Former Jerome residents now living in Butte must call for their checks at the outside window of the agent cashier on the south side of the annex on Thursday, July 13, between 1 p.m. and 5 p.m.

Those in Canal are to get their checks in the administration building on Monday, July 17, between 1 p.m. and 4 p.m.

Each person must call for his own check and present his Jerome ID number.

The Co-op will start its laundry services Wednesday, July 12, at 42-1-C and D, announced Ken Kitasako, assistant general manager of the Co-op.

The laundry will be open every day except Sunday from 8:30 a.m. till 4 p.m.

In Canal bundles may be taken to the dry cleaning store at 16-8-A.

Laundry services are open to both Caucasians and evacuees.

## FIGHTS BRILLIANTLY

In a special statement accompanied by a recent communique, the American soldiers of Japanese origin, fighting with the 100th Battalion of the 442 Regiment combat team in the present Fifth Army offensive were cited for playing a major role in Italy's bitterest battle.

## THREE IN ARMY, THREE TO GO

## ITALY NISEI AMERICANS LEAD ASSAULT

Japanese Americans of the 442nd Regimental Combat Team spearheaded the assault along the West Coast sector of Italy toward the Port of Livorno (Leghorn) on July 9, it was officially announced yesterday.

With tank support, this force, a part of Gen. Mark Clark's Fifth Army, smashed into enemy positions in the face of determined resistance.

Said an Allied spokesman:

Spearheading the assault was a unit of the 442nd which has performed brilliantly throughout the Italian campaign.

## CONSERVE WATER JANEWAY WARNS

The danger of acute water shortage in Rivers, with even the possible necessity of periodic water shutoffs again this year, was pointed out by J.H. Janeway, construction engineer.

"If some attempt is not made by all residents to conserve water, it is going to be necessary to cut water off from 2 to 5 p.m. each afternoon in order to keep enough water in our tank for fire protection," Janeway warned.

He declared that there is entirely too much water wasted by turning on too much cooler water and from too much sprinkling in the afternoons. From 2 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. more water is being used than the pumps are able to produce.

## Nisei Family Enjoys Dairy

"We are fitting into the community quite well," writes Izzy Otani, former Butte Community clerk, who with his family has resettled on a dairy farm in Poplar Grove, Ill.

Otani does the milking twice daily of 24 cows, helps in haying and in cultivation of corn and soy bean, in addition to working on his own vegetable garden.

He writes as follows:

"We are the only nisei for miles around us but we have made friends and will continue to do so. We have a kind boss who treats us like a million. He has given me two raises in the short time I've been here.

"We have attended church every week since the family became united. We've had newly made friends bring us fireworks for the kids, strawberries, toys, play books, etc...At first people seem to stare and look us over, but as soon as we start conversing, all the mystery seems to melt away and no one seems to question anything.

"The first Sunday we went to church the people seemed to line up to invite us to other gatherings and invite the children to Sunday School and other church activities."

Otani advises that single men should not be recommended for dairy farm work because it would be a tough, lonely life, but for a family man it's quite the thing because it insures him a house and quite a helping of food.

## WATCH THAT MATCH

Small fires like the one that threatened one of the new school buildings in Butte and another one that started in block 55 last week are not big enough and disastrous enough to impress us too much. But they should be enough to warn us of the hazards of fires do exist.

Anyone who stops to consider for a moment just what it would mean to him and to his neighbors should a barrack or two burn up would be careful how he throws his matches around. The thought of fires often brings to mind the excitement of seeing another's home burn; it hardly ever occurs to him that his may be the one.

Gila has been relatively fortunate in regard to fires within the residential area. With the newcomers added from Jerome, and living space a little more crowded again, it is well to give some thought to fire prevention.

A cure of prevention in this case is almost priceless, because after a fire has run amuck in a barrack or a block, cure is an impossibility.

## THE AMERICAN WAY

(Under the date of June 23, 1944, the Milwaukee Journal carried the following editorial:)

"On the west coast, many otherwise respectable organizations--including the American Legion, which should stand for the finest kind of Americanism--have been engaging in a bitter hate campaign against the Japanese Americans. They have sought to direct the enmity for Japan against these citizens. The west coast press has also played a disgraceful role in this attack.

"What kind of Americanism is it for the city of Gardena to omit from its honor roll of citizens the names of 17 Japanese Americans in the service of our common country? What kind of Americanism is it for the American Legion to revoke the charters of two posts made up of Japanese American veterans of the first World War? What kind of Americanism is it for the legion in Portland, Oregon, to protest the efforts of local citizens to provide some volunteer care for a Japanese convalescent?

"The attitude expressed in these actions is a disheartening sign that we have a long way to go to achieve the kind of tolerance and democracy we fight for."

for and by persons of Japanese ancestry. It is a critical labor shortage area and day after day the newspapers are full of advertisements for employees in a wide diversity of occupation.

A few casual contacts by the Acting Relocation Officer who has just been assigned in Buffalo have already turned up jobs for mechanics and mechanic helpers; bench hands, machinists; mechanical engineers and draftsmen; tire recappers; tool and die makers and welders. The starting rate there for the less experienced persons is 75¢ an hour.

Generally speaking the housing situation is better than that existing in Detroit and Cleveland.

At the present writing the nisei population in Buffalo is about 25 and there are two families of issei with nisei children. There are also a brother and sister who are issei. These people have been working in war plants or in private stores or garages. Several are students at the University of Buffalo; one girl is a secretary for the Secretary of the YWCA; one follows works for a Baptist church here.

## FIFTY MEN NEEDED FOR RAILROADS, SAYS NISHII

Fifty additional men are needed immediately on the Chicago, Milwaukee, and St. Paul Railroad according to Frank Nishi, 44-6-D, who returned to Gila Saturday, after four months work on the railroad. In addition to jobs in traveling gangs such as those in which the men now employed are working there are between ten and twenty openings for family men to work in stationary section crews. These jobs pay 64¢ an hour and permanent housing is included for the worker's family, rent free with electricity and running water provided by the railroad.

This is an excellent opportunity for a family man who is short of funds to save some money in order to relocate permanently, said Nishi. These jobs are also permanent if he wishes to remain with the railroad.

The company is also willing to pay transportation expenses and will provide free travel for a visit to the project to any worker who remains on the job for six months.

Anyone interested in information regarding these positions is invited to contact Nishi, either

at his home or in the Relocation Offices.

This work will continue for an indefinite period. Crews will leave the project as soon as a sufficient number of men are ready to leave.

## Tule Sentry Not Guilty

The Tule Lake sentry, who was involved in the shooting of Shoichi Okamoto, stood cleared last Friday of a manslaughter charge, according to the Associated Press.

A court martial, attended by Japanese evacuees and representatives of the War Relocation Authority, acquitted Pvt. Bernard W. Goe, the former Tule Lake camp sentry, the report said.

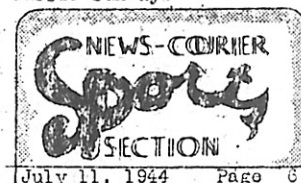
### VISITORS' BUTTE GAME SKATCHED
