Evacuee Shot At Tule Lake

A military police sentry at the Tule Lake segregation center yesterday shot and wounded Shiochi James Okamoto, 30 years old, American citizen of Japanese ancestry, the War Relocation Authority announced, according to A. P.

The sentry was on duty at the old main gate of the segregation center, the report stated.

Circumstances of the shooting and Okamoto's condition were not disclosed in the W.R.A. announcement, the A. P. report said.

SMILES, TEARS AT PARTING

Excitement was apparent in the crowd that gathered Tuesday. There was a finality to the goodbyes as they pulled out of the center at nine o'clock.

Wednesday morning at four, the segregationists left Phoenix in special coaches attached to a regular Southern Pacific train.

With them went Hoyt Martin, supervisor of industries, representing the WRA; Dr. Reeco Podicord, chief medical officer, as physician in charge; Roger Narimatsu as train monitor; and a military escort.

The trip is expected to take approximately fifty hours.

More Questions On The Draft

More questions and answers on the nisei and selective service, which arrived at the relocation office recently, are printed here.

Q. How can a nisei, whose birth was not recorded with any Bureau of Vital Statistics, prove his American citizenship?

A. Selective Service officials point out that there are many persons in the United States whose births were not recorded. Therefore, any evidence of place of birth, such as a statements from parents, family records, or other documents would be acceptable.

Q. Will nisei boys, now relocated, be considered for enrollment in the Army Specialized Training Program (ASTP)?

A. The War Department states that the ASTP program, which was greatly curtailed recently, is open only to high school graduates about to enter college and who applied before March 1, 1944.

Q. What is the general policy of Selective Service regarding deferments?

A. Selective Service officials have pointed out that each case must be decided on an individual basis. The present policy is one of granting practically no occupational deferments to men under 26; in case of men over 26, more consideration will be given to occupation, but still only a small percentage of such men will be granted deferments. It must be remembered that all deferment policies are subject to change as military and other factors are altered.

Q. What is the status of men inducted and placed in the Enlisted Reserve Corps? Do they have any further responsibilities to Selective Service? May they travel to other parts of the United States?

A. Men placed in the Enlisted Reserve Corps are under Army Jurisdiction and have no further responsibility to Selective (continued on page 5)

Editorial

'A POLITE EXCUSE'

"A polite excuse for a discriminatory policy" is the label placed by an editorial in the Heart Mountain (Wyoming) Sentinel, in answer to Lt. Col. Harrison A. Gerhardt's explanation of why the War Department does not plan to assign Japanese American soldiers to South Pacific Army units.

"The danger of infiltration of Japanese soldiers if the nisei are used in other units that are sent to the South Pacific area is cited by Colonel Gerhardt," says the Heart Mountain Sentinel.

"By the same reasoning, it would seem that Italian American soldiers would not be used in the Italian campaign-German American soldiers would not be used against the Germans-Caucasian American officers would not be used in the all-nisei units. The danger of infiltration will be present in any theatre of war.

"Colonel Gerhardt points to the special risk of Japanese American soldiers in the South Pacific area if they should be captured by the Japanese. He said they would be exposed to dangers beyond the normal hazards of war. The Japanese American soldier does not ask to be spared any hazards. War, in all its aspects, is brutal.

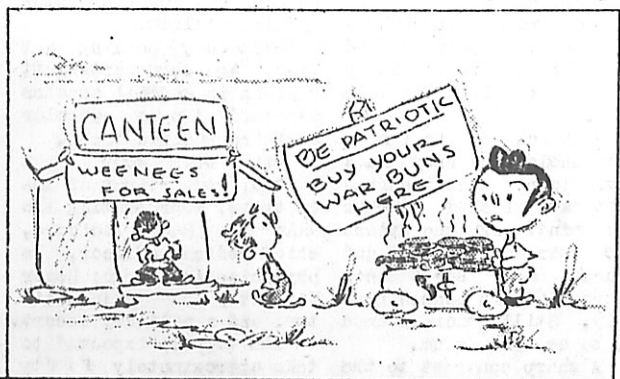
"The 'extra hazards' are a small price to pay for the opportunity to discredit the prejudicial statements of Commander Melvin H. McCoy's slur against Americans of Japanese ancestry. When he dishonors our heroes in the 100th Battalion who have given their lives for the United States with a statement, 'They are killing white men. They would just as soon be killing Germans as other white men, no hazards are so great that we want to be spared them.

"We will continue to be inducted and serve loyally in whatever assignment is given us for we are grateful for the opportunity to serve. However hard it is for us to accept assignment to segregated units, we look upon such limited service as better than no service at all.

"There is not doubt in our minds but what nisei soldiers can and will prove themselves on any front and in any battle theatre of the world. It is apparent the War Department still does not wholly understand the nisei we look to the time when race will not be a reason for segregation."

TRIAL SET FOR WYOMING NISEI

A joint trial without a jury for the 64 Heart Mountain Relocation Center youths, accused of violating the selective service act, has been set for June 12.

Federal District Judge T. Flake Kennedy has agreed to the date when the attorney for all the defendants requested a joint trial and waived a jury.

Eleven of the evacuees pleaded innocent before Judge Kennedy Monday, May 15.

Fifty-two others pleaded innocent a week ago. All were indicted on charges of selective service violation.

AUTO MECHANICS TEACHER ARRIVES

Ernest W. Kennedy, new auto mechanics teacher arrived on the project Tuesday, stated W. C. "Tom" Sawyer, supt. of education, Kennedy, the son of R.R. Kennedy, Butte shop foreman, is formerly of the Army Ordnance Depot in Phoenix.

He will supervise all auto mechanics work here, but no new classes will be open until school dismisses.

Nisei Sisters Plead Innocent

Three Japanese American sisters pleaded innocent to the charges of treason for allegedly aiding two German war prisoners before the Federal Grand Jury on May 19 according to the Pacific Citizen.

Residents of the Granada Center for nearly two years, the defendants Mrs. Tsuruko Wallace, 35, Mrs. Florence Otani-33, and Mrs. Billie Tanigoshi, 32 are being held in Denver county jail on lieu of a \$7500 bond each.

Kenneth Robinson attorney told the press he would attack the indictment on the grounds that the offense described in the indictment does not constitute treason, after granted three weeks to file a motion to quash the grand jury indictment against them.

William Tanigoshi, husband of one of the defendants, expressed his belief that the sisters did not realize what they were doing. He said that he is confident that they are not traitors and will "stick by them."

LIMITED INCOME

Principal Miller's statement is as follows:

"Since we are fully aware that the income of the people residing on this project is very limited, we have constantly endeavored to curtail expenditures of students wherever and whenever possible. The newly-organized Camp Shelby (Miss.) First Battalion 442nd Infantry's baseball team is as good as the team which won the post's championship last season.

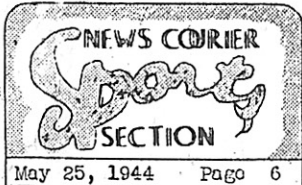
With the motto "Go For Broke" on their shoulders the soldier-players were scheduled to meet the yet-to-be-defeated Rohwer All-Star last week-end.
