More evacuees are resettling east of Chicago.

Boston has an over supply of white collar workers. Efforts are being made to open a hostel there.

WRA offices in Peoria and Rockford, Illinois, are closing, with local community committees handling the relocation program.

NEW OFFICES

A new WRA office has been opened in Rochester, New York. Newark, New Jersey will open an office soon.

In the first two weeks of April, the Chicago office held 722 interviews. It is still the busiest spot in the country.

Issei seem to be doing almost as well as the nisei.

As a whole, most evacuees believe that they are doing a good job of integration, concluded Huso.

Former Student Writes Back

Jack Kasai, Butte High School graduate of 1943 who is attending Kenyon College in Ohio, wrote to Miss Mabel Sheldon last week that he and some of his former classmates are doing well. He also writes that it is possible for nisei to join the Air Corp now, although he was disqualified because of faulty vision.

Kasai writes as follows:

"I would like to thank you for the letter of recommendation, but I hate to say that I did not pass the physical requirement to enter the Air Corp. However, I did pass the mental examination with a very good grade. For those other nisei who are interested and wanting to join a wonderful corp, it is possible now to do so. One requirement is that the applicant should have perfect vision. I was disqualified because of faulty vision. The possibility to enter is very good, and I hope more fellows will take this opportunity to join a splendid corp."

About four weeks ago, the Phi Kappa Sigma fraternity extended a bid to me to enter their fraternity, and now that I have accepted and the council has given its consent, I'm one of the fraternity brothers. It's wonderful to be living together with the other fellows and being able to get along so nicely with them. Now I have found out and learned that there can be people who are brothers even if one has a face different from the fellow next to you.

"I'm glad to hear that so many graduates of the class of '43 are now attending colleges. George Toyoda is getting along nicely at the University of Texas. Mary Nakahiro is doing all right and is having a grand time between studios. Kim is working during the day and is attending evening school and expects to matriculate for the University of Minnesota. It seems that everyone is getting along well."

DETAINED CITIZENS

While certain private and public individuals are ranting about excluding Japanese Americans from their states, and advocating that each community should decide what citizens may be allowed to reside near them, the courts of the nation go on with the regular process of trying to administer justice.

The Ninth Federal Circuit Court of Appeals has asked the United States Supreme Court for instructions on how to decide four questions raised in the Mitsuye Endo test case, which challenges the right of the Federal government to hold loyal nisei in relocation centers.

The Supreme Court is asked whether the WRA has the power to hold an American citizen without due process to law because she is of Japanese ancestry; whether the WRA has the right to confine a citizen after it has determined she is loyal to the U.S., until she can prove her ability to support herself; whether the WRA can hold a citizen without a hearing; and whether a citizen can be compelled to report to the WRA after having left one of the centers.

These questions may well decide for all evacuee citizens whether they should continue to be detained in centers. It may, on the other hand, be decided on a technicality peculiar to the Endo case, and leave unanswered the nisei position as a whole. At any rate, the fact that courts in California are taking up the evacuee cases to the Supreme Court indicates that the judicial system provided for in the Constitution is functioning despite the fact that other parts of the Constitution are often being "kicked in the teeth" as Secretary Ickes put it.

We should like to see the time when the courts of the nation decide that no citizen can be confined in camps unless he has been charged and found guilty in a regular court before a judge and jury. That, we feel, is the only way of treating any citizen, especially those who have had their rights kicked around already. That is the only decision that can be reached by a nation which says that none of its citizens can be deprived of life, liberty, or property without due process of law.

Dry Cleaning Available Soon

Dry cleaning service will be available to ten-
ter residents within two weeks when the Gila Co-op completes arrangement's with a Phoenix outfit to take in suits and dresses for cleaning and pressing, the Co-op announced yes-
terday.

One place in Canal and one in Butte will be designated as places where residents will be able to bring in their clothes. The Co-op will then ship them into Phoenix.

The clothes will be serviced in about a week after being sent in, stated Ken Mitasako, assistant manager.

The Co-op has made this arrangement with the Phoenix firm to handle residents' needs, while the Co-op's own dry cleaning shop is being held up because of a W.P.B. denial of clearance on machinery.

If the clearance on machinery is granted by the W.P.B., and operators can be found, dry cleaning will be possible within the center.

