### PFC. SAKOHIRA GILA HONORS NISEI SOLDIER

In an auditorium filled to capacity, Canal paid tribute to Pvt. Todd Sc-kohira, Gila's socond soldier to be killed in action, with a Christian memorial service yesterlay morning.

Besides his mother, two brothers and two sisters were present. The brother in the uniform of the army and one sister in that of a Nurse's Cadet added to the impressiveness of the service.

Additional workers are needed at Sombrook and transportation will be arranged on another date by eithor Southern Pacific or Santa Fe Railroads. In either event, all persons loaving o'n trial loave will have their transportation expenses paid in advance by Seabrook Farms.

The starting wages at Soabrook are not as high as those available in industrial . work in larger cities. The popularity of this offer arises from the fact that it is an opporas long as West Coast exclusion remains in effect, according to a WRA release . on July 22.
