Izzy Otani, former com-ity clerk in Butte in Butte, writes back from Poplar Grove, Illinois, enthusiastic over his new work.

"I was plenty green and soft seven weeks ago, but now with all the chore work, manure hauld n'g, field work from 5 to 7 daily. I'm in the pink of physical health -- also I've learned to milk and I'm the new milker on this farm--yop--25 cows twice daily.

"I m. boarding and rooming with the Moorheads now and will move into the house across the way when the family arrives. I t has electricity and plumbing so I consider mysel f pretty fortunate and lucky. Also I have a lawn in front of my now home and a gardin space that I have already planted and most of the seeds are up with the 'rain and the warm weather that follow precipitation.

"I've been accepted just too wonderfully here -- the Moorheads consider me as just one of the fami,ly -- I enjoy all the comforts of their home .. I have a nice room to myself and have access to a hot and cold shower 4-m y laundoring is taken care of too.

"I get three meals daily -- but best of all I'vo -learned to fit into this farm life and consoquently I can enjoy life in the open space with my family. I have been considered essential and will be deferred indefinitely as long as I'm on this dairy farme

"Our farm is 320 acres and hes two sots of barnsdairy cows in all and many other cows, heifers, ducks, chickens, etc., two tractors, two . toams horses . and much . valuable machinery.

We will have some 100 acres of ecrn and we are very busy plowing and planting. About 30 acres of the corn are already up and will be ready for cultivation ... soon Also ... the oats I. helped sow are up

Pillen S. Myer teld Congress, in testimony made public last week, that he knew of no sabotage or espionage by west coast Japanese since Pearl Herbor.

The director said he found no evidence to indicate that Japanese have been deliberately placed near vital military establishments by the Japanese Government prior to Pearl Harbor.

When asked, "How do you account for the coincidence of their nearly always being found near places of strategical and military importance?" by Chairman Cannon (D. Mo.) of the House Appropriations Committee, Myer is quoted as saying:

"That is easily accounted for. Those people were, generally apeaking, settled in those areas before any of these strategical developments came out."