NEW LEAVE PROCEDURES

This is the fourth in a series of articles on the new leave and employment procedures inaugurated at the beginning of the month.

Leave Without Pay:

1. Workers who need time off for important personal matters, and who have no accrued Vacation Leave, may be granted up to and including six working days, without pay, on prior approval of the Section Head (Form WRA-335).

2. Leave Without Pay, from 6 to 12 working days, must be approved by the Assistant Personnel Officer. In case worker's presence outside of the Center is required, such Leave Without Pay may be approved at the discretion of the Project Director.

Application For Leave:

1. All Supervisors and Unit Heads are charged with the responsibility of informing centers of their Work and Leave rights and responsibilities.

UNION

URGES NON-DISCRIMINATION TOWARD NISEI WORKERS

Union officers permitting or encouraging discrimination in their plants against Americans of Japanese descent placed in the plants by the WRA, have been warned to cease such discriminatory practices by R.J. Thomas, International President of the United Automobile Aircraft Agricultural Implement Workers of America.

States Thomas, "Such discrimination is a violation of the UAW-CIO constitutional provision prohibiting discrimination and of the President's Executive Order on Fair Employment Practices.

Japanese Americans who have been placed in plants by WRA have been cleared by the FBI and are working in those jobs by government order.

Continued Thomas, "It is not the policy in our union in any of its divisions to deny such opportunities. Neither is it our function to take over the work of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, which is

far better equipped to discover and apprehend persons disloyal to the government and working against the war effort.

"It is the responsibility of every union officer, local or international, to uphold his oath of office by seeing to it that the constitutional clause prohibiting discrimination because of race, creed, or color is enforced.

Resettlement Areas Relaxed

Current restrictions on restricted areas in the Western Plains area have been relaxed to assist evacuees about to enter military service who are anxious to relocate their families, announced James H. Curtis, relocation officer in Denver.

SOLDIERS REQUEST

The request of any evacuee to relocate in the restricted area will be considered if he has passed his pre-induction physical and if he or his wife has immediate relatives within the district with whom the wife intends to reside after her husband's entrance into military service.

APPROVAL FIRST

Prior approval will be required from the appropriate relocation office for each individual case. Families relocating on this basis are not expected to return to the center when the husband enters military service.

CENTER PRACTICE COMES IN HANDY

Experience in project hospitals shows up well in relocation, said William Ruso, relocation chief. Many girls with only project hospital experience are making good in outside hospitals.

The Starns Hospital in Cleveland has 12 nisei nurses aides working 48 hours a week at \$3.50 per day. Hospital officials say that girls from the centers are the best girls they ever had.

FOREIGN OWNED PROPERTY SHOULD BE REPORTED

A.F. Chamberlin, Evacuee Property Officer, states that a report on Federal Reserve Bank Form TFR 500 relating to property in foreign countries should with certain exceptions be filed by every person subject to the jurisdiction of the United States, who had on May 31, 1943, any interest what-

soever direct or indirect in any foreign property in a foreign country including bonds issued by such country or corporation or person there-in.

Each person whose property in all foreign countries, the highest face or market aggregate value of which is less than \$10,000, is exempt from reporting any such property except foreign bonds which are payable by their terms in United States dollars. Such bonds should be reported regardless of the amount or value thereof.

Additional reports on Form TFR 500 are not required at present relating to property which has previously been reported on said Form; however, this statement is made so that owners of foreign dollar bonds shall not be unaware of reporting requirements and shall not fail to understand that exemptions in reporting do not apply to such bonds.

There is no disposition on the part of the Treasury Department to seek application of penalties against any person who submits his report promptly upon becoming aware of the requirements.

The filing of a report on Treasury Form TFR 300 relating to foreign owned property in the United States does exempt the owner thereof from submitting a report on Treasury Form TFR 500 as above mentioned.

Additional information and forms may be secured at the Evacuee Property Office.

The resolution reads:

"Be it resolved that we, as Ministers of Des Moines Churches, go on record as favoring full participation of the nisei in the activities of our churches. And that we pledge ourselves to give them Christlike consideration at all times and under all conditions. We further affirm that we shall at all times do whatever we can through Christian goodwill to let these people know that we feel that they are our brothers in Christ."


