After May 1, 1944, 900cuce rusidorto, as private employees, shall not perform domestic or other porsonal sorvices for membors of the appointed staff, or for other eva-cuces, except under the following plan:

THROUGH CO-OP

The Business Enterprises at each center may employ evacures and assign thom to perform demostic or other duties for the appointed personnel evacues residents. The Business Enterprises may employ the evacuess, may negotiate service contracts with the appointed personnel or evacuae residents who wish to obtain the services of evacuees, and collect all fees for such services. The Bus, ness Enterprises will pay the workers the standard WRA wage, togother, with allowances. The Business Enterprises will retain as a part of their regular income all sums received from the appointed personnel or ovecuee resident. for such services in excoss of the cash wages and allowances paid to workers. PENALTY .

An'y appointed staff member or evacuce resident who shall employ an eve-cuse to perform demostic cr ther services, that fav avacuoe who shall perform demestic or other services for any amointed personnel cr evacuee except in secordance with the provisions of this paragraph, shall be subject to disciplinary action.

tion supervisor.

Hundreds of evacuees who have arrived in the East during the past year seem to be making a good adjustment to their new surroundings.
