Men For Jerome Trip Chosen

Teizo Yahanda, Canal's Central Block Manager, and George Nishimura, Butte's Council Chairman, have been chosen to accompany Dr. Gordon Brown to the Jerome Center to help arrange for the transfer.

The three are scheduled to leave Gila Monday morning, May 22.

Among the things they hope to accomplish during the trip is the election of about 10 Jerome residents who will serve on the Rivers Community Councils after arrival.

TEST CASES TO BE HEARD

Arguments in the Mitsuye Endo test case, which questions the legality of continued detention of evacuee citizens, is scheduled to be heard by the United States Supreme Court when the next court term begins in October.

The Ninth circuit court last month requested the highest tribunal for instructions for the proper decision in her case.

In agreeing to this request, the Supreme Court announced it would hear argument in the case immediately after it hears attorneys on an appeal by Fred Toyosaburo Korematsu, who questioned the constitutionality of evacuation orders under which he was taken from San Leandro, California to the Topaz Relocation Center.

NOTIFIED MEN SEE FREELAND

All men who received telegrams from the Army stating that their orders for active duty are being mailed are requested to report immediately to Henry C. Freeland, leave officer, in Butte.

They must all be processed for indefinite leaves before they leave the project.

100TH INFANTRY BATTALION OF HEROES

Heroism is a common commodity in the 100th Infantry all-nisei outfit known as the "puka puka" battalion, according to an A.P. report of May 5.

Since the Japanese Americans from Hawaii started fighting with the Fifth Army in Italy last September, the following record is figuratively written in blood according to the report: Three Distinguished Service Crosses, 21 Bronze Stars, 36 Silver

DEPORTATION ANTI-JAPANESE BILL PROPOSED

A postwar deportation of all Japanese who were aliens in this country on Dec. 7, 1941, was proposed in Congress Tuesday by Rep. James W. Mott (R. Oregon), who simultaneously promised to introduce legislation calling for the ouster of nisei whose loyalty to the United States has been questioned, the L.A. Times reported Wednesday.

Immediately after hostilities end, residents of this country who were subjects of the Japanese Emperor at the time of the Pearl Harbor attack would be shipped back to their homeland, under Mott's bill. The measure orders the Justice Department to prepare deportation warrants and serve them as quickly as possible after the war ends.

Another bill will be necessary to take care of kibei and other nisei who may have been found disloyal, Mott pointed out.

The subsequent legislative proposal he said, will be "carefully drawn" to protect the civil rights of all American born Japs but will direct Federal authorities to return all undependable nisei to Nippon.

Stars, and 900 Purple Hearts.

It is pointed out that the 900 wounded is indicative, in an outfit sent four times across the Volturno River and once into Cassino.

MAY SALE

A May clearance sale with substantial reduction in prices will commence from May 15 for the rest of the month at dry goods stores in both camps.

LAST OF SERIES ON WORK RULES

This is the concluding installment of the series of articles on the leave and employment procedures inaugurated recently for evacuee workers.

Extended Illness Compensation:

1. A regularly employed full-time worker who has taken all the Sick Leave to which he is entitled, may elect to charge subsequent absences due to illness to Vacation Leave, or Leave Without Pay.

2. Provided he presents a certificate from a Doctor (Form S-1295) indicating that he is still ill after using accumulated leave, he may make application for Illness Compensation. If approved, this compensation will enable him to receive 60% of his regular salary.

3. The Timekeeper will give the worker 2 copies of Form S-1295, along with the Termination Notice, and advise him that if he wishes to make application for Extended Illness Compensation, he should take the completed forms to the Personnel Management Section for preparation of Form WRA-92. The original of forms WRA-92 and S-1295 (and 30 day renewals thereafter) shall be forwarded to the Finance Section for preparation of the Voucher.

4. In case the illness continues, compensation will be paid for a maximum of 90 days provided the patient immediately submits a Certificate every 30 days to the Personnel Management Section.

5. The original application for Illness Compensation shall serve as the basis for payment until the Personnel Management Section directs the termination of payments because the employee has: (1) reported that he is physically able to work, or (2) failed to re-establish his eligibility each 30-day period, or (3) has received compensation for 90 days. Attention is directed to the fact that the patient must submit a Medical Certificate every 30 days stating that he is unable to work.

MOTHER—A HEROINE

Tomorrow, Rivers joins the rest of the nation in observing Mother's Day, the one day in the year during which all people outwardly express what they inwardly feel every day of the year. The world may be unkind, cruel, and unfair to some, but every individual is blessed with the one gift that comes equally to all—a mother's love.

The issei mother's lot has been a long and hard one, especially with evacuation, and the subsequent relocation and the army draft which are tearing families apart to all parts of the world. Mothers in the centers, who are supposedly resting from a hard struggle to bring up families, often in unfriendly environments, are right now passing through mental and spiritual ordeals that surpass the physical trials that have left their hairs gray and their fingers knotted.

NISEI COME TO THE FORE

Each young relocater and each inductee is followed by anxious thoughts of a mother who will be left behind in a desolate center, resting her only hopes in the future of her children. As the issei grow older, responsibilities of the nisei toward them grow larger. Those of the second generation are gradually assuming their positions as breadwinners of their families. The younger generation once looked to the issei for support and guidance, but now the parents are looking to their offsprings for comfort. The nisei must be prepared to give that comfort to an older generation which has dedicated the best years of their lives for the advancement of the young, and have had no time for their own comforts or their own education.

The responsibility may take the form of relocating and calling parents out later. It may consist of remaining close to the old during their few remaining years. It may mean maintaining self respect in centers and after relocation, and of writing letters to console those who are still in confinement. It may mean a dozen different things. Whatever it is, each nisei should have clearly in mind his responsibility to his mother and dad, and work accordingly. The old have sacrificed, often more than their share; the young are now strong enough to give their share.

