## Private Work Ban Effective

Restrictions on all private enterprises within relocation centers went into effect yesterday, stated Project Director Leroy H. Bennett. All appointed personnel have been notified and bulletins have been posted in mess halls to that effect.

The Congress of Delegates of the Gila Co-op last week concurred with an earlier decision of the Board of Directors that the Co-op would not be able to handle private employment.

## RED CROSS MESSAGE TO JAPAN LIMITED

"Red Cross messages to Japan will be limited to ten per month in each block," stated Ernest Iwasaki, executive secretary of the Butte Red Cross. Emergency cases will be overlooked. Block managers will take the messages.

This limitation was necessitated because in several instances, persons in this country have abused the privilege by sending messages to various relatives in Japan, all living in the same or nearby community.

## LEAVE AND EMPLOYMENT REGULATIONS DISCLOSED

Hours of work and compensatory leave which became effective yesterday under the new leave and employment ruling is as follows:

1. The official work week for evacuee workers is 44 hours, based on five 8-hour days and one 4-hour day per week. Except in cases of emergencies or unusual circumstances, regular hours of duty will be followed, and supervisors and employees will plan their work on that

When workers are required to be on duty outside of the regularly prescribed hours, arrangements shall be made for staggering work hours among the personnel.

2. When it is absolutely necessary that workers be on duty in excess of the regularly prescribed hours, this work will be compensated for through the medium of Compensatory Leave.

The Interior Secretary said the men have expressed a belief that law-abiding Japanese in this country are not entitled to the same privileges as non-Japanese, and said those opinions "seem ominously out of tune in a nation that is fighting for the principles of democracy and freedom."

"The mayor of New York City, who has fought long and vigorously for racial equality and justice carrying the flag, must be shocked and disturbed to find the drummer boy from New Jersey on his left and the fifer from Ohio flanking him on the right. I cannot but believe that he has joined this company through accident and misunderstanding rather than by deliberate choice."

Upholding WRA policies, Ickes accused Bricker "not only of prejudice but of disregard of the facts" in a Los Angeles speech the Ohio governor made last week.

Ickes said he saw no basis for LaGuardia's protest against relocation of persons of Japanese ancestry, and rapped the New Jersey governor for letting farmers drive out five law-abiding Japanese from a New Jersey farm.

**YOUTH AND TOMORROW**

Of all the days of the year, the day when youth takes over the government of each community is probably the most important. As potential lawmakers and citizens, they are given the opportunity to shoulder the responsibilities carried now by their elders. By actually experiencing the many difficulties confronting them, they will better learn to make their decisions for the future.

Now, seriously we perform our duties today will point the way to the future and to our success in the business and social world. For, from this day we are given a glimpse of what lies in the near future when we must take over these duties permanently rather than for just one day of each year. 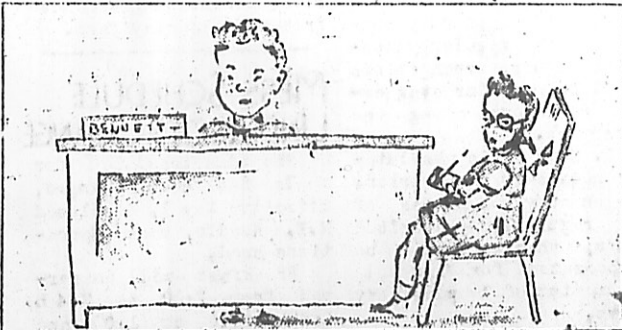
The Reverend Stewart has come into the center often to promote religious work in both camps.

**Fair Play for Nisei**

The California Committee on American Principles and Fair Play has published a pamphlet on "American Fighting Men Speak Out," in which are printed letters written by servicemen.

The following is one written by a former Fresno State College man concerning treatment of Japanese Americans.

"We believe that our Japanese-American comrades-in-arms are getting the dirtiest deal ever perpetrated on an American soldier. That other group of real patriots has fought so loyally and gallantly for our country and its ideals, while at home they are being knifed in the back? Then have any so cheerfully gone to battle and made even the supreme sacrifice and received so little gratitude at the hands of their fellow citizens?"

**AMERICA ON TRIAL**

"Americans stand on trial before the world. We must prove to the world that we do believe in the ideals we preach. Every time there is a race riot, fuel is added to the enemy propaganda machine. The State of California and the city of Fresno owes a debt to our Japanese-American citizens in the service who are paying the price of our common freedom with their lives.... Fresno owes these soldiers a monument and not a stab in the back!"

"I hope you will forgive me for 'blowing my top,' but I, too, look forward to coming back, and when I do, I shall look forward to meeting my Japanese-American friends on the streets of Fresno as they go about their tasks as honored and respected citizens. I don't want to see their homes broken up and destroyed any more than I would want to have it happen to my own. I want these boys to know that we other servicemen will back them up in seeing that justice is done."

Canal Hospital-medical clinic-Mon., Wed., Fri., Sat., from 9-10:30 a.m.; surgical, pre-natal, post-partum clinics - Tues., 9-10:30 a.m.; well-baby clinic-Mon., from 1-3:00 p.m.; immunization clinic-Fri., 1-3:00 p.m.

The Butte Hospital will be open on Saturday afternoons and all day Sunday for emergencies only.

**OPA Release Affects Shoes**

After Tuesday, May 2, children's shoes \$1.60 or less may be purchased without ration tickets, because of an OPA release on such shoes, stated Ken Kitasako, assistant general manager of the co-op. The release affects shoes of children under 12 years of age.

## "DEMOCRAT" PRINTS RIVERS STORY

Mrs. Don C. McCord, visitor to Rivers last month, has devoted an entire column in the St. Louis Globe Democrat to the story of the founding of Rivers, its people, and its activities.

Mrs. McCord, who writes under the pen-name of Eleanor Maxwell, expressed in her article that she believes most of the residents in the center are loyal Americans and they would not think of doing anything that would jeopardize their future in post-war America as citizens of the United States.

## HOSTEL FOR RESETTLERS OPEN IN PHILADELPHIA

A hostel for newly arrived resettlers which will comfortably accommodate twenty-five persons has been opened at Philadelphia under the sponsorship of a committee of private citizens in a four-story residence conveniently located at 3228 Chestnut Street.

For room and meals temporary adults residents will be charged \$1.00 a

day and children, \$.50 a day for a maximum of ten days.

Individuals wishing to remain at the hostel after securing work will be charged \$12 weekly.

Resettlers desiring to stay at the hostel on their arrival in Philadelphia should make reservations by writing, preferably two weeks in advance to Henry C. Patterson, Relocation Officer, 1175 Stephen Girard Building, 21 South 12 Street, Philadelphia 7, Pa.

**NEW REGULATIONS BECOME EFFECTIVE**

3. The project director shall have the authority to require a longer work week, or work at other hours, or both, when the nature of the work in his judgement so requires.

6. Unused balances of compensatory leave may not be transferred between divisions.

7. Workers unable to liquidate compensatory leave (earned after January 1, 1944) prior to leaving the center on indefinite leave, seasonal leave or leave to enter the armed forces shall be paid for it by extending the date of separation to

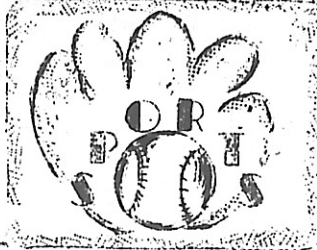
