"... The idea to the women in Groves House is this: A co-operative provides law-cost living; inter-racial and intermixed living, promotes the co-operative movement by training future leaders, and permits us to become oducated te our beings."

Praising the co-operative way, she stated: "Co-operation removes the cause of war, promotes economic equilibrium, paves the way for real democracy without disturbing society, without undergoing socrotive methods that arouse public suspicion, without subverting any other order."
