BUTTE

ELEMENTARY HAS 850 STUDENTS

After the last of the Jerome children were enrolled this week, it was discovered that there were something over 850 children participating in the summer activities of the Butte Elementary School, stated Principal Roe H. Strickland. Of this number 200 are of kindergarten age, and the remainder are in grades one through six.

Because of the heat, it was inadvisable to hold an afternoon session with the pre-school children. So the nursery teachers are giving their full time to the children from 4½ to 6 years of age. The kindergarten starts in the morning at 8:00 and lasts until 11:30. Children under 4½ will be admitted in September.

UNREGISTERED CHILDREN

If there are still any children in the community from Jerome who have not as yet registered, they are urged to do so and get into the swing with the other children in the camp here, stated Principal Strickland. The children are having lots of fun, and they are having a chance to do something they really want to do. Most of the children have said they like "summer school" better than "regular school." of the staff is to make it fun, but worthwhile, he said.

MORNING SESSIONS.

Elementary school children in Butte attend the morning activities at the school. For the first three grades this includes some light reading activities, some remedial work and review, library reading, a story period, art, quiet play in the room and in the shade of the barracks, and some music. For the fourth, fifth, and sixth grades, the program includes 40 minutes of sports and games for all children, light reading and library work, English and social studies with relocation as the theme. From 10:30 to 11:30 each day, the pupils in the 4th, 5th, and 6th grades go to clubs, which the children have chosen. They include the Spanish Club, 30 members; Dramatics Club, 30 members; Red Cross Club, 35 members; Science Club, 35 members; Airplane Club, 30 members; Hobby Club for boys, 60 members; Hobby Club for girls, 60 members; Crafts Club for boys, 60 members; Crafts Club for girls, 40 members.

THE AFTERNOON PROGRAM

From 1:00 to 2:30 every afternoon over 100 boys and girls of the 4th, 5th, and 6th grades come back to the air-cooled mess hall 41 to work with art mediums. There are several teachers in charge. Children of the kindergarten, 1st, 2nd, and 3rd grade, may come to the library for rest, music, and a story hour. As many as 50 have attended this group. All are welcome.

ALL ARE WELCOME

Any child from kindergarten age through the sixth grade is welcome to come and participate in as many of the activities of the school as he wishes. There is something for each person from 8:00 to 2:30. From 3:00 p.m. on, the church and community are given the privilege of working with the children.

editorial:**AN ACTIVE PROGRAM**

Extensive summer school activities and courses have started in both Butte and Canal for all students from high school age down to the smallest. In a place where children have not much to do except go to school, there is nothing better than a summer program like those in Butte and Canal to keep youngsters out of trouble and at the same time help develop wholesome habits. When one of the community's pressing problems is juvenile delinquency, we feel that parents can help solve the problem by urging children to attend the summer school classes and join in the activities and recreation.

The term "summer school" may sound very forbidding, and one's first impulse may be to stay away. Perhaps it is the "summer" in it that makes it dry sounding and hot. However, if one takes a look into the curricula, he will find that interesting and varied programs for young people are offered.

Elsewhere in this issue is a report by Principal Roe H. Strickland on the program worked out for his Butte Elementary School. Such programs are not confined to Butte alone; nor are they for elementary students only.

It is interesting to note that Principal Strickland has included among his activities a Spanish Club for the fifth and sixth graders, an eleven week course to introduce the students to the foreign language. Among the other clubs are those in science, Red Cross, handicraft, airplane, music, and dramatics. Whether or not the students actually become study conscious and acquire a tremendous amount of knowledge is not the question. What is important is the interest that these varied programs hold for the students and how well they help to channel youths' energies into constructive fields.

Sometimes we fail to appreciate the school system that we have here, schools accredited in the state and respected by the students and parents alike. We hope that all residents will take advantage of the carefully worked out summer program that will not only educate but also will keep young people off the delinquency list.
