General Delos C. Emmons, commanding general of the Western Defense Command, said Monday that thirty-nino Japanese American women with their children, who were among the evacuated, have been allowed to return to their homes in the past six months, according to the UP.

Those returned consist mostly of mixed marriage cases and wives of soldiers. A very few Japanose American men who have been allowed to return inoludo" federal employees and 'hospital cases. In addi -· tion a few arc allowed in rarily to transact topertant business affairs when accompanied by trusted made to Federal District Caucasian osoorts.

Stated Emmons, "I persenally have examined each. individual .case. of Japanose Americans being allowed to return to the area and I don't take any chances in having persons of Jaranese descent who might jegardize safety in restricted arcos."

Excellent opportunities for family relocation are open to evacuees reset tling in the industrial editorial. city of Rochester, N. Y., surrounding agricultural area, where the principal crop is fruitstand vege tables, according to Harold S. Fistere, WRA relocation supervisor for the Middle Atlantic area.

Because these opportunities prevail, Fistere pointed out, a relocation office was opened in Rochester in April under the supervision of Claude C. Cornwall, former relocation program officer and chief of the employment and housing division at the Central Utah Reloca tion Center. Miss Miwako Yamamoto, formerly of Colorado River, was recently transfered from the Ne w York WRA office to be seccretary of the new relocation office in Rochester.

"Nearly a year ago a group of local citizens established the Rochester Committee , Resettlement which is now enlarging its service to reset thers,"
Fistere said. "Approximately thirty evacuee s have already resettled in Porhoster area, including to who are -working in mlothing - manufacturing plants, two as domestics, and on as an orchardist on a sorrey fara. There are also five students at the University of Rochestor and the East an School of usic and ton girls who are training to be nurses at several Rochester hospitals.

ter for the manufacture of Today, thirty-four young men are being drafted from other goods, and in the been able to take the trial been able to take the trials of the past two years, who haven't lost faith in their country while others have, and who today are still able to see in the Stars and Stripes a glimmer of hope for the future of Japanese Americans and their parents in the United States. We salute these first thrity-four and those who will follow. They will be helping insure a place in the, U.S. for all of us.

Today, nearly two and one half years since oriminatory wartime restrictions began invading the rights and responsibilities of Japanese Americans in this country this first step toward the return of those rights and responsibilities to a long denied

people is being made.

Once again as before December .7, 1941, young Americans of Japanese ancestry are being drafted into tho armed forces of the United States, and Rivers is sending its sharo -- 34. But unlike pro-Poarl Harbor days when nisei stepped out from California homes to insure the security they held, today they are being drafte d out of a camp into which they were one forced, to win back the homes and security denied them. They are assuming the heaviest responsibilities and are trust ing the decency and fair play of the majority of Americans to give them their rights after the war.

This first step toward the restoration of our full rights is a tough one. Some among those being drafted are United States soldiers who were discharged after Poarl Harobr for no other reason than the color o f their skin. It is not exactly a credit to America's democracy that a U.S. citizen was sworn into its Army, then discharged after Pearl Harbor, evicted from his home and community, confined for two years without charge, and is now being drafted so that he can risk his life for a country that mistrusted him and for a home that is denied him.

Those who have demanded full rights before being drafted have not succeeded. Petitions for non-segregation in combat units have had little results. nisei in a ve endured much, and quietly, because this is wartime, and individual liberties must often be sacrificed for the good of the nation. But after the war, if this country is still to be called a democracy, the rights of these nisei citizens must be recognized.

Broncos retained their hold on National League Bears are slated to take leadership with a close 8-7 triumph over Block 30 last Tuesday night.


Tied in the fifth, and winning in the final sixth, tho triumph maintained the once tied 72 nine's undefoatod status.
