IBUTTE

COUNCIL STUDIES JUVENILE CODE

A tentative juvenile code, providing for juvenile hearings and listing offenses, has been drawn up by the Butte Community Council and will be submitted for council approval, probably at the next meeting. The code is subject to change.

The tentative code, which would affect all Butte residents under 18 years of age, reads as follows:

1. JUVENILE DEFINED. Any person below the age of eighteen is a juvenile.

2. JUVENILE SUBJECT TO LAWS AS ADULT. Any juvenile is subject to the laws of this community in the same manner as an adult, except that the provisions of this code shall be intended to be corrective, not penal.

3. POWER TO MAKE LAWS VESTED IN THE COMMUNITY COUNCIL. The power to make or enact, modify or repeal any laws under this code is vested in the Community Council.

4. JURISDICTION OF JUVENILE BOARD. The jurisdiction of the Juvenile Board shall be limited to hearing and determining such cases of juvenile delinquency as are brought before it, and to dispose of them in accordance with the provisions of this code.

5. CASES HOW DISPOSED. The board may conduct its own independent hearing for determination and dis-

PETITION SEEKS TO ENJOIN COAST EXCLUSION OF NISEI

A petition which would restrain the Western Defense Command from blocking the return of three Japanese Americans to the Pacific Coast will be heard on July 21 before

the Superior Court in Los Angeles, according to an A.P. report.

The petition sponsored by the American Civil Liberties Union contends that there is no military need justifying further exclusion from California of "Loyal American-born Japanese" and that the removal of "all enemy forces from Alaska and the Aleutians" makes any further exclusion of such citizens "unnecessary and therefore unconstitutional."

Filed in behalf of Shizuko Shiramizu, widow of Kiyoshi Shiramizu, fatally wounded in Italy, Masaru Baba, honorably discharged from the army, and George Ochikubo, a dentist now at Topaz relocation center, A.L. Wirip, Civil Liberties attorney, said the action may become a test case.

The petition is directed against Major General Charles H. Bonesteel, Western Defense commander and three other officers of the command.

posal of each case brought before it, or it may in its discretion turn over the case for prosecution before the Judicial Commission.

6. NUMBER OF PERSONS TO SERVE ON BOARD AND TERM. The number of persons to serve on the Board shall not be less than three nor more than six, and each shall serve for a term of one year.

7. BOARD TO HAVE POWER TO ISSUE SUBPOENAS, CALL WITNESSES. For the purpose of conducting a proper and efficient hearing, the Board is authorized to issue subpoenas, call all such witnesses as are material to the proper conduct of the hearings.

8. DECISION OF THE BOARD BINDING BUT APPEAL PERMISSIBLE. The decision of the Board is binding, except that an appeal may be made to the Project Director upon a showing of proper grounds.

9. PROCEEDINGS BEFORE JUDICIAL COMMISSION A CRIMINAL CASE. All proceedings before the Judicial Commission shall be tried and disposed of in the same manner as a criminal case.

10. CURFEW FOR JUVENILE. A juvenile shall not wander away from his living quarters during the late hours of the evening without just cause; nor shall he loiter or be found out of doors after the hour of 12:00 midnight without a proper escort.

11. PLAYING OF HARD AND SOFTBALL AN OFFENSE. All playing of hard and soft ball other than at the place provided is deemed an offense.

12. DRINKING AND SMOKING AN OFFENSE. Drinking of alcoholic beverage or smoking by a juvenile is deemed an offense.

13. ZOOF - SUIT GANGSTERISM, AN OFFENSE. Any juvenile who shall engage in zoof-suit or any other form of gangsterism is guilty of an offense.

EFFECTS OF RACISM

In an article entitled "Racism on the West Coast," Carey McWilliams discusses the West Coast's campaign to prevent the release of any persons of Japanese ancestry from the relocation centers for the duration in the June issue of the New Republic.

There can be no question, he writes, but that anti-evacuee agitation in California is being cultivated for partisan political purposes. The hearings were, in large part, aimed at smearing the WRA and building up a wall of reactionary feeling of stimulating racial hatred. To some extent this agitation has unquestionably been effective, wrote McWilliams.

Various emergency measures adopted after Pearl Harbor have been relaxed on the West Coast and the general opinion has so changed in our favor as to warrant the military lifting the ban against the return of evacuees. If the ban is lifted, there will be no mass return of the evacuees and the freely predicted "murder" and "bloodshed" will not occur. There is a respectable opinion in California today that favors lifting the ban.

California has forced the Washington authorities to adopt a series of measures each of which has seriously jeopardized our national interests in the Far East. It requires no insight to predict that this same situation will continue until the American people realize the local areas should not be permitted to force the federal government into the position of having to adopt their particular attitudes on race relations, concluded McWilliams.

SPECIAL COACH MAY BE ARRANGED FOR JULY 20

Any person who wishes to relocate on Thursday, July 20, is urged to contact the relocation office in Butte or Canal before 5:00 p.m., Tuesday, July 11, announced Wilson Hart, relocation adviser.

Although it has been previously announced that there will be no special coach on the Southern Pa-

acific from Chandler on July 20, an effort will be made to secure a special coach on the 20th because of the number of people who wish to leave before July 27 but are not able to leave on the July 13 train because it has already been filled.

Said Hart, "In order to assure every person a seat, we will not schedule more than 42 people to travel on any one coach. If a sufficient number of people wish to leave on the 20th, special efforts will be made to charter a special coach on that day."

"If you are planning to relocate during the month of July and wish to travel on the special coach, advise the relocation offices immediately even if your plans are not definite," concluded Hart.

"since it gives the evacuees a four to six months' period to make a permanent adjustment in a new community, and permits them to return to the center if such an attempt is unsuccessful.

Trial period indefinite leave, however, may be issued only at the center, and evacuees out on seasonal and short-term leave will not be granted permission to transfer to trial period indefinite leave."

Additional revisions of leave regulations at this time provide that: (1) each person 18 years of age or over, plus those who became 17 before May 17, 1944, must execute a separate trial period agreement in applying for trial period indefinite leave; (2) an evacuee who is converting to indefinite leave from short-term, seasonal, or trial period indefinite leave, who is otherwise eligible for a grant, and who has paid his own travel expense to the community in which he is resettled, may be reimbursed for his actual travel expense including Federal tax on his ticket; and (3) travel of evacuees on indefinite leave may now be authorized to points of relocation outside the continental limits of the United States.

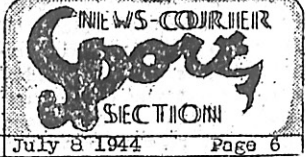

The meeting this afternoon was to decide whether to continue or end and start a new league with some former Jerome ballplayers, possibly conceding the title to Broncos.

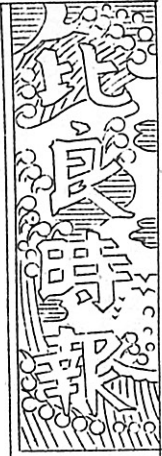
