

ADDED PAY FOR NET WORKERS

18,19 YOUTHS TO REGISTER FOR DRAFT

An estimated 425 boys of 18 and 19 years in Rivers will join nearly 5,000,000 boys of same age in America for draft registration as soon as arrangements can be made with a local board, according to John Landward, head of Welfare Section.

In reply to a wire sent by Landward regarding the procedure on registration within the Relocation Centers, Dillon S. Myer, WRA Director, advised him that local boards will register evacuees, and referred him to the State Director of Selective Service, Major General Alexander M. Tuthill, in Phoenix, Arizona. Landward is working out the necessary adjustments and arrangements with Major General Tuthill.

Yule Tide Cheer

Paychecks covering the month of November for Gila workers, totaling \$92,125.75 are arriving from San Francisco this week and should be distributed sometime before Christmas, according to R. J. Slawson, senior administrative officer.

\$100,000 INCOME FOR COMMUNITY

An approximate monthly income of \$100,000 can be realized by the community if the net project operates with the full complement of 963 workers doing normal work, disclosed Thomas Reynolds, net factory manager.

The distribution of the income is based on Plan III which provides that, all the workers in Rivers benefit financially from the net factory. The plan calls for three basis in pay for the net project workers. Every

LEAGUE NEEDS NEW LEADERS

Despite four conflicting meetings held last night in the same area, the JACL's second open meet in the south section of Butte attracted a fair turnout.

Nobu Kawai, chairman of the JACL executive board, appealed to the group for infusion of new blood in JACL leadership. Such a move will make for liberal policies, in contrast to the old policies under old leaders, he stated.

Kawai stressed that the Christmas gift drive sponsored by the JACL for the benefit of evacuee children is an important indication of the number of Caucasian people who are actively friendly to the evacuees.

A total of 30,000 gifts collected by church groups from 30,000 families, representing 150,000 people, were sent out to the 10 relocation centers.

EACH BLOCK TO HAVE FUEL STORAGE TANK FOR HEATERS

"Arrival may be next week, it may be week after, we don't know when, but stoves for Rivers' residents are definitely on the way," stated an administrative official in answer to the often heard query, "When are the stoves coming?"

"Once the stoves arrive, ready for use in approximately two weeks, they will be installed simultaneously in both communities," J.H. Janeway, superintendent of construction revealed.

One 1,000 gallon oil tank will be placed in each block adjacent to the ironing room close to the road. All tanks will be

allowed \$16.00 WRA monthly allowances semi-monthly. If the worker averages 1,000 square feet of net a day in a month, he will receive a \$10 bonus. Every square foot above 1,000 he will receive 1/10 of a cent. Thus, if the worker garnishes an average of 1,500 square feet a day (which is normal output for experienced workers) a month, he will receive \$16 plus \$10, plus \$10 (working 20 days) for a total of \$36, plus the cut from the community fund. All pay in excess of what is paid directly to net workers

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WORKERS EXCEED EXPECTATION

The net camouflage crew that started work Tuesday, established performance of an average of 1,000 square feet on the second day of work yesterday.

Thomas Reynolds, net plant manager, stated jubilantly that the crew had exceeded his expectation by 200 square feet. The slowest crew, just recruited that morning, averaged 400, and an experienced group turned out a record high of 1,584 square feet per person.

NEW REGULATIONS ON EVACUEE STORED GOODS

Bulletin No. 21, supplement B, as released by the San Francisco War Relocation Authority office recently, reveals the location of central receiving warehouses for shipment of evacuee household goods and personal effects. Evacuees arranging for the moving of their property from present storage to the central receiving warehouses must supply one copy of form WRA-83 to accompany property to such warehouse and be surrendered therewith. For the proper handling of these properties, evacuees are asked to complete form WRA-83 in requesting the forwarding of their property.

WRA PLAN

The War Relocation Authority will assume responsibility for moving property directly from place of private storage to projects, where such requests have been received from 20 or more families. Such shipments must be so arranged that all property to be moved may all be handled at one time. Where such warehouses are under the control and supervision of an organization or individual outside of a project, it is desirable that such information be furnished the Regional Office so that a co-ordinated plan may be arranged for handling the property. In instances where access to and control of such property may be held by an evacuee, it is desirable that such information, together with an inventory of the property and full details in connection therewith, be furnished the Regional

Office. In every case the Regional Office should have evidence of the consent of the person having control of the warehouse to enter and remove the property. This consent should contain a provision releasing WRA and its agents and employees from any liability for loss or damage arising in connection with the removal of the property.

REQUEST ONLY

Only that property requested by the evacuee will be shipped from private storage warehouses. Property not shipped directly to projects from any private storage warehouse under the procedure above outlined will be left in the warehouse and control thereof, returned to the individual or organization having control of the warehouse except in instances where the owners of such property have requested the movement thereof to warehouses under the jurisdiction of the War Relocation Authority.

Among the many different types of vegetables, being raised now for seed purposes are varieties of peas, onions, carrots, radishes, cabbages, lettuces, and beans.

(continued from page 1) Canal workers and what is allowed for the workers for subsistence and clothing (both paid by the employer out of wages) will be put in the community fund which will be divided among all the workers in the center. The total monthly income to the fund is estimated at \$50,000 or more with 963 workers on the job.

Figures released by Reynolds show that 963 workers at the plant turning out an average of 1,500 square feet per day for each of the 800 gardeners will earn for the community fund an estimated \$14 plus income above the WRA advanced for every worker in the center.

Canal Temporary Committee chairman, Karl Iwanaga, has appointed Sam Furuta, Bob Wade, and Mats Ando to serve on the camouflage net factory committee to consider the plant's plan and problems.

Director Leroy Bennett will explain the whys and the wheresores and the benefits of the net factory at a mass meeting of all workers in Butte and Canal in the near future.
