer, former directors of the Chicago hostel, will be the hostel directors.

DECIDING FACTORS

In opening the New York hostel, the Chicago Brethren Hostel will be closed. The decision was made following careful consideration of the relocation situations in the two cities.

Several factors influenced the decision. It is generally agreed that at the present time, New York City needs a hostel more than does Chicago. Temporary housing opportunities for those resettling in New York are more difficult to secure than in Chicago.

CONVENIENTLY LOCATED

The New York hostel will provide room and board for about thirty persons, and its operation will be similar to that of the Brethren Hostel in Chicago where all live together cooperatively.

The hostel is within convenient reach by either the subway train or taxi from the Manhattan railroad stations. It is in a section of New York City where resettlers can secure permanent homes.

AID FOR CHICAGOANS

The Church of the Brethren will continue to employ a staff to assist any relocater in Chicago who may need emergency assistance.

Detailed information on the New York Hostel may be secured at the relocation office, 89-9.

FBI ARRESTS DRAFT EVADERS

The FBI arrested 17 more nisei in Heart Mountain last week bringing the total arrested to 41, in an all-out drive to break the passive resistance campaign against Selective Service among young men at the center, according to an AF release. The men were all arrested for failing to report for pre-induction physical examinations.

Nisei Employed In CIO Union Office

Marked progress was evidenced in relocation efforts last week when it was announced that Miss Yuki Kato, one of Rohwer's young nisei, was appointed to a position of stenographer in St. Louis in the offices of the United Retail, Wholesale and Department Store Employees Association, a CIO union affiliate.

So far as known this is the first instance to go on record anywhere in America since evacuation that a Japanese American has been employed in a union headquarter office.

RELOCATION
WEIGHT LIMIT ON SHIPMENT OF HOUSEHOLD GOODS LIFTED

As a further step in the program to assist families in relocating, the household goods of such families may now be shipped from the center to the point of relocation at government expense, and without limitation as to weight. There was formerly

ly a weight limitation of 500 pounds per family on such shipments.

Two other provisions for assisting family relocation were also announced by the War Relocation Authority in Washington according to instructions received at the center this week.

April "Fortune" In Butte Library

The April "Fortune" magazine which devotes its entire contents to Japan including an article on evacuation and its effects has just arrived at the Butte community library, announced Nancy Ikeda, head librarian.

The magazine is for use as reference only, and cannot be taken out of the library. It will not be found on the magazine shelf but may be checked out at the librarian's desk.

RESIDENTS WANT HUMANE SOCIETY

Dogs, whether they know it or not, have been receiving plenty of attention lately concerning inoculation, licensing, and extermination -- all very uncomfortable to Fido. But this time Fido can rest assured that he has some friends in camp.

Several Butte residents this week have indicated a desire to start a humane society in Rivors to protect dogs from unnecessary abuse and to take care of homeless animals. They are contacting dog owners in Butte with the intention of organizing a society to prevent cruelty to animals.

Butte CAS Has Shakuhachi Flute

The Butte CAS this week received three shakuhachi, one flute and one harmonica which it will lend out to the residents.

The instruments were gifts from the International Red Cross and were brought over to the US from Japan on the Gripsholm.

The first provides that tools and equipment or fixtures of evacuee trade, business, or profession including farm machinery sufficient only for family size ventures and not to exceed 5,000 lbs. may be shipped at WRA expense to the relocation destination, and the second allows for the purchase of Pullman accommodations for those members of a relocating family who are sick or infirm.

Families who wish to relocate and take their equipment may now make written application. Shipping charges will be paid on such equipment up to a weight of 5,000 pounds, providing that it cannot be purchased in the community of relocation because of wartime shortages or restrictions on production.

Such shipments of equipment may be authorized to assist in the relocation of families or individuals, but not for larger groups, and must be approved by the Project Director and the Relocation Officer for the area in which the evacuee plans to relocate.

The new regulations also provide that where a member of a family group is sick, infirm or otherwise unable to withstand a long trip to the community where the family expects to relocate, arrangements may be made at the center to purchase Pullman accommodations for such persons at government expense. Applications for such travel accommodations should be made to the Project Chief Medical Officer.

Complete information on these new provisions may be obtained at the Relocation Office.

'A' HORSEHIDE OPENER AGAIN SET 22TH WITH THREE ROUNDS

The opening date for the coming class "A" baseball league, to be a Butte-only affair, has been moved forward again from Saturday, April 29, to Saturday, April 22, announced Ken Zenimura, director.

Cards of Canal will play a regular schedule with the Butte league teams but its game will be only exhibition, said Zenimura.

The schedule drawn up should include Cards but all games played by that Canal nine would be unofficial.

CAGER RETURNS HOME HERO

Pint-sized Wot Misaka, a member of the University of Utah cage squad which captured the NCAA Championships in New York and defeated St. John's, winners of the national invitational tournament in the same city recently, returned to Ogden, Utah, a home-town basketball hero last Tuesday.

Writing in the Ogden Standard-Examiner, Sports Editor Al Warden described Misaka as a long-time resident of Ogden, and as attending Weber College there before receiving an "A"-student scholarship to the U. of Utah.

Misaka, an excellent retriever, despite his size, was the outstanding defensive player in the two series after replacing Fred Sheffield, the team's top scorer who was injured, wrote Sports Editor Joe Aston in the St. Louis Post-Dispatch during the first parts of the NCAA tourney played in Missouri.

In that part of the series' final game, "Misaka received one of the greatest ovations recorded here when he went out on personals in the closing minutes," Aston wrote.

Cubs of Butte were placed in the "B's", leaving four teams for "A" ball. They are Block 28, 65 Peppers, a Lompoc-Guadalupe nine, and White Sox.

Two Canal "B" nines were included in the "B" circuit to be formed as a result of a managers' meeting Monday night.

They are Canal High Golden Bears, coached by Mison Davis, of the faculty, and Old Timers, led by Manager Akira Marutani.

Besides Block 64, which also entered recently, the clubs making ten in all are: Block 55, 32 Azucars, 58 Skippers, 65 "B's", Block 30, Cubs, and 72 Oki Dokios.

The "A" league will have three rounds of play in a straightaway flag race, instead of the previously-planned one round, said Zenimura.
