EAST Seabrook farms Offer Is Good

56-8-B Fukuji Sasaki, chairman of the Jerome Relocation Planning Commission, and Harold Ouchida, 56-5-A, ex-member of the Jerome Commission, advise that any evacuee farmer who wishesto study east-coast farming methods at first hand should investigate the jobs offered by the Seabrook Farms Bridgetown N.J.

Sasaki and Ouchida were members of a committee of three from the Jerome Center who made a trip to New Jersey last April to inspect the Seabrook Farms personally. They report that, although the climate and farm condi-tions were similar to the California truck gardening areas, the scale of operations was 'much greater than any which exists on the West Coast.

There are about 150 evacuees employed at present time, most of them from Arkansas and Colorado The employer hopes to employ about 450 as he prefers Japanese to the other farm workers whom he employs.

Those now employed are rated as experienced workers immediately and advanced rapidly as they demistrate their ability.

Men who have been working for several months are making 722 an hour and are working as many hours as they wish, so that some are receiving weekly pay checks running over \$55 a week, Ouchida reports.

Living quarters and meals are provided on the premises. Single men live in double rooms. Furnished housekeeping apartments are available for married couples and family groups. A wide variety of jobs are offered to men and women of all ages.

Although year around . employment is available to many employees and brook is anxious to have evacuées relocate there permanently, he also provided round-trip transportation for persons from Jerome who wished to accept employment on a six-

GILA SOLDIERS DO WELL

The third group of 33 draftees are leaving today to join the United States Army bringing many more Gilans closer to the war and to the accompanying horrors. Rivers' men are really in the fight now, not only in the inducting and training centers from Fort Douglas on to Camp Blanding, Savage, Shelby, etc, but also in actual fighting overseas. And they are giving an excellent account of themselves as exemplified in men like Komoto and Shimazu, and as seen in letters that come back.

Letters from overseas give glimpses of the discomforts that our soldiers are facing. But the encouraging thing is that they show eagerness to win the war and express hopes of "seeing you all again." We cortainly hope that we will be able to see them again.

Typical are V-Mails from two former Gilans who once worked side by side at the procurement office here and are now fighting side by side "somewhere in Italy." Writing to Procurement officer Herman Ott, Pfc. George Tsujimoto and Pfc. Henry Kondo assure Rivers that its boys are carrying on as good soldiers.


Pfc. Tsujimoto says:

"Now that I am overseas and have seen some of thc horrors and destructions of war, I am greatly than'-ful that the people back home are now subjected to these terrifying experiences. Although I have seen just a part of it, there is much more to come..."

"Being here at the front, the war isn't so dramatic. It's just hard work, and all we want is to finish it and get back home. We are just toiling from day to day in a separate world full of insecurity, discomfort, homesickness, and a dull sense of danger. Yet knowing that people like yourself are contributing the utmost effort for us in the service, either directly or indirectly, we are doing our best with a great sense of Hoping that the same and sober attiresponsibility. tude of the American people may stand as a symbol of the highest democratic principle throughout the world, when peace is won.

TRIAL INDEFINITE LEAVE RULES GIVEN

Indefinite leave (trial period) regulations have been revised to permit issuance of this type of leave to persons under 21 years of age, provided; 1) such person is married and the head of a family; or 2) such person is specifically recommended for leave by the project irector and the relocation program efficer. Horotofore, a minor could not be granted trial period leave unless accompanied by a member of his immediate family who was 21 years old or over.

Another recent revision in the trial period procedure permits the issuance of such leave to persons going to eastern North and South Dakota, and castern Nebraska. Those areas have previously been closed to evacuees on trial period leave:




