## CO-OP

### CASH PAYMENTS BEGIN JULY 15

Cash payments for the remaining 70% of the Co-op revolving fund certificates issued for the 1942-43 fiscal year ending June 30, 1943, will begin on July 15, the Gila River Co-op Congress of Delegates decided at a meeting Saturday. Schedules and details of the cash redemptions will be announced later. All amounts over \$1 will be paid in checks and smaller amounts will be paid in coins, stated Masato W. Kato, executive secretary of the Co-op.

At the same time the delegates discussed patronage refunds for the 1943-44 fiscal year which ends this month. The delegates unanimously approved the Board of Directors' recommendation to set aside 25% for a general reserve, 2% for the educational fund, and to issue the rest in the form of revolving fund certificates. The Board of Directors will meet this Friday for final approval of this recommendation.

### BUTTE PREPARES FESTIVITIES TO WELCOME JEROME

Opening the Jerome Welcome - July 4 festivities with an elaborate social, the Community Council and the CAS have lined up an impressive program for Butte.

Coincidental with the festival, baseball fans are hoping for a series of games with a team from Poston. However, until late last night no confirmation had come on whether or not the Poston team would arrive. Details of the proposed series may be found in the sport page.

The exhibit which was planned to be held during the festivities has been cancelled in Butte.

The tentative program for Butte is as follows:

July 1 - Welcome Jerome social.

July 2 - Engoi, 8:30 p.m. at the amphitheatre.

July 4 - Parade, to start between blocks 42 and 43 and end at the ad building. July 4th program at the ad building immediately following the parade. Free baseball game, 28 vs. 65, with reserved seats for ex-Denscrites. Engoi, 8:30 p.m. at the amphitheatre.

July 5 - "Yank in the RAF," 9 p.m. at the amphitheatre.

## MORE INDUCTION, PHYSICAL ORDERS

Pre-induction physical examination orders for 20 and induction orders for 42 Gilans were received by the leave office yesterday.

Of the total of 62 orders, 22 were for men who have already relocated.

Names of the 62 will be released in Thursday's issue of the NEWS-COURIER.

One thousand twenty-one more transferees from Jerome arrived at Gila River yesterday and today in the last two trainloads from Jerome, bringing to about 2,050 the total number of residents who have transferred in the four movements from the Arkansas center.

### YESTERDAY

The four trains arrived on June 15, 21, 26, and 27, respectively, with a little more than 500 persons on each movement.

On yesterday's train came 510 new arrivals with family groups divided as follows:

1 family of 12, 2 nines, 2 eights, 7 sevens, 14 sixes, 13 fives, 23 fours, 19 threes, 21 twos, 73 single males, and 2 single females.

### TODAY

Five hundred eleven were on today's train according to a teletype from E. B. Whitaker, project director of Jerome. Family groups are divided as follows:

1 family of ten, 3 nines, 4 eights, 9 sevens, 15 sixes, 14 fives, 19 fours, 16 threes, 25 twos, 47 single males, and 2 single females.

## TULEAN JAILED FOR ASSAULT

Shigoo Okamoto, 39 year old alien Japanese of Tule Lake, was held in jail at Newell last week following an attack with a hammer on two other issei at the segregation center, the S.F. Examiner reported.

The WRA said one of his victims Sononuki Suzuki, 51, was in a critical condition with a fractured skull, the Examiner reported. The condition of the other, Shunzi Tanaka, 51, was not serious.

**RIVERS 'TOPS'  
AMONG CENTERS**

Dr. George S. Iki, Rivers physician, returned last Wednesday from a two month trip to the East and to other relocation centers, convinced more than ever that this camp is the best in general atmosphere and in smooth relationship between the evacuees and the appointed staff.

Dr. Iki, who is already helping out at the community hospital, said that he has no immediate plans for leaving the center. He is awaiting word on the possibility of being granted a license to practice on the outside.

Dr. Tetsuo Sugiyama also returned to Rivers early Sunday morning. His immediate future plans are indefinite.

Commenting on the friendly and pleasing atmosphere at Gila, Dr. Iki declared:

"I feel that the reason for our lack of major troubles is that Mr. Bennett and his immediate staff are very understanding and sympathetic in handling the evacuee problems."

"And you can quote me on this," he said enthusiastically. "I feel that Mr. Bennett and his staff are sincere in trying to run this center as harmoniously as possible. Therefore any problem that comes up, the residents and the personnel are able to meet and solve together."

Dr. Iki stated that the feeling of freedom during his trip outside was grand, and he did not meet any discrimination whatever. But when it comes to living in a center, he picks Gila above all others.

**600 Resettle  
In New York**

Over six hundred resettlers have come into New York since last November, according to a bulletin of the N.Y. Church Committee for Japanese Americans. The number has increased with the passing of months due to the lifting of the need for eastern defense clearance.

**A MATTER OF PRINCIPLES**

As time goes on, there becomes less and less justification for the continued barrings of Japanese Americans from their former homes on the West Coast. The "military necessity" which invoked evacuation orders in 1942 no longer exists. The "protection" of Japanese from possible violence, is no longer a valid reason. If after two and one-half years, the people of the United States are still so jittery and excitable as to commit violence on the innocent, it does not speak well for a civilized people. And even if by chance, violence does start, if the government is not able to stop such actions and prevent further trouble, it certainly would not speak well for a civilized nation. No, the "protective custody" reasoning is no longer a sound one.

True, many, and perhaps most, of the evacuees do not wish to return to their former homes. In fact a large number have already "burned their bridges" behind and have taken the chance of starting anew somewhere farther east. However, the opening of the West Coast has nothing to do with the extent of our intentions to return. Whether we return or not, the opening of the area would give us a sense of justice attained, even though it is justice delayed.

There are many organizations, especially church groups, actively working for the opening of the restricted area. We print a resolution passed by the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church on the U.S.A. on May 30, 1944, which reads as follows:

"That the General Assembly strongly approve the ministry which has been extended by the Board, in cooperation with other Christian bodies, to our Japanese American brethren; that our churches be urged to do everything within their power to facilitate the resettlement of the Japanese Americans in such communities as they may choose and to receive them into the fellowship of our churches; and that the General Assembly express the strong conviction that, as soon as the exigencies of the military situation make it possible, the loyal evacuees be given the right to return to their former homes and be protected against any discrimination or persecution. That the State Clerk be empowered to transmit this recommendation to the War Relocation Authority in Washington."

**63 HEART MOUNTAIN MISER  
SENTENCED TO 3 YEARS EACH**

Sixty-three Japanese Americans, residents of the Heart Mountain Relocation Center, were each sentenced to three years of confinement for failure to report for draft production examinations, according to the Arizona Republic.

The 63 residents were tried without jury before U.S. District Judge Kennedy between June 12 and 19. They contended mainly that they considered citizenship rights clouded by relocation and that they did not wish to report for draft purposes until rights were cleared.

The youths were sentenced yesterday, June 26, in the Cheyenne, Wyoming, court by Judge T. Blake.

Clyde Watts, co-defense counsel told Judge Kennedy that the defendants expected to appeal.

"As to the assertion that they did not desire to report until their citizenship had been clarified, this is without merit as to legal basis," said Judge Kennedy.

The courts have repeatedly asserted that the orders of the boards of selective service have the substance of congressional acts and must be obeyed.

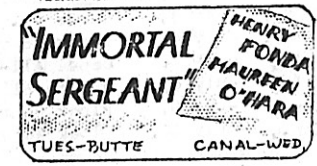
