

SPANISH CONSUL HERE ON ROUTINE VISIT TO CENTERS

ONLY JAPANESE NATIONALS AFFECTED

In answer to many inquiries on the matter, Acting Project Director R. B. Cozzens explained yesterday the visit made by the Spanish Consul on Dec. 10 and 11 to the Gila River Relocation Center.

"Consul F. de Amat of San Francisco, representing the Spanish Ambassador in charge of Japanese interests in the United States, visited the project at the invitation of the American government. He was accompanied by Mr. Bernard Guller of the State Department.

WELFARE PROTECTED

"Representatives of the protecting power for Japanese interests in the United States visit relocation centers from time to time in order that they may reassure their government and the Japanese government with regard to the welfare of the Japanese subjects under their protection," Cozzens said. It is customary in times of war, it was revealed, for belligerent powers to represent their interests in the countries with which they are at war, just as Switzerland represents the interests of the United States and protects the American citizen in Japan.

CONSULTATIONS

Consul de Amat's visit here was part of a protecting power's regular routine function and is ordinarily made from time to time in accordance with the convenience of the representatives of said power, it was further disclosed.

NAPPA SPRAYED

People who have been taking nappa from field 68 are warned by Min Omata, unit foreman, that the nappa have been sprayed with a deadly poison, calcium arsenate, to rid the patch of an infestation of greenworms.

"In the course of these visits, the Spanish representative consults with Japanese subjects on problems the latter would normally take up with representatives of their own country. The Spanish representative naturally has no concern of American citizen residents in the relocation centers."

Installation of Stoves Made for Women, Children

To relieve somewhat the acute heating problems until the oil heaters arrive, 2 wood stoves are being installed in recreation halls for use by block residents.

"Where such will not be available, one stove each will be put in laundry rooms and block managers' offices in every block for use by women and children, who suffer most from the effects of cold," stated Fixman Brown, senior engineer.

Gasoline Ration Affects Colony

As the gasoline ration program tightened in operation in the nation, Rivers is doing its part in the tire-saving, gas-saving program.

Frank Norris, Supervisor of Maintenance Division, states that, "despite curtailment in gasoline consumption, over what it has been, we will have sufficient gasoline to carry on essential transportation."

Approximately 600 gallons a day were used, but this has been reduced to about 450 gallons from Dec. 1, Norris disclosed.

MILITARY PLANS CALL FOR FENCE ENCLOSURE—COZZENS

"The original plans of the Military, when relocation centers were constructed, were to provide a fence around each center. Contracts for these fences, we are advised, have been let for both Canal and Butte Communities. The rules, as set forth by Lt. Gen. DeWitt, are that evacuees may be free to move any place within the area from sunrise to sunset, but must stay within either Canal or Butte Communities from sunset to sunrise, except when given a permit by the Project Director which will allow movement outside of the respective communities. These fences are, therefore, being constructed for the purpose of delineating or outlining the area of the center. We want each evacuee to realize that the fence is not for the purpose of holding the people within the community, but purely for the purpose of establishing the boundary of the center so that each person will know the exact limits within which he is to remain from sunset to sunrise."

'REST HOMES' FOR AGED, LATEST COUNCIL AMBULATORY PERSONS VACANCIES FILLED

"Rest homes" will be established in blocks 73 and 74 by the Housing Department for the relief of aged people and ambulatory persons requiring medical

attention, who now must walk from the far sections of the center. The Administration has given its approval to the plan.

Requests to change apartments will be made to a few residents in the uncrowded sections of blocks 73 and 74, in order that the least number of people will be inconvenienced.

As this program is done in the interest and the welfare of the people of the center, it is requested that those affected by the movements facilitate matters by cooperating fully with the Housing Department.

Five new Block Representatives for the Butte Community Council were elected at an election held early this week. Three of the vacancies were created through enlistment in the U.S. Army Intelligence School.

The newly-elected block representatives are Eddie T. Ikemoto, 51; Mas Yaki, 52; Ray Kawagoye, 55; Henry Kondo, 63; and Henry Terazawa, 65. This fills all council seats, with the exception of that from block 56 where Robert Ueyamura has resigned.

The seeds obtained from this patch will be the only available seeds for any further planting of this product. If the people here desire any nappa or any other crops that are now left for seed purposes on any of the farms, they should refrain from taking vegetables without the permission of some responsible person of the field.