Inside the center or out, we want our mothers to know that we appreciate their love and will reciprocate with our devotion.

A TRIBUTE TO A MOTHER

A few weeks ago a young relocated woman wrote back to Gila in much the same manner as other nisei might do. It is a simple and genuine tribute to a typical issei mother. We quote: "Mother is really a heroine. She brought up her children, hoping to have them develop the way she visualized...college for her son and maybe marriage for her daughter...all these plans were shattered by the blow of evacuation...yep, hardships and sacrifices were mixed up in those first few months behind the barbed wire...then what, she finds that her boys are going around with undesirable gangs... a social disgrace to her, but still blood is thicker than water...she is always loving to them...plans are materializing for relocation...sad adieux...her son volunteers, then she finds that her other sons are finally being accepted like other American boys into Uncle Sam's forces...she'll soon hang more stars in her window..." She, too, is a soldier on the home front.

SANTA MARIA CHURCH GROUP REMEMBERS NISEI

The First Methodist Church in Santa Maria, California, devoted its entire April 30th four page "Bulletin" to the Japanese problem in the U.S.

Treating favorably on the subject, the "Bulletin" wrote excerpts from Secretary Ickes' speech and Fortune Magazine's article on the evacuees. The 100th Battalion's great work in the Italy campaign received considerable attention.

The "Bulletin" emphasized: "Keep the issue clear! People born in America, loyal to America, are Americans, entitled to every right under our constitution, irrespective of ancestry!"

Evacuees Face Treason Charge

Three Japanese American sisters, accused of aiding in the escape of two German prisoners of war, were indicted for treason Tuesday, according to A.P. The charges arose from an investigation of snapshots showing the women and the escaped fugitives in amorous embrace.

The former Ingwood residents named by the federal grand jury are Tsuruko Wallace, 35, Florence Shizue Otani, 33, and Billie Shitara Tanigoshi. All three are married.

Accused of providing an automobile, clothing, roadmaps and money for the German prisoners who escaped the Trinidad prisoner of war camp last October 17 and recaptured in New Mexico, the women were working on the farm where the prisoners were also employed.

The indictment, containing two counts, charges treason and conspiracy to commit treason. The first count carries a maximum penalty of death and a minimum of five years imprisonment or a fine of \$10,000 and two years imprisonment.

The pictures were discovered on one of the prisoners when captured.

Haruo Hayashi and his band from Butte will furnish the music for the evening. There will be songs by guest artist Mary Oino. Refreshments will be served by the Navy and White, USO girls.

BUTTE BUDDHISTS INVITE MOTHERS

Young Buddhists of Butte will honor their mothers tomorrow night with a Mother's Day Service and program from 8 p.m. at Temple 42. Members are asked to bring 15¢.

The Rev. K. Imamura will be the main speaker, with William Nakatani as chairman. There will be entertainment and refreshments after the service.

BOOKS ADDED TO TOY GAME

Many books for the younger children have been added to the library in the Butte Toy and Game Loan department this week.

Among them are "What About Willie," "The story of Casey Jr.," "The story of Timothy's House," and "I see a Kitty."

"The Saint Goes West," a book for the older members of the family has also been added to the shelves.

Conserve Water

Residents are asked to conserve water used on coolers, stated Joe H. Janeway, operations head. The project is allowed only a definite supply. Careless use will result in water shortage, he added.

Tokuyama Joins Red Cross

Jitsutaro Tokuyama has been chosen home service chairman of the Butte Red Cross with headquarters at the 69-10 social welfare office, stated Ernest Iwasaki, executive secretary. Tokuyama will be in charge of the Butte Red Cross program.

Said Iwasaki, "Messages to Japan will continue to be handled through block managers with a limit of 10 messages per block each month." This is necessary because forms which are sent from San Francisco are limited in number, and all messages are required to be written on these forms.

Messages should not be sent directly to S.F. because they will always return here for proper forms.

WRA Bans Use Of Gov't Crates

All evacuees requesting shipment of personal property either to relocation destination or other projects must certify in writing as to ownership of vegetable crates or packing boxes used in such shipments, stated A. F. Chamberlin, evacuee property officer. No lumber as such will be shipped at government expense.

It will be the last appearance for some horse-hiders in that center before their departure to Tule Lake, according to the Outpost.

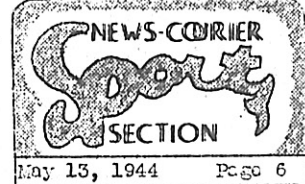

この度組育の爲の準備所から回送して来た同地方の職業案内に依ると、組育州に於てはローチエスター市の近郊が農業地として最も有望で日本人に対する歩合耕作、或は土地のリース等も可能である。それに伴ふ農園働き要求も豊富にあり、大体に於ける給料の標準は食室附で月六十弗から百弗である。希望に休つては自炊も又可能である。程度の材料を支給される。住居は農家によつては六室程度の家を備へて居り、家具無しで週三弗見当のレントである。或る農家は自住宅の一室を働人の爲めに用意して居る。

此の亞州排日法業は單にわが身から新たに転住した五十七名と同的としたものではなく、既に亞州内に居住してゐた日本人六百三十二名も抑圧せんとするものであつた。彼等は多く競争の激しい野菜業を経営し畑や立派に暮してゐる。僅かに一万七千人の年滿未だ若く家庭的にも束縛の少ない、而かも割合に大膽な二世も出るには出たが、其の再定住といふ最大難關は未だ解決してゐない。採果の無い青年の數にも限りがある。以前には志願兵のみを隊せしめてゐた陸軍は今春からは二世も召集
