

### Victim Tells Of ( Ousting

Eddie Taniguchi, one of five victims of the reat Meadows, New Jersey, iscident, wrote the following letter, giving his personal views on the now famous "ousting":

"I bolieve you already know what happened to us at Great Meadows, New Jorsoy. Well, we were kicked out from there but we are not sorry at all. A few more incidents like that not oven lick would yot. I have a hundrad percent faith in Uncle Sam. We are cracking nut at the second place now, but for Goorge, it's his third time. This time it looks like O.K. I could-n't write until now because I did not know whether I was coming or going and had no definite address of mine. Well, Great Mondows was a great place. The soil is a muck land and very fortile. But the people down there stick to their grandpapa method of farming. They raiso colory, lettuce, and spinach. They do not have any ditch for irrigation but drainage. Itd.\_sure to have a chance to farm in the muck land.

"Now we are in Pennsylvania side, about midway botwoon Yardley and Newtown, and only eight miles to Trenton. The soil here is not good as Great Mcadows but tho community around here is O.K. I hope. This time we are plain farm laborers, anyway at least for this season. This farm has aspacarrot, tomatous, ragus, apples, and peaches. We are going to plant toma-toes from Mry lat.

Requests for permits for Japanese wives and men br children of American soldiers of Japanese ancestry, t'o travel to points within the evacuated areas will be considered in-dividually by the Western Defense Command head-guarters, announced R.B. Cozzens, WRA field assistant director in San Franci.sco.

The WDC headquarters will normally issue on will normally issue on application, permits to Japanese wives of American soldiers of Japanese and cestry and to their minor children for round tri travel from a point out side the ovacuated arons to a project within the evecuated areas and allow the soldier-husband to act as oscort, when the soldier - husband is on-leave or furlough.
